Study Questions

What the Worlds Wants, Pt 2 Galatians 5:16-24

- 1) **READ** the lyrics to the songs on page three (3) of this study guide. What theme(s) clearly come out from those words? Do you think these lyrics are a reflection of a time past or are they still just as reflective of people today? Make a list of the things you think the world wants. The human race has been around for a long time. Why are these things so fleeing?
- 2) **READ** Galatians 5:19-23. How do we know whether we are operating in the fruit of the Spirit or in the works of the flesh? Is it possible for a believer to walk according to the flesh? How does Galatians 5:24 instruct believers to deal with the issues of the flesh? How then do we do this? Why are the issues of the flesh so challenging?
- 3) The last study questions dealt with the conjunction "but." State again how the section beginning with verse 16 is connected to the beginning of Galatians 5. **READ** Galatians 5:1-15. Paul mentions, "For freedom Christ has set us free…" (v. 1). According to our passage, not general thought, what has Christ set us free from? Having discovered that answer what problems do we see developing in this chapter with believers? What is the connection between those problems and the point that is being made in Galatians 5:16-24?
- 4) In Part 1, the first message, you were asked to categorize Galatians 5:19-21. Of those categories which ones deal with our interpersonal relationships with one another? Is there any connection between Galatians 5:19-23 and 1 Timothy 3:7-13? Why is character and holiness so important to the Lord? How often do you monitor these areas in your life?
- 5) In this message (Part 2) it was stated, "What the world wants is what Christians are supposed to have already but some don't." Is it true that some Christians don't have the fruit of the Spirit? Do all believers have the Spirit (cf. John 14:17, Romans 8:9 and Ephesians 1:13-14)? If you stated all believers do have the Spirit then how do you explain the absence of the Spirit's work

- in some of their lives? If you stated that not all believers have the Spirit then how would you explain John 14:17, Romans 8:9 and Ephesians 1:13-14?
- 6) It was stated that "walking by the Spirit" is an active choice which we must do on a habitual or continual basis. The same was said about the "desires of the flesh." As an unbeliever it's clear we walked solely in the flesh. Believers, on the other hand, are supposed to solely in the Spirit. In what ways (give specific examples) that people walk in the Spirit and in what way do people habitually walk in the flesh?
