Assurance of Salvation:

Intro: Assurance is for believers

- I. Definition of Faith belief that the promises God made to me are real
 - 3 components to saving faith:
 - 1. An understanding of facts
 - 2. An intellectual agreement with the facts
 - 3. Personal trust in the facts
- II. Definition of Assurance Assurance is the humble and joyful confidence a believer has that he is irrevocably a child of God and has eternal life.

Difference between Faith and Assurance: Faith is the root and assurance is the flower. Doubtless you can never have the flower without the root; but it is no less certain you may have the root and not the flower.

Objective Assurance:

God uses two instruments for objective assurance: 1. His Word 2. The Holy Spirit Test your assurance:

- 1. Who is Jesus?
- 2. What did Jesus do to save us?
- 3. <u>How is a person saved by what Jesus Christ did?</u>
- 4. <u>How does a person respond to Jesus Christ when they are</u> <u>born again?</u>

Subjective Assurance:

Lacking in the pursuit of holiness – therefore assurance is not known

Characteristics of Assurance:

- 1. Assurance is founded upon God, His Son, Holy Spirit, and the Word.
- 2. Assurance is given to all believers, but believers can lack assurance at times.
- 3. Assurance is fostered by sanctification, not mere profession.
- 4. Assurance often grows in trials/discipline, not just the joy of blessing.
