In this week's sermon, we talked about the Parable of the Lost Son from Luke 15 in this week's sermon. The parable teaches us about forgiveness, reconciliation, and God's endless grace. Monday: The Father's Heart

Scripture:

Luke 15:1-32

Devotional:

The Parable of the Lost Son in Luke 15 is a powerful story that depicts the heart of God for His lost children and God's joy over the repentance and return of a lost sinner. Scripture:

Wednesday: Recognizing Our Lostness

Scripture:

Luke 15:17

Devotional:

Thursday: The Father's Unconditional Love

Scripture:

Luke 15:20

Devotional:

Friday: The Joy of Being Found

Scripture:

Luke 15:24

Saturday: The Elder Brother's Heart

Scripture:

Luke 15:25-32

Devotional:

This reaction provides a stark contrast to the father's joyous and forgiving welcome. The elder brother, despite his outward obedience and proximity to the father, harbors a heart distant from the father's grace and compassion. This narrative invites us to examine our own reactions to the redemption of others. This part of the parable serves as a mirror, reflecting our own need to understand and embrace the depth of God's grace, not just for ourselves, but for all.

Reflection Questions

1. Can you recall a time when you resonated more with the elder brother's attitude than the father's?

2. What does the elder brother's response teach you about grace and forgiveness?

3. How can you cultivate a heart that rejoices in the redemption and forgiveness of others?
