Sermon Meditations: Children of the Promise

Monday

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 25:1-28; Romans 6:9; 1 Corinthians 15:50-57
- Meditation: Pastor Matt's first point was "Death: The Servant of God" After everything, Abraham died. But he died according to God's promise, in peace and at a good old age (Genesis 15:15). What does death mean for the believer? What does it mean for the unbeliever?

Tuesday

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 25:1-28; Romans 9:6-13
- Meditation: Pastor Matt's second point was "Division: The Children of God" So much division in these verses! There are clearly two kinds of people: Those who are a part of the Covenant people and those who aren't. Who is doing the dividing and why? To which do you belong and how do you know?

Wednesday

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 25:1-28; Genesis 3:15
- Meditation: Pastor Matt's third point was "Discord: The Enmity of God" There aren't just two kinds of people. These two don't dwell together in unity, but must be separated and experience conflict? Why is that? How does Genesis 3:15 shed light here? Where else in the Bible do we see conflict between God's people (or one of his people) and the offspring of the serpent?

- Read: Genesis 25:29-34
- Meditation: What questions do you have about this text? Is there anything confusing or curious? Does anything stand out as important?

- Read: Hebrews 25:29-34
- Meditation: Westminster Shorter Catechism Question 4 asks, "What do the Scriptures principally teach?" Answer: "The Scriptures principally teach what man is to believe concerning God and what duty God requires of man." What does this passage teach us about God's character and work? What does it teach us about our own hearts and need for a Savior and how we ought to live in the world as followers of Christ?
