Instruction: Whatever time of day works best each day for you or your family, use the prompts below to spend a few minutes together in prayer and the Word. Open and close each session with a simple prayer. Use the questions for meditation or discussion.

Depravity on Display

Monday

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Judges 19:1-9, Romans 6:20-23
- Meditation: Pastor Nathan's first point on Sunday was, "Sin is Unfaithfulness." How does the wedding imagery in the Bible relate to our relationship with Christ? Paul says the wages of sin is death. How should this make us feel toward sin? How is the Levite's action in Judges 19:3 similar to the way Christ treats his bride, the Church?

Tuesday

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Genesis 4:1-4, 1 Peter 5:6-11
- Meditation: Pastor Nathan's second point on Sunday is that "Sin is not safe." Judges 19 paints a picture of just how wicked sin can be. What does Genesis 4:7 teach us about the closeness of sin to us? How should we be on guard against sin? 1 Peter 5 warns that Satan is looking for opportunities to destroy like a lion. How does Christ take on sin and our enemy in our place?

Wednesday

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Judges 19:30, 1 John 1:8-9
- Meditation: Pastor Nathan's last point on Sunday was, "Sin demands an answer." The people of Israel said they would consider sin, take counsel, and speak. How should we consider our sin? How does the Bible counsel us to deal with our sin? How does the Bible speak comfort to us in our sin?

- Read: Judges 20 (We will cover both passages Sunday but not read it in its entirety)
- Meditation: What questions do you have about this text? Is there anything confusing or curious? Does anything stand out as important?

- Read: Judges 21
- Meditation: Westminster Shorter Catechism Question 4 asks, "What do the Scriptures principally teach?"
 Answer: "The Scriptures principally teach what man is to believe concerning God and what duty God requires of man." What does this passage teach us about God's character and work? What does it teach us about our own hearts and need for a Savior?
