

Outreach Highlight The Place

The Place-Jackson, a 501 (c)(3) non-profit recovery home for women, was established in May 2022 and accepted its first resident in February 2023. The Place's mission is to educate and empower women who are without adequate resources and support. Our goal is for each woman to leave The Place-Jackson confident in her self-worth and strength. We accomplish this goal through education, long-term personal development, and safe shelter. After these women have completed intensive treatments, The Place-Jackson provides a safe community and educational programs. The programs build knowledge, self-esteem, and independence. Educational programs include personal health and wellness, financial planning and budgeting, and employment skills. The goal of living in a safe community is to develop

The Place JACKSON healthy citizenship skills. By providing a safe community and education, The Place empowers these women to accomplish more than they ever dreamed.

This Spring, after being homeless for several years, our first resident was able to transition to her own home. While at The Place, she obtained her GED and driver's license and continued her recovery journey. She credits The Place with saving her life. From the first day, we were confident that she would achieve remarkable things.

Several other women continue their journey at The Place. Each woman's journey is unique and although each woman is at a different stage, she supports her fellow residents. They

are growing as individuals and as a community. Their growth is inspiring.

Just as The Place believes in each woman's worth, All Saints believed in The Place. Members of All Saints mentored our young and inexperienced founding members. They gave guiding advice and joined conversations that shaped The Place and its first board. Also, we are thankful that All Saints provided a place for people to give tax-deductible gifts. These first gifts played a vital role in The Place's ability to open its doors. Now, The Place is a 501 (c)(3) organization and accepts donations directly. These donations along with All Saints' support allow The Place to continue to serve even more women.

In addition to being thankful and excited about the residents' growth, we are excited that our board is growing. We are transitioning from a working board of four women to an advisory board of eight.

The Blessing Place at The Mission Abbey

The Blessing Place at The Mission Abbey is a ministry organization at All Saints under which blessing prayer and practices are activated throughout our community. It is blessing prayer in action; that is, blessing prayer offered alongside small acts of compassion and kindness to people and organizations in and around West Tennessee.

As lovers of Jesus, we carry the Shalom of God, the peace and favor of God, everywhere we go. Relying on the leadership of the Holy Spirit, we seek a lifestyle of speaking God's blessing, upliftment, encouragement, and redemptive love to people we encounter in everyday patterns of life.

One way the team has been developing this lifestyle of blessing is by visiting businesses, organizations, and worksites with words of blessing and tokens of kindness (e.g. fresh flowers or warm doughnuts). With permission from the worksite manager, we express our appreciation to each employee, thanking them for their hard work and service. We then offer to pray God's blessing and favor to any who wish us to do so. We are careful to pray with great respect, quickly and quietly. Few have refused offers of blessing prayer. Most have responded with gratitude, sharing specific prayer requests as we pray.

Sometimes there are tears, and many times there are hugs. We call this kind of outreach to the community Blessing Blasts! It is so named because we have so much joy in sharing the love and blessings of God everywhere we go! It's a real blast! So far, we've done Blessing Blasts at schools,

restaurants, office supply stores, medical offices, car dealerships, city parks, nursing homes, the VA, mental health facilities, training centers, and even to the workers at a city solid waste center.

Blessing Blasts are just one of the initiatives at The Blessing Place at The Mission Abbey. Stay tuned! There are lots of ways you can join in on blessing the people and places in and around West Tennessee!


The Blessing Place at The Mission Abbey will be officially commissioned at All Saints on Sunday, May 19.

Just One Thing

Jerome

Bishop Bill noted during his recent visit that there remains a great deal of translation work to be done. This is not a new commitment. Christians have, from the start, been interested in and committed to translation. At least one scholar has observed that Jesus was the first translation: the Word became flesh and lived among us. That, I think, is the basic idea behind translation of Scripture: let the Word appear here, now, speaking Aramaic, or Portuguese, or Farsi. Let it dwell among us, living, active, and sharp, to build up and tear down. (The Christian commitment to translation goes the other direction, too, receiving culture, ideas, and individuals. Christian commitment to communication between people has been a powerful conduit and gift.)

One of the most well-known Christian translators was a contemporary of Augustine, Jerome. Jerome was from the Balkans, approximately where Bosnia is now, and was born c. 347 AD, making him a little older than Augustine (b 354). Jerome was a priest, theologian, and scholar, an important early model for joining the callings of scholar and monk and writing more than any other ancient Christian except Augustine. He had skills in language that relatively few people had. Augustine's Greek remained modest, although

it improved with age, and he never did learn Hebrew. Jerome, though, was fluent in Greek early in life. As an adult, he learned Hebrew and Aramaic and was familiar with Syriac and Arabic.

This became valuable due to developments in the church. As you know, the New Testament was written in Greek. It was translated into Latin, but the Latin translations were not as reliable as needed, marred by flawed Greek manuscripts, colloquial language, and other problems. Latin Old Testaments were not translated from the original Hebrew Scriptures, but from the Greek Septuagint, a pre-Christian Greek translation of Hebrew Scriptures which included additional, related texts. Furthermore, as the center of Christianity gradually shifted to Rome instead of Jerusalem, Latin became increasingly central, while fewer and fewer people read Greek. It thus became important to have a new, better, and authoritative translation.

Enter Jerome. Pope Damasus I appointed Jerome his private secretary in 382 A.D. Nearing forty years old and "the best equipped Christian scholar of his day," Jerome's linguistic, theological, and epistolary mastery made him an indispensable aid. As part of his effort to bring unity in the church, Damasus asked Jerome to write a new translation of Scripture from the most reliable manuscripts. Over the next few years he completed the gospels and the psalter. Five years later, perhaps in 390, he began to translate the Old Testament from the original Hebrew, disdaining the Greek Septuagint with its extra

texts. (He recognized the potential controversy: "with my eyes open I thrust my hand into the flame.") The result, completed c. 405, was the Latin Vulgate, the first complete translation of the Bible from the original languages.

The immediate reception of Jerome's work was not favorable. Religious conservatives won the day and the Old Latin texts, especially of the New Testament, continued to be used. But the Vulgate – with apocryphal texts included over Jerome's protest – gradually entered the life of the church, slowly over the ensuing centuries becoming the dominant translation. It was affirmed as the official Latin Bible of the Catholic Church in the mid-sixteenth century. For over a thousand years, even well into the twentieth century, the Vulgate was the dominant biblical text in the world.

One closing note: During his lifetime, this bookish, difficult man was equally disliked and appreciated. By the late Middle Ages, though, his reputation had been considerably polished. Renaissance scholars admired his elegance with language, his vast learning, his commitment to original sources, and his masterful ability to draw classical ideas into the Christian fold. And during the Reformation (1500s), Protestants sided with Jerome on the Old Testament canon and removed the books that were not in the Hebrew Scriptures. Jerome was a master translator, flawed, sometimes at war with himself, but giving to the Church a text and a model of translation greater than he (or Damasus) could have asked or imagined.



Documenting 20 Years of All Saints History

Every people has a history, a unique story to tell, and All Saints Anglican Church is certainly no exception. Scripture repeatedly commands God's people to remember his wondrous works on their behalf. In I Chronicles we read that we are to "remember the wondrous works He has done, his miracles and the judgments He uttered." And Joel 1:3 reminds us, "Tell your children of it, and let your children tell their children, and their children to another generation." This book is an effort to help us remember our remarkable history and all that God has done for us – how we came to be, how God blessed us along the way, and how he continues to bless us today.

When Jeff Garrety first came to me about twelve years ago with the suggestion that I should write a history of All Saints, enlisting the collaboration of Linda Hayes and Charles Richards, my first reaction was feeling honored that he would ask me to do this. My second reactions was a feeling that I would not be

able to undertake such a daunting task. It was a great idea, but best left to someone else to do. I had never before written a book and the prospect was somewhat intimidating. At the same time, though, there was a feeling of excitement at being able to share the wonderful story of All Saints' first twenty years.

The idea stayed with me and at times prodded me that I needed to get on with it, but it wasn't until the spring of 2022 that I felt a strong urging from the Holy Spirit that I should do this. I awoke one morning to a clear message, like a text message alert to my brain, about what the first several chapter headings of the book should be. I had not even been thinking about the book recently, so this really got my attention. I have learned that it is never good to ignore the Holy Spirit, and so it began.

This book is not a solo endeavor. I would not have been able to write any of this history without the

generous help of many people who provided documents, notes, letters, and conversations about the story of All Saints. To those people I am eternally grateful.
