

## **Dover Daily Devotionals:**

The Sunday sermon concluded the series on Joseph, emphasizing the themes of providence and forgiveness. The closing prayer expressed gratitude for the timeless truths in Joseph's story and sought guidance in emulating his faith and forgiveness.

## Monday: From Humiliation to Exaltation

Scripture: Genesis 41:38-40

#### Discussion:

## Tuesday: Testing and Transformation

Scripture: Genesis 42:8-17, 25

In their desperation, the brothers unknowingly undergo a process of self-discovery and transformation. Through the tests, Joseph not only reveals the truth about their alleged younger brother but also allows them to experience the weight of false accusations and imprisonment, mirroring his own past.

Joseph's testing of his brothers reflects the transformative power of challenges and trials. In our own journeys, God often allows tests that refine and shape our

character. The brothers' experiences echo the redemptive work God desires to accomplish in our lives through trials. Like them, we may face situations that reveal our true selves, providing an opportunity for repentance, growth, and ultimately transformation.

### **Discussion Questions:**
