

Sunday's sermon delved into the remarkable story of Isaac's birth. Abraham and Sarah had waited for over 25 years for the arrival of their beloved son. During the sermon, we discussed Abraham's unwavering faith when he was faced with a challenging test. He was asked to sacrifice his son, whom he cherished deeply. However, God's faithfulness prevailed, and Isaac was spared. We also talked about how Abraham's unshakeable trust in God's provision foreshadowed God's ultimate sacrifice and provision through his son, Jesus Christ. The message ended with a reminder of God's covenant promises to bless Abraham's descendants and all nations through a future descendant, who was none other than Jesus Christ himself.

Monday 8/21/23 - Standing Firm in God's Promises

"God said, "No, but Sarah your wife shall bear you a son, and you shall call his name Isaac. I will establish my covenant with him as an everlasting covenant for his offspring after him." - Genesis 17:19

Have you ever found yourself in a season of waiting, with uncertainty casting shadows over your heart? In those moments, it's natural to wonder if God will ever come through for you. Take comfort in the story of Abraham and Sarah, a tale of hope and faith in the face of prolonged longing. Despite years of yearning for a child, God proved Himself faithful to His promise and bestowed upon them the gift of a son named Isaac. This extraordinary birth marked the genesis of a special and everlasting covenant between God and His people—a covenant that extends to us today.

Abraham and Sarah's journey of waiting and finally receiving Isaac mirrors our own experiences of waiting on God's promises. Sometimes, the path to fulfillment seems long and uncertain, leaving us feeling discouraged and impatient. But we must remember that God is the Promise Keeper. Just as He remained faithful to Abraham and Sarah, He will fulfill His promises to us in His perfect timing. The birth of Isaac also foreshadows the ultimate gift of God's love and redemption for humanity through Jesus Christ. In the fullness of time, God sent His one and only Son, Jesus, to be the Savior of the world. Through His life, death, and resurrection, Christ sealed a new and everlasting covenant—a covenant of grace, forgiveness, and eternal life!

Discussion Questions:

1. How do God's faithfulness and fulfillment of His promises in the lives of Abraham and Sarah encourage you to trust Him in your own life?

- 2. In what ways can we remain patient and faithful while waiting for God's promises to be fulfilled?
- 3. Reflect on a time when you experienced God's faithfulness in fulfilling a promise. How did that strengthen your relationship with Him?

Tuesday 8/22/23 - "From Laughter of Doubt to Laughter of Joy"

And Sarah said, "God has made laughter for me; everyone who hears will laugh over me." And she said, "Who would have said to Abraham that Sarah would nurse children? Yet I have borne him a son in his old age." - Genesis 21:6-7

Despite her old age and initial disbelief, Sarah gives birth to a son, Isaac, which brings her overwhelming joy and laughter. Earlier, she had laughed at the idea that she could ever have a son, but now she was laughing out of joy in God's goodness. Sarah gratefully acknowledged God's miraculous power and declared that everyone who hears about it will share in her laughter.

This passage is a powerful reminder that even in our darkest moments, God can bring joy and laughter into our lives. He can transform our sorrows into joy, despair into hope, and impossibilities into possibilities. We can take comfort in the fact that no matter how difficult our circumstances may be, God's promises are steadfast and sure. As we go through life, let us trust in His faithfulness and look to Him for the joy and fulfillment that only He can bring.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How does Sarah's story of laughter and joy in Genesis 21:6-7 inspire you to trust in God's promises for your life?
- 2. Have you experienced a situation where God brought unexpected joy and laughter despite challenging circumstances?
- 3. How can we maintain an attitude of joy and laughter in our lives, even when facing trials or waiting for God's promises to be fulfilled?

Prayer:

Heavenly Father, we praise You for Your faithfulness and the joy You bring into our lives. Just as You fulfilled Your promise to Sarah, we trust that You will fulfill Your promises in our lives too. Wednesday 8/23/23 - Faith Tested

"By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises was in the act of offering up his only son, of whom it was said, "Through Isaac shall your offspring be named." He considered that God was able even to raise him from the dead, from which, figuratively speaking, he did receive him back." - Hebrews 11:17-19

The story of Abraham and Isaac is an emotional roller coaster of faith and trust. When God asked Abraham to sacrifice his precious son, it was a heart-wrenching test. But Abraham's response showed his unwavering faith in God's promises. He trusted that through Isaac, his descendants would be reckoned. And even though it seemed impossible, he was willing to offer his beloved son as a sacrifice. That's some next-level obedience!

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How can we develop the kind of faith that embraces God's test and willingly surrenders our desires to His will?

- 3. Reflect on a time when your faith was tested. How did you respond, and what did you learn from that experience?

Prayer:

Thursday 8/24/23 - The Weight of Surrender

He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains of which I shall tell you." - Genesis 22:2

It's hard to imagine the weight Abraham must have felt when God commanded him to sacrifice his beloved son, Isaac, as a burnt offering on a mountain in Moriah. After waiting for so long for his son, this was undoubtedly a test of faith and obedience unlike any other. But what we see in this moment is a profound lesson in surrendering to God's will, even when it goes against our human understanding.

Abraham's willingness to obey God's command shows us what true surrender looks like. God desires hearts that are fully yielded to Him, hearts that trust His wisdom and sovereignty, even when the path seems incomprehensible. This passage challenges us to examine our own willingness to surrender our most cherished possessions, dreams, and desires to God. It's a reminder that His plans are always higher and more significant than our own, and we can trust Him with our lives.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How can we cultivate a spirit of surrender and trust in God's will, especially during challenging circumstances?
- 2. Reflect on a time when you faced a difficult decision, and surrendering to God's will brought unexpected blessings or growth.
- 3. In what ways can we strengthen our faith to face tests of obedience with the same trust and surrender that Abraham demonstrated?

Friday 8/25/23 - It Depends on Faith

"That is why it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his offspring—not only to the adherent of the law but also to the one who shares the faith of Abraham, who is the father of us all, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations"—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. In hope he believed against hope, that he should become the father of many nations, as he had been told, "So shall your offspring be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was as good as dead (since he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No unbelief made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. That is why his faith was "counted to him as righteousness." - Romans 4:20-22

The story of Abraham's unshakable faith speaks volumes to believers of all ages. Even when faced with challenges and uncertainties, Abraham never wavered in his trust in God's promises. His faith only grew stronger as he gave glory to God and remained fully convinced that God had the power to do what He had promised. This kind of conviction fueled his journey of faith, from the miraculous birth of Isaac to the ultimate test of offering him as a sacrifice.

Abraham's unwavering faith teaches us a valuable lesson about the importance of being fully persuaded in our trust in God. In the face of trials and uncertainties, it's easy to let doubt and fear creep in. But when we focus on God's character and track record of faithfulness, just like Abraham did, we can strengthen our faith and move forward with unwavering confidence. We can rest assured that God is in control, and that His plans will always come to pass.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How can we cultivate unwavering faith in God's promises, especially during times of doubt or waiting?
- 2. What are some practical ways to strengthen our faith and give glory to God, as Abraham did?
- 3. Reflect on a time when your faith was fully persuaded in God's promises. How did this impact your outlook and actions during that period?

Saturday 8/26/23 - The Lord Will Provide

And Abraham lifted up his eyes and looked, and behold, behind him was a ram, caught in a thicket by his horns. And Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called the name of that place, "The Lord will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided." - Genesis 22:13-14

Abraham's trial of faith is undeniably awe-inspiring. His unwavering obedience to God's command to sacrifice his son, Isaac, is a testament to his devotion. However, God intervened just as Abraham was about to carry out this difficult task and provided a ram caught in the thicket as an alternative sacrifice. This miraculous intervention not only spared Isaac's life but also became a powerful declaration of God's faithfulness and provision. In response, Abraham named the place "The LORD Will Provide," acknowledging God as Jehovah Jireh—the One who sees our needs and supplies abundantly.

This passage serves as a strong reminder of God's unwavering faithfulness and care for His children. It is important to remember that His provision may not always come in the way we expect or on our preferred timeline, but we can rest assured that God is attentive to our circumstances and will provide according to His perfect plan.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. Reflect on a time when God provided for you in a remarkable way. How did this experience impact your faith and trust in God's provision?
- 2. How can we maintain a posture of faith and trust in God's provision, even when faced with challenging circumstances or uncertainties?
- 3. What steps can we take to recognize and acknowledge God's provision in our daily lives and cultivate a heart of gratitude?

Heavenly Father, we come before You with hearts filled with gratitude for Your faithfulness as "Jehovah Jireh"—the God who provides. Just as You provided for Abraham on the mountain, we trust that You will provide for our needs in every aspect of life. Help us to lean on Your promises and not be swayed by fear or doubt.
