Sermon Meditations: Satisfied with Too Little

Monday

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 25:29-26:5; Hebrews 12:15-17
- Meditation: Pastor Matt's first point was "The hopelessness of a temporal perspective." A temporal perspective only thinks of now – of this life. It does not know about, or it ignores, or it rejects the eternal perspective of God. When tempted to sin, someone who has a temporal perspective says, "Why not? I want it." What are some ways we are tempted to ignore the eternal truth God has given us?

Tuesday

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 25:29-26:5; Colossians 3:1-4
- Meditation: Pastor Matt's second point was "The promise of an eternal perspective." Someone who has an eternal perspective is trusting God's promises in this life and the next. When tempted, they should say, "Why would I offend Christ just for this? It isn't worth it!" What are some promises of God we are relying upon?
- Close in prayer

Wednesday

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 25:29-26:5; Romans 8:31-39; Revelation 21:1-4
- Meditation: Pastor Matt's third point was "The relentless faithfulness of our God." The person like Esau and the person like Jacob are different in one most important way: One believes God's promises will be kept. The other does not. But God has always shown himself faithful. What are some ways you see God keeping his promises to you and your family?

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Genesis 26:6-34
- Meditation: What questions do you have about this text? Is there anything confusing or curious? Does anything stand out as important?

Friday

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Hebrews 26:6-34
- Meditation: Westminster Shorter Catechism Question 4 asks, "What do the Scriptures principally teach?" Answer: "The Scriptures principally teach what man is to believe concerning God and what duty God requires of man." What does this passage teach us about God's character and work? What does it teach us about our own hearts and need for a Savior and how we ought to live in the world as followers of Christ?
