

Numbers: Lessons from the Wilderness – Trusting God’s Faithfulness

- **Author:** Moses (traditionally accepted, *Numbers 33:2*)
 - **Audience:** The Israelites—those who left Egypt and their children, preparing to enter the Promised Land
 - **Date:** Circa 1440–1400 BC, during the 40 years in the wilderness after the Exodus

Purpose Statement

Numbers shows us how God leads and cares for His people—even when they doubt—teaching us to trust His faithfulness through every challenge.

Key Themes

- God’s faithfulness despite Israel’s rebellion
 - The importance of obedience and trust
 - Preparation for God’s promises
 - God’s holy presence guiding His people

Key Stories and What They Teach Us

1. **God’s Census of the People** (*Numbers 1*)
 - God counts His people to prepare them for battle and blessing.
 - Shows that God knows and organizes His people for His purposes.
2. **Grumbling, the 12 Spies, and Rebellion** (*Numbers 11–14*)
 - The people complain about food, leadership, and hardships.
 - In *Numbers 13*, twelve spies are sent to scout the Promised Land.
 - Ten spies report fear and doubt; only Joshua and Caleb trust God.
 - *Numbers 14*: Israel refuses to enter the land, fearing giants instead of trusting God.
 - **Result:** God judges their unbelief—this generation will wander in the wilderness for 40 years, one year for each day the spies scouted the land (*Numbers 14:34*).
 - This failure becomes the turning point that sets up *Deuteronomy*, where Moses addresses the next generation.

3. **The Bronze Serpent** (*Numbers 21:4–9*)
 - After more grumbling, God sends serpents among the people.
 - He provides a bronze serpent on a pole—anyone who looks at it in faith is healed.
 - Jesus refers to this in *John 3:14–15*, showing how He would be lifted up to bring salvation.
 4. **Moses Strikes the Rock** (*Numbers 20:1–13*)
 - Instead of speaking to the rock as God commanded, Moses strikes it in frustration.
 - Though water flows, Moses dishonors God and is barred from entering the Promised Land.
 - Highlights the seriousness of obedience and the holiness of God.
 5. **Balaam’s Prophecy** (*Numbers 22–24*)
 - A pagan prophet is hired to curse Israel but ends up blessing them.
 - *Numbers 24:17* speaks of a star and scepter rising from Israel—a prophecy pointing to Jesus, the Messiah.
 - Shows that God's purposes can't be stopped—even by outsiders.

How Numbers Points to Jesus

- Jesus is the greater Moses who faithfully leads His people into God's promises.
 - The bronze serpent foreshadows Christ lifted up on the cross for our healing.
 - Jesus is the Rock who gives living water (*1 Corinthians 10:4*).
 - Israel’s failures show our need for a Savior who obeys perfectly and leads us in grace.

Key Scriptures to Highlight

- **Numbers 6:24–26** — The priestly blessing: “The Lord bless you and keep you...”
 - **Numbers 9:15–23** — God’s presence leads the people by cloud and fire.
 - **Numbers 13–14** — The 12 spies, fear vs. faith, and the consequence of unbelief.
 - **Numbers 20:8–13** — Moses’ failure and the importance of honoring God.
 - **Numbers 21:4–9** — The bronze serpent and healing through faith.
 - **Numbers 24:17** — A prophetic glimpse of Jesus the King.

Study Tips

- Read *Numbers* as the third act of the wilderness journey trilogy: **Exodus – Leviticus – Numbers**.
- Look for contrasts between obedience and disobedience.
- Notice how God's discipline is always paired with mercy.
- Use cross-references to the New Testament to see how *Numbers* points to Jesus.
- Pay attention to how God prepares His people for what's next—even through delay.
