Introduction

- * The average Christian approaches the Bible in one or two ways:
 - 1. Reading and interpreting it according to whatever they've always been taught
 - 2. Reading and interpreting it according to "what does it mean to me?"
- * The essential function of hermeneutics is the basic question, "do you understand what you are reading?" Acts 8:26-30

What is hermeneutics?

- * Hermeneutics (from the Greek word hermēneuō / ἑρμηνεύω which means to interpret or explain) is defined simply as the process of interpreting Scripture or determining the meaning of Scripture.
- * Luke 24:27 -- And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

Why is hermeneutics important?

- * Because we need (and should want) to handle the Scriptures accurately.
- * **2 Timothy 2:15** -- Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth.
- * There are three clear implications regarding hermeneutics in this verse:
 - 1. It takes **effort** in study (*do your best*)
 - 2. God's **approval** demands it (as one approved)
 - 3. It requires **competency** (no need to be ashamed) See **1 Timothy 1:6-7** Certain persons, by swerving from these, have wandered away into vain discussion, ⁷ desiring to be teachers of the law, without understanding either what they are saying or the things about which they make confident assertions.
 - 4. There is a **right** and **wrong** way to interpret Scripture
- * Examples of bad hermeneutics
 - 1. **3 John 2** the "prosperity gospel" interpretation
 - 2. **John 12:32** the "praise and worship" interpretation
 - 3. **Matthew 18:20** the "small-group/home church" interpretation
