And he identified it and said, 'It is my son's robe. A fierce animal has devoured him. Joseph is without a doubt torn to pieces."

Genesis 37:31-35, ESV

The brothers' action of presenting Joseph's bloodied robe to their father Jacob, resulted in profound grief and despair that consumed his heart. The very act they hoped would remove an obstacle to their father's love ended up causing a chasm of alienation to widen between father and sons. Discussion Questions:
