Key Passage to Memorize & Meditate Upon: 1 John 1:8-10 (LSB) If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us.⁹ If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.¹⁰ If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar and His word is not in us.
