

Montana and South Dakota Green Lights From God

We appreciate these opportunities to stay connected with BPC. You'll recall that our focus is to share the gospel with Native American students at Montana State University and to help them learn to be followers of Jesus.

The second semester started on January 22. Our "nations" evenings meetings are held at the Native American Hall (a building dedicated to the success of Indian students). What do we do these evenings? We eat together, play games, and have a time teaching from the Scriptures. These times are remarkable. The attention and respect given never cease to amaze us. Some are Christians, most are not. Please pray for continued favor with the Native students and faculty. Pray that we will be crystal clear with the gospel and biblical teaching and that times of deeper engagement come out of these "Nations" meetings.

We were at the yearly "Would Jesus Eat Frybread Conference" in Black Hills, South Dakota in early November. The various speakers at this Christ-centered gathering were organized by two native leaders, one from Bismarck, ND, and the other from South Dakota. Their message was spot-on about

how lives are transformed in Jesus even with all the historical trauma of the past. Leon Leadingfighter and Bobby Grayeagle were tremendous at organizing this gathering. Montana had about 20 students attend and there were about 15 from the Dakotas. A family from Phoenix, AZ, was also present. This group was smaller than in other years but very influential. This is one of our most effective outreaches to our students at MSU.

As mentioned, our main focus is to share the Gospel in relational ways. The most personal way to connect is by setting a time with students to listen and talk. For example, Debbie has met with two girls separately on particular Friday mornings. We appreciate prayer for these times. Ask God to help them in their walk with Him. We want to be available to let God use us as He sees fit.

Tim asks for God to use him as he shares stories from the Bible. He also attends a Bible Study that a young Native leads at MSU.

God has given us amazing opportunities to be openly Christian in the Native student body. We are sure that prayer has given us this green light which is so unusual in a public university.

Please pray for more students to commit to walking with the Lord.

HERE I STAND

As You Go...

In our current cultural context, keeping our heads down and trying not to make eye contact with the seemingly hostile world around us is tempting. For many, staying in the Christian bubble of support and encouragement is more desirable than putting ourselves on the line for the gospel's sake. But is a head-in-the-sand mentality helpful, cooperative, and obedient?

The words "Onward Christian Soldiers" ring in our ears and may present the mistaken assumption that evangelism and outreach are like going to war. And in a world with enough conflict, hostilities, and war, who wants to add more? It makes little sense to pick a fight with people when ignoring them is so much easier. Consequently, outreach is the last thing we think about while out and about in our daily travels.

I want to suggest that our call to outreach is not picking a fight with hostile people, but it does mean that we are salt and light in the world. Let's break down a few verses informing us of our commission from the Lord and giving us hope.

In Matthew 28:19-20, Jesus said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to keep all that I commanded you; and behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Jesus's command that the apostles make disciples is part of what the apostles were to teach those who believe. So, their command is our command. Making disciples means that we present the world with the opportunity to become followers and learners of Jesus. Notably, the word "go" is an aorist participle (simple past tense), which, when translated, means "Having gone." We have already gone out, traveled, or conducted our lives away from home. Most every day, we go somewhere into a vast population of those who are not currently followers of Jesus. A more precise look at what Jesus means is given to us by the apostle Paul.

More precisely, the making of disciples is the work of an ambassador; 2 Corinthians 5:18-20 states, "Now all these things are from God, who reconciled us to Himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation, namely, that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not counting

their transgressions against them, and He has committed to us the word of reconciliation. So then, we are ambassadors for Christ, as God is pleading through us. We beg you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." Consider the following essential elements in this passage:

- God gave us the ministry of reconciliation this is not a ministry of warfare or hostility; instead, it is a ministry that seeks to establish friendly relations. The good news is that through faith in Christ, people no longer have to be at odds with God. Part and parcel of reconciliation are grace, forgiveness, and friendship.
- God has already done the work of reconciling the world to Himself through Jesus Christ hence, the central figure of the gospel is Jesus. We are not sent with a message of do's and don'ts; we get to spread the message of done. That is to say that the forensic issues of debt and its payment for sin have already been done.
- We are ambassadors for Christ our role in evangelism is to represent God, who worked out the stipulations of our transfer out of the domain of darkness and into the kingdom of His beloved Son. We can declare to others that God issues them an invitation that, if accepted, will normalize relations with the King of kings and Lord of lords, the most powerful being in all the universe. It is not a confab leading to war; instead, it is a harbinger of eternal peace.

You are an ambassador as you go out each day, see your neighbors, meet up with friends, spend time with family, or go to work with colleagues. Never forget who you are and the great news you have been commissioned to deliver.

If we are faithful to our Lord, we will deliver the message. It may be a simple invitation to join you for church service, where they will hear the good news through song, reading, and the proclamation of God's word. Or, if the opportunity presents itself, you may have the privilege of delivering the entire message yourself. Either way, be faithful to proclaim and leave the results up to God. It's the best commission ever given; won't you join the team today?

Tending the Flock

Why Do Christians Die?

I remember driving home from the hospital on January 2, 2019, after being told I had kidney cancer. Many thoughts were swirling through my head. I can remember one of them being, "Good thing I kept paying those life insurance premiums." Grin.

Of course, death comes for all. Hebrews 9:27 reminds us that "... it is appointed for men to die...." Job, in the first verse of chapter 4 of the book named after him states, "Man, who is born of woman, is short-lived and full of turmoil" and continues in verse 5 saying, "Since his days are determined, the number of his months is with You; And his limits You have set so that he cannot pass." And our experience confirms this, especially in this church body over the last five years. Therefore, it is important that we make sure to take a biblical view of death; important primarily in that the biblical view is true, and equally important in that the assurance of our eternal hope provides comfort today.

For the last few months, Adult Sunday School has been going through the video series "Facing the Last Enemy: Death and the Christian." It is a fantastic series and I wish I could be successful in encouraging all in our church to review it, as it encourages us to think correctly and confidently about death with regard to ourselves, our immediate families, and our church body.

One of the many subjects we have discussed is what Scripture says about death for the believer. And one of the many interesting and comforting truths we discussed is that Christ has transformed death for the believer in two ways: He both removes something from death and adds something to death. And this makes all the difference.

What is removed from the death of a

believer? The judicial sentence from a Holy God, which ushers in eternal separation from God and additional eternal torment. These are the ultimate wages of sin, never to be experienced by those clothed in Christ's righteousness. We will be delivered from death at the Last Day. Judgment was dealt with on the cross, so it is nowhere in sight at the death of a believer, which causes Paul to triumphantly ask the rhetorical question in I Corinthians 15:55, "Oh death where is your sting?"

While what is removed from our death is fantastic, it is no more fantastic than what is added to the death of a believer. Since death will not be a devastating judicial sentence, the believer will be freed from the presence and influence of sin and its tragic effects to the body and to relationships. But the eternal upgrade doesn't stop there. Believers will experience death in this way: their souls will be separated from their mortal bodies and will immediately be found in the comfort and presence of Jesus Christ. And when Jesus Christ comes back to earth to establish his earthly kingdom, He will fit us with glorified bodies, perfected for His Glory as we rule with Him and worship Him.

Therefore, while death <u>is not good</u>, death <u>is for our good</u>. That is why Christians die, because a loving Father does not plan to leave us adrift. This is His unalterable plan to bring us to Himself.

So, we need to continually remind ourselves that we are just passing through this world. It is like going on a trip somewhere important; it is good to be there to faithfully accomplish the purpose of that trip. But there is a sense of grateful anticipation when you are finally headed Home. And there is no place like Home.
