

### Noah and the PNG Fuel Crisis

Note from Ellyn Roe: The Harder family supplied the Press with the following news brief from Ethnos 360, the Missions organization running the Papua New Guinea Interface Program that Noah Harder hopes to attend this spring. (See the March 2024 Press.) The April Press was published prior to the April 1st decision date for Ethnos 360 to either go forward with this year's Interface, or to cancel it due to the fuel shortage. Ethnos 360 assures that donations will be returned to those who have given financially toward Noah's trip if this year's trip is canceled. Noah is primed and eager to go THIS year (May of 2024) and will be super disappointed if he has to wait until 2025. Please pray accordingly!

The fuel shortage in Papua New Guinea is ongoing, yet despite having to significantly limit flights for our missions, there is still good news. After a few uncertain weeks, diesel and petrol fuel has continued to be supplied throughout the country. This allows the generators, vehicles, and things needed for daily life on most of our centers to be able to continue as normal. However, the supply of Jet-A fuel for our Kodiak planes and helicopters has been cut off and we are now operating on what remains of our stock. Commercial airlines have navigated some short-term solutions from the capital city to continue many of their flights. This helps maintain some stability in the country and gives some options for travel to our missionaries. As good as that is, it does not help our teams working in remote areas of the country who are reliant on our aviation team.

To face the situation as wisely as possible, our aviation team has ordered a container of Jet-A fuel drums from New Zealand. When it arrives (in a month or more), it will give us a bit more capacity for necessary flights. In the meantime, with our remaining Jet-A fuel, only strategic flights are being flown and more of our teams are needing to come out of their remote locations to wait out the shortage and avoid other potential concerns. While this changes many of our plans, we are still trusting in our Lord whose plans are far better.

- The container to arrive from New Zealand in a timely manner.
- The extra expenses that are accumulating with the situation.
- The missionary teams who have had to cancel consultant trips, breaks, and supply runs or have had to relocate to one of the centers for a time.

POST SCRIPT from Ethnos 360/New Tribes (received a few days after this article was formatted):

There have been some significant improvements for our Jet-A fuel situation in PNG in recent days. Most of our out-stations have been granted access to fuel again and our main center is in the process of securing fuel through drums and a shared bulk order. For the time being operations can resume, at least for a few months. Thank you for praying and please continue to do so as the next few months are tentative as negotiations between the company, banks, and government continue toward a more permanent solution.

BREAKING NEWS: Word was received on March 22 that Noah can take his Interface trip this spring! Woo hoo!!

# **Experiencing Our Only Comfort**

One of my favorite songs at BPC is "Christ Our Hope in Life and Death." The song was taken from The Heidelberg Catechism, written in 1563 by Prince-Elector Friedrich II von der Pfalz. The first edition of the catechism was titled "Catechism or Christian

instruction, as practiced in the Churches and schools of the Electoral Palatinate."

may live and die happily? The song is based — The Heidelberg Catechism on the first question and answer in the catechism, which asks, What is your only comfort in life and death? The answer is in all that God, through Christ, has done for us by assuring us of eternal life.

I want to acquaint you with the catechism's second question. "How many things are necessary for you to know that in this comfort, you may live and die happily? The answer includes three things:

- 1. We must know the greatness of our sin and misery. Romans 5:12 teaches us that sin brought death into the world, and death spread to everyone because everyone sinned. But sin does not only bring death, it brings misery. The apostle Paul experienced the misery of sin when he wrote, "Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from the body of this death?" (Rom. 7:24).
- 2. We must know that we are redeemed from all our sins and misery. After Paul's frustrated outburst in Romans 7:24, he continued, "Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, on the one hand I myself with my mind am serving the law of God, but on the other, with my flesh the

law of sin. Therefore there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death" (Rom. 7:25-8:2). Although the consequence

> of sin is death, through faith in Jesus Christ, we are freed from death and are seated with Christ in the heavenly places (Eph. 2:4-6).

3. We are to be thankful to God for such redemption. Ephesians 1:7 teaches, "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our transgressions, according to the riches of His grace." Remember that we have been set free from our bondage to sin. Galatians 5:1 teaches, "It was for freedom that Christ set us free. Therefore, stand firm and do not be subject again to a yoke of slavery." Our pursuit for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus is not only a moving toward our Lord, it is also fleeing from sin and self-centeredness. 2 Peter 1:3-11 teaches that there is a direct relationship between our discipline for godliness and our assurance of salvation. If one lives for himself, he will forget that he was bought with a price, having become a joint-heir with Christ Himself.

Christ is our hope in life and death, but if we do not live for Christ, we will fear death even though our eternal position is secure. May we follow hard after Christ, shun sin, and discipline ourselves so that when faced with death, we can say with Paul, "For to me to live is Christ and to die is gain" (Phil. 1:21).

# What's the Deal with the Nominating Committee?

It's that wonderful time of year again! No, not Christmas, not Spring Training, not March Madness, but time for the Nominating Committee to begin coming to life. So, what's the big deal about the Nominating Committee? In short, the Nominating Committee is tasked with proposing a list of people who will serve as leaders in the different offices of the church.

### Who Is on the Nominating Committee?

In order to ensure that the best qualified candidates for officers are chosen, there are safeguards in the process which do not allow any one person or group to control the decision of who become our church officers. The Nominating Committee is the driver of the process and is tasked with bringing forth a slate of biblically-qualified candidates for election as Elder, Deacon, Deaconess, and Trustee.

The Nominating Committee is made up of two elders (one who chairs the committee), one person from each of the Boards of Deacons, Deaconesses, and Trustees, and up to six members from the congregation at large. The membership goal is to have a good cross-section of the congregation represented (a good mix of men and women as well as various ages). To serve on the Nominating Committee you must be a member of the church. There is a limit to serving no more than two consecutive years and two people from the same household cannot serve together at the same time. Once volunteers have agreed to serve on the committee, the list compiled by the chairman is presented to the congregation for approval.

### What is Expected?

You might be wondering what is expected of those serving on the Nominating Committee. Usually the committee meets just two or three times. During those meetings the process is discussed and biblical qualifications are reviewed so that everyone has a good understanding. It is critical to the process that the biblical qualifications are prioritized over all other considerations.

The main scripture passages that are reviewed and discussed include the following:

- elders 1 Timothy 3:1-7, 1 Peter 5:1-3, and Titus 1:5-9.
- deacons and deaconess –
  1 Timothy 3:8-13 and Acts 6:3.
- trustees as well as the other offices Mark 10:42-45, Philippians 2:1-4, and 1 Peter 5:5-6.

Once the process is explained and biblical qualifications discussed, the committee then begins gathering names and through a very secret voting process a list of candidates is formed for each of the offices. (You have to join the committee to find out the process.) The list is sent to the elders for review to make sure there are no concerns that the committee may not know about.

### How Is the Slate of Officers Determined?

The elders, deacon, deaconess, and trustee on the committee then begin to contact the people on the list for their prospective office. The committee does not meet again unless there is a need for more people to be asked to serve. Once a slate of candidates for each office is complete, it goes to the congregation for final approval.

So, what do you think? Does this sound like a way you might serve the body of Christ? If so, let me know, or reach out to any of the other elders, or call the church office. Let us know that you would like to serve on the very important Nominating Committee.




