The Dividends and Drawbacks of Small Groups



The term "small group" (or its many variations) can mean different things to different people. Some envision small groups to be places where believers share meals with one another and serve together, while others understand them to be places of discipleship, spiritual growth, and communal support. Understanding the nature of small groups is essential to understanding the potential dividends and drawbacks in the life of a local church. Recognizing the dividends and drawbacks will help a congregation navigate the purpose of small groups and its members' involvement in them.

In his book, *Outgrowing the Ingrown Church*, Jack Miller set out *four* basic small group models—the

growth model, the healing model, the worker (i.e., service) model, and the missionary model. The growth model views a small group as existing primarily for the spiritual growth of the members; the healing model is a place of transparency, support, and care for the members; the worker model is a place where service is encouraged and carried out by the members of the group; and the missionary model is a place to fuel evangelism among members of the group. Miller pointed out the strengths and weaknesses of each of these models as they stand on their own. He then argued for something of a synthesizing of the various beneficial aspects of all four models. Whatever else may be said, this much we can be sure of: There will always be dividends and drawbacks to whatever approach a church takes with regard to small groups. Here are several dividends and drawbacks to small groups that we should keep in mind as we introduce them to the life of our congregation:

Small Groups should encourage greater commitment to the Lord's Day gatherings in the life of a church. A small group should serve as a springboard to propel the members to be committed to Sunday school and morning and evening worship. Small group facilitators should be encouraging the group wisely, lovingly and regularly to fulfill their vows to regularly attend Lord's Day services. If the small group is functioning as it should, the members should be seeking to carry out the "one another" passages of the New Testament. We meet together in order to "exhort one another daily" and not to forsake the assembling of ourselves together (Heb. 10:24). When members begin to slide away from regular worship, members of the small group of which they are a part should reach out and see how they can best to encourage them in a gentle and loving way.

Of course, letting your small group become a replacement for corporate worship is an all too common problem in churches. People can get excited about getting together with their small group, but not about coming together to worship the Lord with all His people on the Lord's Day. Scripture requires us to worship together on the Lord's Day (Heb. 10:24), not to meet in midweek small groups. I have met many individuals who attend other churches who have said to me, "Our small group is really our church." The facilitators and members of a small group should seek to discourage this potential drawback when they see it beginning to occur in the lives of members of the group.

Small Groups should encourage close spiritual friendships. People only have so much time in a week and can only sustain so many close friendships in their lives. Small groups encourage people in the church to form close friendships with each other, to pray for one another, to serve one another in our daily needs and to build each other

up on a week to week basis. Having many people in a larger setting can foster surface conversations and relationships. Small groups can be a catalyst to forming deeper relationships among members of the congregation. One danger related to the forming of friendships in a small group is that it may begin to devolve into a clique. One very real danger of small groups is that they can become cliques that exist in the gathered assembly on the Lord's Day. This is especially likely to happen if the members of the small group are of a similar age demographic or stage of life. Living in close community with one another on a week-in and week-out basis can hinder people from pressing outward to fellowship with the other members of the body on Sunday and throughout the week. We must guard against allowing this to happen. Helping the members of a small group be self-aware of this danger is imperative.

Additionally, a small group can become arenas for harmful schism and division. They can become a place that fosters complaining, gossip, slander and even divisive factions. This is a heart issue; but it can more easily multiply in smaller settings where a problematic individual thinks that he or she will be able to sway others to join them in their discontentment. If they succeed, the damage can be irreparable. Small group facilitators and members should be warned about such a danger. The Scriptures teach us that one of the seven things that the Lord hates is "one who sows discord among brethren" (Proverbs 6:19).

- Small Groups should encourage prayer in the life of the church. Legion are the number of men who I hear bemoan the fact that the weekly prayer meeting is the least frequented meeting in the life of the church. If a local church builds the practice of prayer into every small group, the majority of the people in the church will be praying together on an ongoing basis. Small group facilitators should be trained to lead a time of prayer with the members of the group. I have found that people are more comfortable praying out loud in a small group setting than they are in a larger corporate gathering. Additionally, small groups can be a setting in which members may be more apt to share prayer requests that they might be hesitant to share in a larger setting.
- \* Small Groups should encourage indiscriminate care for others in the church. In a church larger than 100-120 members, knowledge of the needs of the congregants on the whole becomes increasingly difficult. The larger the church, the easier it is for relationships to form with people who are similar in age and interest. Small groups that are arranged by geographical locations can help put members of a church together who might not otherwise get to know and deeply care for one another. Small groups can help the members of the church keep each other informed as to the prayer needs and material needs of members of the church. It is far easier to keep up with the needs of the members of a church through small groups.

An accompanying danger to this care dynamic is that a small group can be used as therapy sessions for self-focused individuals. If an individual longs to be part of a small group for "healing" purposes, this can easily become a negative thing for that individual and all involved. People can monopolize a small group by constantly venting their problems and complaints. There are always those who take great comfort in continually talking about their problems while never really pursuing change. Though small groups should be places of transparency and healing, they can also become counseling centers in an unhealthy and damaging way.

Small Groups should encourage outreach and service in the church and the community. Because there are less voices in a small group, there can often be more unification and easier mobilization for outreach and service. Miller explained that "small groups are ideal for outreach. They form natural teams for evangelism if they are properly prepared and understand how to do this work." Additionally, small groups can be good places to bring unbelieving co-workers, neighbors, and friends—especially if there is a meal and Gospel-centered teaching.

There is, however, a drawback to a small group focusing on outreach and service in that the members may start to neglect the spiritual disciplines of prayer, reading God's word, and regularly attending gathered worship on the Lord's Day. Without caring for the spiritual needs of our souls, we run the risk of becoming anxious and frustrated in our service (Luke 10:38–42). This puts us in a place where we are of no real spiritual benefit to others.

As we add small groups to the life of our congregation, please commit to praying together that we will experience the *dividends* of gathering together in these groups, and that the Lord will protect our congregation from the *drawbacks* of such groups. It is our sincere expectation that these will help foster the spiritual growth, health, service, and mission of the members of our church.

#### Audio/Video

This year, the Food/Fellowship Committee hosted the Vision Banquet—an annual fellowship meal to celebrate the Lord's faithfulness and to review the plans for the year ahead. They also hosted a fellowship meal in April.

The Food & Fellowship Committee is planning an ice cream social in the early fall and a fellowship meal in the late fall. They are also finding new venues for us to use for events as our congregation grows and are developing ideas for further fellowship events.

Last year, Church Creek PCA began supporting Aaron Halbert. Aaron is a graduate of Reformed Theological Seminary in Jackson, MS.
