

Daily Devotionals:

On Sunday, we explored Matthew 7:7–14 and talked about the difference between kingdom power and spiritual weakness. We were reminded that Jesus' Sermon on the Mount wasn't a list of unreachable ideals, but a vision of victorious, Spirit-empowered life available to all who follow Him with faith and obedience. Yet many believers today live without that power. This is not because Jesus asks too much, but because we believe and commit too little. We saw how persistent faith (asking, seeking, and knocking) is the channel through which God pours out His presence and power, not for manipulating Him, but for trusting Him more deeply. We also heard Jesus' challenge to enter through the narrow gate, understanding that the way of true life is found not through comfort or convenience, but through discipline, daily surrender, and the costly love that reflects God's own character. The call to kingdom living is not passive; it is a deliberate, committed pursuit of Christ, and only those willing to pay the price will experience the joy, strength, and fruitfulness of that life.

Monday: "Keep Asking"

Scripture:

"Ask, and it will be given to you..." - Matthew 7:7

Devotional:

Jesus' invitation to ask is a call to relationship. He doesn't say, "Ask once," but implies continuous action. This is not because God is reluctant to answer but because He desires our hearts. Persistent prayer develops dependence. It keeps us coming back to the Father not only for answers, but for communion. We don't just need solutions, we need Him.

So many of us stop short in prayer. We grow tired, discouraged, or distracted. But what if the breakthrough God intends for us lies just on the other side of our persistence? Faith is not proven in a single prayer but in a lifestyle that keeps returning to God, trusting that He hears even when nothing seems to change. We must choose faith that presses in rather than gives up.

Asking is not about manipulating God into giving us what we want, it's about aligning our hearts with what He knows we need. Like a loving parent who gives wisely, not indulgently, God invites us to bring our requests with boldness and trust, believing that He gives good gifts.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. What prayer have you stopped praying that God may want you to start again?
- 2. How has your persistence (or lack of it) in prayer shaped your faith?
- 3. Do you believe that God truly wants to give good gifts to you? Why or why not?

Prayer:

Heavenly Father, thank You for inviting me to ask. Strengthen my faith to keep seeking You even when the answers are slow in coming. Grow in me a heart that trusts Your timing and purposes. Teach me to love the Giver more than the gift. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Tuesday: "Keep Seeking"

Scripture:

"For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds..." - Matthew 7:8

Devotional:

Seeking goes beyond asking, it involves active pursuit. To seek God is to reorient our lives around the search for Him, not just His blessings. Jesus promises that those who seek will find, but we must ask: what are we seeking? Is it comfort, control, or are we truly seeking the heart of God?

So much of our spiritual frustration comes from seeking the wrong things. When we chase success, comfort, or approval, we find ourselves empty. But when we seek the kingdom and His righteousness first (Matthew 6:33), everything else falls into place. Seeking God means opening the Word, showing up in worship, and letting His presence shape our desires.

The beauty of seeking God is this: He wants to be found. He is not playing hide and seek with us. The promise is real—those who seek will find. It may not be immediate, but it will be transformational. Every step toward God is met with His grace.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. What are you truly seeking right now in your life?
- 2. How can you prioritize seeking God more intentionally this week?

3. Have you ever experienced a season where seeking God led to unexpected transformation?

Prayer:

Lord, help me to seek You with my whole heart. Clear away distractions and desires that pull me from You. May I find joy not just in what You provide, but in Your presence itself. Draw me nearer. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Wednesday: "Keep Knocking"

Scripture:

"...and to the one who knocks it will be opened." - Matthew 7:8b

Devotional:

Knocking implies determination and urgency. It's the bold action of someone who believes there's something valuable on the other side. Jesus' promise is not passive. He assures us that the door will open to those who refuse to walk away. Kingdom living begins at the threshold of surrender.

What doors are you standing in front of today? Maybe it's a call to deeper faith, a healing you're desperate for, or a purpose you're unsure how to walk in. Knocking on heaven's door means you trust that what God has behind it is worth the wait and the effort.

Sometimes the door doesn't open the way we expect. But when we keep knocking, we discover that God isn't just opening doors for us. He is opening us. He is forming character, deepening faith, and preparing us for what's on the other side. Persistence changes us, and through it, God prepares us for kingdom purpose.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. What door in your life are you afraid to knock on?
- 2. How have you seen God shape you through a season of persistent prayer or waiting?
- 3. Are you willing to keep knocking, even when the door stays closed for now?

Prayer:

Father, I stand before You with hope and humility. Give me the courage to keep knocking and the faith to trust what's behind the door. Change me as I wait. Prepare me for what You have in store. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Thursday: "Do Unto Others"

Scripture:

"So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them..." - Matthew 7:12

Devotional:

The Golden Rule isn't just good manners, it's a kingdom ethic. Jesus invites us to treat others the way we want to be treated, not based on how they behave, but on how we've been loved. This is radical because it requires us to give grace even when it's not deserved.

This kind of love goes against human nature. It's easy to be kind when others are kind, but the narrow way calls us to love first. That means choosing forgiveness, kindness, and generosity, even when others fall short. We reflect God's nature best when we love with no strings attached.

Jesus lived this out perfectly. He washed feet, welcomed sinners, and forgave His enemies. He calls us to do the same. The way we treat others reveals whether we are truly walking the narrow road of the kingdom.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. Who in your life needs to experience unexpected grace from you?
- 2. How does this verse challenge your current relationships or conflicts?
- 3. What would change if you consistently lived out the Golden Rule?

Prayer:

Jesus, You have shown me grace beyond measure. Help me extend that same grace to others. Teach me to love like You love, not waiting for others to earn it. Make me a reflection of Your mercy. In Your name, Amen.

Friday: "The Narrow Gate"

Scripture:

"Enter by the narrow gate..." - Matthew 7:13

Devotional:

Jesus never pretended that following Him would be easy. The narrow gate is not flashy or popular, it's often lonely and demanding. Yet, it's the only path that leads to true life. The invitation to enter it is both a warning and a gift.

The wide gate is appealing because it asks nothing of us. No change. No sacrifice. But it leads to destruction. The narrow gate, by contrast, calls for surrender—our pride, our sin, our control. It requires us to trust Jesus not just as Savior, but as Lord. And though it's harder, it leads to abundance, peace, and eternal joy.

Every day, we choose which gate we walk through. Not just once, but again and again. Choosing the narrow gate is not a one-time event but a daily discipline. Are we walking the harder path that leads to life?

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. What makes the narrow gate difficult for you to walk through?
- 2. Are there areas where you've chosen the broad path out of comfort or fear?
- 3. How can you choose the narrow way more intentionally this week?

Prayer:

Lord Jesus, thank You for showing me the way that leads to life. Give me courage to walk through the narrow gate, even when it's difficult. Help me surrender all that holds me back. Strengthen me for the journey. In Your name, Amen.

Saturday: "The Way of Life"

Scripture:

"For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few." - Matthew 7:14

Devotional:

Jesus' words here are sobering. The way to life is hard, and few find it—not because God is hiding it, but because few are willing to pay the cost. This isn't meant to discourage us but to awaken us. Kingdom life is not for the half-hearted.

Yet, the hard way is also the most rewarding. The discipline, the struggle, and the self-denial are not punishment but refinement. God uses the narrow road to transform us, to prepare us for the weight of His glory. The narrow way is hard, but it is holy. And Jesus walks it with us.

To find life, we must lose our own (Luke 9:24). The narrow path leads to the richest joy, not fleeting happiness, but the deep, abiding life that only Christ can offer. Don't be discouraged by the difficulty. Be encouraged that you are on the path that leads to eternal reward.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. In what ways has following Jesus been difficult for you?
- 2. How have you experienced deeper life through struggle or sacrifice?
- 3. What motivates you to keep walking the narrow road?

Prayer:

Jesus, thank You for walking the narrow way ahead of me. Strengthen me when I grow weary. Help me remember the joy set before me. May my life reflect the hope and holiness of Your kingdom. Lead me always. In Your name, Amen.
