Jesus Came to Save

Proclamation Life Groups; Week of Sunday, March 1, 2015; Steve Thiel

At the beginning of John 4, Jesus leaves Judea for Galilee because of the Pharisees and verse 4 says, "He had to pass through Samaria". And first glance, it appears that Jesus is afraid of the Pharisees. But as the story unfolds, it's clear that Jesus had a divine appointment with a Samaritan woman at a well. In John 3, Jesus spoke with Nicodemus, well respected, theologically educated, powerful, orthodox Pharisee. Now, He's interacting with an unschooled, heretical, lowly and despised, serial adulteress. Why? Because Jesus came on a mission to save people from their sins.

I. <u>Jesus is the Living Water – Read John 4:1-15 and answer the following questions</u>

- A. After reading verses 1-6, why do you think Jesus left Judea for Galilee?
- B. Why do you think Jesus "had to pass through Samaria" (v.4)?
- C. How is Jesus being graciously relational by interacting with the woman at the well?
- D. How did the woman misunderstand what Jesus said in verses 10-15?
- E. In what ways are you relationally judgmental when it comes to sharing the gospel with people?

II. Jesus is the Messiah – Read John 4:16-26 and answer the following questions

- A. Why do you think Jesus told the woman to go and call her husband to come to the well?
- B. How is the woman's response that "I have no husband" both truthful and yet misleading?
- C. In your own words, what does it mean to worship God "in spirit and truth"?
- D. In these verses, how has Jesus shown Himself to be the true prophet, temple, and Messiah?

III. Jesus is the Savior of the World – Read John 4:27-42 and answer the following questions

- A. What was the woman's response to her interaction with Jesus? What did she go and do?
- B. How is doing God's will like physical food (v.34)?
- C. What does Jesus mean when He says, "the fields are white for harvest"?
- D. How would you like to see yourself grow in "sowing and reaping"? What steps can you take?
