"A New Beginning" MATTHEW 1:1-17 CHRIS BLACKMAN

Key Truth: God's plan for the world is to make all things new through His son Jesus the Messiah.

O: How many of you wish you could hit the 'restart' button on the year 2020? Or go ahead and begin 2021 already?

I. Our New Beginning Through God's Fulfilled Promises (V1)

Q: What is the hardest part about waiting?

"God has a two-thousand year long perspective on the way he will keep his promises. Therefore we need to learn not to insist that he will keep his promises to us in our way, at our beckon call, in our time, and, preferably, now." Sinclair Ferguson Matthew

II. Our New Hope For Christ's Uncommon Family (V2-17)

O: How have you lost hope that Jesus can renew broken relationships in your family?

"The very first words of the book in its original Greek text, Biblios geneseos (Literally, 'book of genesis'), are reminiscent of the first book of the Bible... This imitation of Genesis suggests that Matthew (like John, see John 1:1) is announcing a new Genesis, a new beginning, a new creation. The Old Testament had promised this (see Isaiah 65:17-25). The New Testament will close with the same announcement: 'Behold, I am making all things new' (Rev. 21:5)... Is it really possible that all things can be made new? Can our lives be made new? Can the world be made new? Matthew and the New Testament answer these questions with an unequivocal 'Yes!"
