Monday

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 13:1-18
- Meditation: Our guest preacher's first point was "Abraham and Lot's Wealth." Lot looked with the eyes of the flesh and took what looked good to him. Abraham looked with spiritual eyes and believed what God promised him. How do things look different to us sometimes when we look with eyes of faith instead of eyes of the flesh?

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 33:1-20
- Meditation: His second point was "Abraham and Lot's Life". How were their lives different from this point on because of the decisions they made (Lot to take the best land and Abraham to trust God)? Does God intend good for us? Does he work that good, in part, through our obedience? When we are foolish or disobey, does it lead us into more trouble sometimes?

- Open in prayer
- Read: Genesis 33:1-20
- Meditation: His third point was "God's Faithfulness." Abraham trusted God and because of that trust, he was patient when it came to receiving the promises. If we are patient and trust God, will he be faithful to keep his promises?

- Meditation: What questions do you have about this text? Is there anything confusing or curious? Does anything stand out as important?

- Meditation: Westminster Shorter Catechism Question 4 asks, "What do the Scriptures principally teach?" Answer: "The Scriptures principally teach what man is to believe concerning God and what duty God requires of man." What does this passage teach us about God's character and work? What does it teach us about our own hearts and need for a Savior and how we ought to live in the world as followers of Christ?
