HERE I STAND

Worship Is More than Sunday Morning

When we think of worship, we often picture what happens between 10:30 and 12:00 on a Sunday morning—music, preaching, prayer. But true worship reaches far beyond those 90 minutes. It's not something we simply show up for. It's something we prepare our hearts for.

In fact, the most overlooked aspect of any worship service is not the sermon or the songs—it's the spiritual readiness of the worshiper. Hebrews 10:22 offers a powerful call to worship: "Let us draw near with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water."

This verse gives us four spiritual reference points to examine before we come before God in worship.

Reference Point One: Sincerity

The verse starts by calling us to draw near "with a true heart." That means coming to God without pretense, distractions, or hidden agendas. A sincere heart is one that is fully focused on God and His glory.

It's easy to come to worship physically present but mentally elsewhere—thinking about lunch plans, family tensions, or just getting through the service. But God desires worshipers whose hearts are fully engaged. Worship without sincerity is not worship

Reference Point Two: Fidelity

We are also told to approach God "in full assurance of faith." The early Christians, especially those from Jewish backgrounds, were tempted to cling to old rituals and traditions. But faith in Christ meant letting go of those shadows and embracing the substance—Jesus.

We, too, must come with full trust in the gospel, not leaning on our habits, church attendance, or past experiences. True worship is anchored in confidence in the finished work of Christ

Reference Point Three: Humility

The phrase "having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience" reminds us that even though we are welcomed into God's presence, we don't come because we deserve to be there. We come by grace.

When we recognize the weight of our sin and the wonder of Christ's sacrifice, our worship becomes more than routine it becomes grateful, reverent, and real. Worship is not a performance; it's a humble offering.

Reference Point Four: Purity

Finally, Hebrews speaks of "our bodies washed with pure water." This isn't about physical cleanliness but spiritual renewal. Though we've been cleansed once for all by Christ's blood, our daily walk through the world leaves us dusty. We need regular confession and repentance to stay spiritually

Think of it this way: you wouldn't wear muddy shoes into a friend's clean home. In the same way, we shouldn't enter worship without first allowing God to wash away what we've picked up during the week.

Preparing Our Hearts

Each week, our worship team prepares. The pastor prepares. Those leading in prayer or announcements prepare. But none of that matters if we, the people, arrive unprepared

The good news? God invites us to draw near. When we come with sincerity, confidence in Christ, humility, and a desire for purity, He meets us there. Worship becomes more than a service. It becomes transformative.

So next Sunday, don't just show up. Prepare. Because worship is not just something we do-it's a response to the God who loved us first.





Tending the Flock

A Medal for Not Meddling

"Whoever meddles in a quarrel not his own is like one who takes a passing dog by the ears."

- Proverbs 26:17

As Christians we have the privilege of living our lives *together* in the local church. God calls us to live in community for purposes of encouragement (I Thes. 5:11), discipleship (Acts 2:42), accountability (James 5:19-20), support (Gal. 6:2), and service (Heb. 10:24). In any large group, however, individuals eventually come into conflict. Sadly the church is no exception.

Countless books and articles have been written on resolving quarrels according to biblical principles. Some Christians have even started reconciliation businesses, offering the services of "certified reconcilers" (for a small fee, of course). But here I would like to highlight the danger of carelessly getting involved in other people's disputes.

In Proverbs 26:17 Solomon observed that meddling in someone else's quarrel is like taking a "dog by the ears." Even a good-natured dog will lash out if grabbed by the ears, likely hurting both the person who seized him and anyone nearby. Similarly we can cause immense harm by inserting ourselves into a dispute which does not concern us.

So before jumping in, be sure to **pray for discernment** about the situation (James 1:5) and **assess whether scripture supports your actions** (Ps. 119:105). When determining whether and how to help others resolve a conflict, ask yourself the following questions.

First, "Do I understand the **root cause** of the quarrel?" Believers may subconsciously "elevate" their disagreements by presenting them as arguments over biblical truth (II Tim. 4:2) when they actually flow from fleshly passions (James 4:1). An outsider might therefore have difficulty nailing down what a dispute is really about. And even after identifying the cause of the controversy, the naive observer may still "choose sides" based on incomplete information. As Proverbs 18:17 reminds us, "The one who states his case first seems right, until the other comes and examines him."

Second, "What is **my motivation** for getting involved?" In a genuine dispute over

orthodoxy, you may have a role to play. But this only applies if the party in error is seeking God's truth in good faith, such as Priscilla and Aquila instructing Apollos "more accurately" in the way of God (Acts 18:24-28). People who intentionally sow division, however, should simply be avoided and kept away from the church (Rom. 16:17, Gal. 1:9, Titus 3:10-11).

And with any personal conflicts, be on your guard against temptations to gossip (Prov. 26:22). Even in the New Testament church, "gossips and busybodies" were a problem (I Tim. 5:13). Yet just as quarrels are fed by gossip, ceasing to gossip helps bring them to a close. Consider Proverbs 26:20, "For lack of wood the fire goes out, and where there is no whisperer, quarreling ceases."

And finally, "Am I **prolonging the quarrel** by reminding the parties of the original offense?" Too often I have seen the process of reconciliation thrown into reverse by an outsider insisting that one party in a dispute was "getting off too easy." This is especially dangerous when the conflict stems from offensive or misunderstood words, for which no specific restitution can be made.

We may apologize for, contextualize, rephrase, or retract our words. But we can never un-say them. So reminding an offended brother of the things said to him simply creates obstacles to forgiveness. As Solomon noted in Proverbs 17:9, "Whoever covers an offense seeks love, but he who repeats a matter separates close friends."

For these reasons and more, scripture teaches us to refrain from meddling in other people's quarrels. Although the temptation to barge in may be great, we are better off praying for those involved and encouraging their reconciliation (Phil. 4:2-3) rather than joining the argument. By doing so we will demonstrate that love for one another which is powerful evidence that we are disciples of Christ (John 13:35).
