Monday: From Word to Flesh

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made. - Scripture: John 1:1-3 (ESV)

Devotional:

As we embark on this Advent season, we find ourselves at the very heart of the Christian narrative - the incarnation of the Word. Devotional:

Devotional:

Devotional:

great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger.” And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying,

“Glory to God in the highest,

and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!”

- Luke 2:6-14 (ESV)

Devotional:

As we approach the advent season, let us reflect on the humble and miraculous birth of Jesus, the Savior of the world.
