Life is impossible without receiving. Each of us is born into this world receiving those things that enable us to survive and hopefully then to thrive. Food, water, shelter, clothing, care, encouragement, forgiveness, education, opportunity these are graces from God that must be received if we are to flourish as humans. We are blessed to receive.

And yet Jesus says, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." What? How does that work? Short of negating our need to receive, Jesus simply reminds us that it doesn't stop there. The Blessing Place at Brookdale

It's funny how God works: we begin with something small, and then God opens our eyes and hearts to a bigger need. Our journey to become "The Blessing Place at Brookdale" began with a Blessing Blast, something the All Saints Blessing Team does periodically for the community—head out with a handful of flowers, passing them out to those who work behalf of others with little recognition for their efforts.

On one particular day, the team of Jane Garrety, Joyce Heffernan, and I headed to Brookdale to bless those who worked among the residents of that retirement community. Touched by what she had experienced, the Activities Director (who already had been praying for help) asked, "Could you come and join us on a regular basis?" How could we say no?

And so it began: a handful of us joined their Wednesday afternoon Prayer and Praise time. After a few visits, the group asked that we focus on grief support in our time together. As we listened to their stories, we realized that the residents were struggling with profound loss and grief. This new focus has taken us into a new place: as our compassion has grown, we no longer "minister to" the residents as outsiders, rather we walk alongside them as sisters in Christ. We find ourselves encouraged even as we try to offer encouragement to the residents. Each time we are there we find more ways to bless and be blessed.

- We visit residents who are unable to get out.
- We provide scripture cards or flowers for the group to pass out to other residents.
- Sometimes after a casual hallway conversation we find ourselves speaking a blessing into the life of someone who needs to know that God cares.
- We look for ways to be encouragers. Upon hearing the Activities Director talk about the stress level among those working in the Memory Care Unit, we wrote notes of encouragement to each one. (Knowing the way God works, we are not surprised to hear that some received their note just when they needed it.)

Who knows where God is going to lead next! He is at work among the people of Brookdale and we are honored to be a part of it.



Invitation to Join 26 Healing Miracles Class

Dear All Saints,

I'd like to invite you to a course I'll be teaching through the Order of St. Luke on the 26 healing miracles of Christ. Both I and Deacon Terry have taken and taught this course several times, and we have found it to be of immense benefit to our understanding and practice of healing prayer. The class focuses on about two accounts of Christ's healing miracles each week which allows us lots of time to dive deep into the word and learn more about how we are called to emulate His example in our prayers for others. If you are like me, you may be tempted to think you've learned about all you can about these gospel stories, having heard them from childhood. But I urge you to join me as we sit at the feet of the Teacher once again. I promise he still has more to show us.

However, this class is not just an exercise in scholarship. We reserve some time each week to put into practice what we have learned by praying for one another and learning some practical ways to focus our attention on God so that His Spirit can work in us and through us. We are called to be hearers of the word, and doers also, and this course is designed to facilitate our development as healing prayer ministers in our churches and communities.

Here are the details. We will meet online via Microsoft Teams each Saturday afternoon from 2-4pm for fourteen weeks. We'll take off the Saturday after Thanksgiving and the Saturday after Christmas. So, the class runs from November 2 through Febuary 15. I will email the readings, questions, and supplemental material each week. The course is offered at no charge. Finally, for All Saints prayer team members, this course is a requirement, and many current members of the team have already taken it. You may wish to reach out to some of them to learn more about the course.

This year's theme is *Reaching Youth in the 21st Century*, with special guest speaker the Rev. Shojil Abraham, youth minister of the Northeast American Diocese of the Malankara Orthodox Syrian Church. Deacon Abraham has built a thriving youth ministry program for his diocese and now leads youth summer camps, retreat, college campus ministry, and other events from his diocese.

The Synod meets this year at Christ the King Anglican Church in Birmingham, AL on November 8–9, with pre-conference activities beginning on November 7. Fr. Wes, Fr. Kevin, Dn. Nan, and Dn. Terry will be attending as clergy from our church. Olivia Abernathy plans to attend as a staff member, and Stephanie Traylor as our Vestry-elected delegate. This year's synod will be special for All Saints as we will be officially seated as a church in the diocese.



Just One Thing

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

Gathering the range and complexity of life as Christians remains one of the great rewards of learning our pasts. Sometimes the reality of Christian faith is stark, bold, and prophetic: Bach and Augustine. Sometimes it is tumultuous and uncertain, more a matter of hope on the historian's part than on knowledge gained from evidence: Caravaggio comes to mind. Or a person's faith can be so hidden by mythology that the truth is hard see and what we see is hard to trust: Francis of Assisi.

Mozart had a complicated relationship with his era, his family, his church and himself. In the swirling negotiations of court, church, and family, where everything became stylized and theatrical, Mozart's Christian devotion was stylized and diplomatic, characterized by conventional rhetoric and behavior. Mozart's contemporaries, his historians, even his enthusiasts conclude that Mozart's commitment to the church was perfunctory, formal, duty-bound. He did not by any means have Bach's piety, zeal, or message.



One suspects from his music, though, that there was likely more truth and grace from God than could be spoken. What faith do we see in the otherwise conventional, calculating, anti-clerical, fun-loving life of Mozart? More than I have space for. As with Caravaggio's painting, the great thing is his music. Mozart was keenly aware that his musical talent was a gift which to deny would have been blasphemy. The Ave Verum Corpus, quickly written in the last year of his life (1791), remains one of his most moving and spiritually inspiring of his works. The twenty Masses were certainly not the work of a court jester and the Requiem Mass, written in response to his wife's death and anticipating his own, carries in the music hope of life that transcends death. For Mozart the music was a central response to God. Karl Barth put it this way in his Church Dogmatics: "he knew something about creation in its total goodness that neither the real fathers of the Church nor our Reformers . . . either know or can express." Barth heard in Mozart the "immanence of divine goodness in creation." And Lawrence Toppman,

art critic for *The Charlotte Observer*, noted that "every one of Mozart's mature operas is about forgiveness in the end."

What are we looking for when we look to the saints? Several things, perhaps, but especially signs of grace in another, given partly that we might be strengthened and give thanks to God. As Charles Williams wrote, "The altar must often be built in one place in order that the fire from heaven may descend somewhere else." So it is, I think, with Mozart: look for his faith less in his words or his life on stage, but mostly in his music. And let his joy, his delight, his awareness of the divine goodness in creation be what it is.

We expend a lot of energy trying to reach or maintain a stable plateau in life. If we could just reach that happy spot where life feels under control, where we're productive, prosperous, and able to avoid unwanted events or circumstances. Even in our spiritual life, we may strive toward some idealized state that once achieved, we'd finally be at peace with ourselves and God. Ahh, if life would just hold still!

But it doesn't. Seemingly out of nowhere comes the diagnosis, the downsize, the fractured relationship. elicit Life-stage changes new questions, evolving needs. Friends or family relocate, or we do, disrupting valued connections. People or institutions we've trusted fail us; places we once belonged no longer feel ours. The way we've seen things feels inadequate to explain or make meaningful the life we're now living. Practices that nurtured us have lost their glow; we feel adrift. Or maybe we're just tired of trying so hard but never hearing the internal "well done."

How are we to understand these seasons when the ground under our feet begins to shift? Are they undesired aberrations to avoid or graced invitations to transform, to find a deeper life in God? Author David Benner says that anything that provokes "significant internal conflict, a disruption of meaning and self-coherence, or a sense that our way of being in the world needs to change" holds the potential for deep transformation when "we move beyond simply trying to get back to how things were before the crisis."

An upcoming on-campus retreat, *Navigating Change with God*, will seek to provide a framework for understanding the hidden gifts in change and the signs of being on a threshold of transition. Renee Farkas brings twenty years of experience as a spiritual director to help create a space in which we can explore ourselves and God through silence, guided conversations, teaching, liturgical prayer, embodied practices, time in nature, and personal reflection. Enjoy the benefits of a go-away retreat while still being able to sleep in your own bed and without the hassles of travel. For survivors of domestic violence or sexual assault, life can feel like an inescapable nightmare. In the United States, nearly 1 in 4 women and 1 in 9 men experience sexual assault or intimate partner violence at some point in their lives. Every minute, an average of 20 people are physically abused by an intimate partner. The trauma these individuals endure often leaves them feeling trapped, ashamed, and without hope. What they need most is a safe place to turn and the loving support of a community that cares.

This is where WRAP (Wo/Men's Rape Assistance and Protection) comes in. WRAP offers comprehensive services designed to help survivors break free from abuse, rebuild their lives, and find safety and healing.
