### Johann Sebastian Bach

Where do we start with J. S. Bach? You know Bach, of course, as one of the greatest of composers. Coming from an extraordinarily musical family, Bach performed and composed from an early age. Let me offer one measure of his intensity and his skill: when he was twenty, Bach walked over 400 km (250 miles) to hear and learn from the renowned Dietrich Buxtehude, organist and composer in Lübeck, in northern Germany. Buxtehude—a magnet for young talent—likely introduced Bach to Johann Adam Reincken, another famous organist and composer, from whom Bach received lessons in composition. Both were deeply influential on Bach's music. Three months later he walked home to Arnstadt, in central Germany.

Bach's most prolific years began when he was hired as organist in the ducal court at Weimar in 1708. Six years later, in 1714, he was promoted to *Konzertmeister*, a substantial job that required leadership, performance, and composition. The Baroque was a richly innovative era, creating not just new music, but new *forms* of music, and developing older forms to maturity. Bach composed in all the forms that were fashionable, exciting, and new, including cantatas, sonatas, concertos, oratorios, opera, and more.

He wrote for orchestras, for voice, and for solo instruments like piano and pipe organ. Perhaps three-quarters of his composition was for the Church. Once he became *Konzertmeister* in Weimar, he was responsible for writing a cantata every four weeks for Sunday worship. For the next three years, Bach wrote, orchestrated, practiced, and performed a new cantata every month with virtually no repetition. These reflected the church calendar and drew on the texts for that Sunday's liturgy. At the same time, he was also composing in other forms mentioned above, and writing for secular commissions. He was prolific.

Bach wrote biblically, liturgically, and theologically. When he died, his estate included Bible commentaries, sermons, Luther's complete works, and a three-volume edition of Luther's translation of the Bible (with Bach's handwritten marginalia). He was a devout Christian, a traditional Lutheran in doctrine and practice, often closing his compositions with SDG, *Soli Deo Gloria*, Glory to God alone. His commitment to God and his familiarity with Scripture, liturgy, and Lutheran theology is evident in his music.

One prominent example is Cantata 21, one of his most acclaimed and discussed. The manuscript is dated 1714 and it was performed on the Third Sunday after Trinity in Weimar. A good representative of Bach's sacred music, Cantata 21 is best understood in musical, theological, and liturgical terms. Opening lament (tied to Psalm 42) moves into the patience required in

tribulation, and then to God's love for the sinner and the fulfillment of divine promises (tears of sowing being transformed into shouts of joy in the harvest). The work culminates in the eschatological praise of God for which we were all created (Revelation 4). Musically as well as lyrically, the cantata depicts the movement of the soul towards God. Simultaneously, it narrates the larger movement of God's people from exile to redemption, from alienation to union with God, from darkness to hope and then to joy. Music and text join hands and unite behind one theological and devotional purpose.

Listening is essential: Cantata 21 is performed by the Netherlands Bach Society <u>here</u>, while an English translation of the lyrics are <u>here</u>. The piece was written for lament, longing, and joy in worship. So listen, enjoy, and allow Bach to give you a brief Sabbath rest in the music.

There is, as always, more. In the enormous literature on Bach, a good place to start is Jeremy Begbie and Steven Guthrie's edited collection of essays entitled *Resonant Witness* (2011). Read modern biographies with care; they tend to make Bach more religiously progressive than he was. And there are deeply technical works: Eric Chafe's work on Cantata 21, *Tears Into Wine* (2015), is an amazing six hundred pages long. Reading about music helps, but nothing beats listening. Most of Bach's music has survived, unlike Buxtehude's or Reincken's, and is readily available on Spotify, Youtube, CDs, and, yes, vinyl.

## A Time to Grow

As the school year winds down and the summer vacations begin we now enter into the Ordinary or green season. As Fr. Wes often reminds us, the green seasons are times for growth. Having walked with Jesus from Advent through Eastertide, we continue the Christian year by following the Church in its mission in the world. The result is the growth of the Church. As many of you know, All Saints Anglican Church has been dedicated to this mission, particularly through the work of church planting. Mission Saint James launched weekly services just over a year ago and I want to take this opportunity to update you on what the Lord has been doing in our young new church.

We launched weekly services on April 23 of last year with 72 in attendance. We ended 2023 with an average of 53 in attendance. That average has decreased to 47 so far this year. Unfortunately, we have had to say goodbye to a few families, but

the Lord has faithfully replenished our numbers with new faces. God has also blessed us financially. This year, much of our external funding has begun to taper off, which was expected. However, our internal giving has increased, which has allowed us to hire Ryan and Elyzabeth Pflasterer

to help with administrative responsibilities. Likewise, we've been able to offer compensation for our music minister, Lucas Brogdon. In the last year MSJ held its first Instructed Eucharist, an Anglicanism 101 Class, an Easter Vigil, a block party, and pet blessing (just to name a few)! June will see our first VBS as well as our first catechism class in preparation for confirmations; additionally, plans are underway for service projects and outreach events through the end of the year. We have been busy, but we continue to need your help and prayers.

Our greatest need at the moment is more families with children. When we launched, there were as many children and youth as there were parents. Over the last year, that ratio has fallen. Church plants rely on an active and thriving children's ministry. We ask that you prayerfully consider joining Mission Saint James for 12 months as we grow this important ministry. Additionally, we are in search of a new music minister as Lucas Brogdon will be leaving Jackson in August to pursue seminary. This also is an important ministry for any church, especially for a church plant. If you or anyone you know might be interested in a parttime music ministry opportunity, please contact me at ben@stjamesjackson.org.

## Honduras Mission



All Saints Anglican Church has been going on short term medical construction mission trips to Honduras since 1998 when we were part of Saint Luke's Episcopal Church. We have supported long term missionary Suzy McCall and the LAMB Institute, which she started. The LAMB Institute has two schools, a children's home where approximately 70 children live, a day care center, and other outreaches. Over the years we have made many friends and formed a wonderful partnership.

The medical team does primary care in the poorest neighborhoods in the capital city of Tegucigalpa. They treat approximately 1200 people who do not have access to adequate medical care. They have the same conditions that a primary care provider would see in USA and are given medications which they cannot afford to buy. The All Saints outreach pays is able to pay for medication and supplies.

The construction team does light construction at the children's home to keep things in tip-top-shape. They actually spend most of their time playing with the children.

Dr. Jim Warmbrod will lead this trip once again July 6–13 with a group from All Saints and the surrounding community. Please be in prayer for those going on the trip and for those they will encounter.

#### Support the Mission

There are several ways you can supprt this Mission and those going to Honduras:

- 1. Attend Pill Packing at All Saints on June 19 at 5:45 pm in the Parish Hall.
  - This is an opportunity to help create medicine packs to be distributed in Honduras. Pizza will be provided afterwards.
- 2. Bring toothbrushes and toothpaste to the church for a toothbrush drive on June 2 and 9.
  - Dr. Warmbrod and his team will distribute any supplies collected to the people in the clinic alongside the medication
- 3. Pray for the team and the people of Honduras.

## Outreach Highlight Isaac Lane Elementary

In 2022, Madison County was ranked 95th out of 95 counties in Tennessee for child wellbeing by the Tennessee Commission on Children and Youth (TCCY). The rankings considered four categories: economic wellbeing, health, family and community, and education. Madison County's outcomes in all four categories were dismal, but especially in public education. No one wants to be ranked dead last in anything, but especially not in the wellbeing of our children. We've all heard the proverb "It takes a village to raise a child." With so many of our community's children struggling, I can't help but ask, where is their village?



The reality is that the children in our All Saints "village" are insulated from many of the struggles the TCCY report brought to light. They are loved. They are fed. They have caring parents who may not be perfect, but who nurture and attend to them. It would be easy to read a report like this and think, "this doesn't apply to me," especially if you do not have kids in the public school system.

But what if we widened our understanding of who is in our "village"? The prophet Jeremiah tells us we are to "seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper" (Jeremiah 29:7). If we heed this call, we begin to see how our flourishing is inextricably bound to the flourishing of the children down the street and across town. We are called to be their village.

In the past, All Saints has supported education initiatives like *The Read Team* or purchasing school supplies for families through United Way. This year, we decided to focus our investment in education through a PIE partnership with one school – Isaac Lane Elementary. A PIE partner, or a "Partner in Education," is a business, church, or other community organization that signs up to be the "village" for a school through a long-term, supportive relationship. This can look like providing resources and funds, volunteering to help with special projects, or supporting and encouraging teachers and administrators.

As a PIE partner, we hope to find creative ways to invest in Isaac Lane students, their teachers, and their families. In May, our Men's Monkly group spent a Saturday morning landscaping the entrance of the school and beautifying the bathrooms. Through the Spring semester, our outreach funds helped to provide incentives for students with good behavior and teacher gifts during Teacher Appreciation Week.

#### Other opportunities to get involved:

- Sign up to be a volunteer with *The Read Team*. Volunteer reading coaches work with second graders on their reading skills for one hour a week.
- In August, Janet Gore will transition to become the new Principal at Isaac Lane. We invite you to pray for her and for the teachers and staff she will lead.
- Donate school supplies or school uniforms for Isaac Lane students as they start back to school in August (more information to come).
- Prayerfully imagine other ways that All Saints can "be the village" for the students and families at Isaac Lane.

# St. Paul's House of Formation

This June will mark one year since my diaconal ordination at All Saints. What an adventure it has been to walk into this calling! I love being a deacon.

# Provincial Assemby



This is a significant Provincial Assembly in that the College of Bishops will be choosing a new archbishop to lead the ACNA. Please be in






