Leah likewise and her children drew near and bowed down. And last Joseph and Rachel drew near, and they bowed down” - Genesis 33:5-7, ESV

Devotional:

The moment when Jacob introduced his family to Esau is a reminder of the preciousness of family and the truth that children are indeed a blessing from the Lord. In that powerful encounter, Jacob declared his loved ones as God's gracious gift. Thursday: "The Shift in Perspective"

See to it that no one fails to obtain the grace of God; that no “root of bitterness” springs up and causes trouble, and by it many become defiled; that no one is sexually immoral or unholy like Esau, who sold his birthright for a single meal. - Hebrews 12:16, ESV

Devotional:

The transformation we witness in the relationship between Jacob and Esau is a profound lesson in the power of changed perspectives. Esau, once consumed by anger and a thirst for vengeance, found himself at a crossroads, where the desire for family reunification now outweighed the allure of material possessions. In this shift, we see the power of forgiveness and the longing for something far more precious than worldly wealth – the restoration of a broken family bond. Friday: "The Ultimate Reconciliation"

Devotional:
