What did you learn about
prayer from Luke 11:1-4

“Father, hallowed be Your name.
Your kingdom come.
‘Give **us** each day **our** daily bread.
‘And forgive **us our** sins,
For **we** ourselves also forgive
everyone who is indebted to **us**.
And lead **us** not into temptation.”

“**Father**, hallowed be **Your** name.
Your kingdom **come**.
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In verse 2 , Jesus says,
“When you pray”
not “If you pray”.

The Prayer's Focus


- To the Father
- About His Holiness.
- The advancement of His Kingdom

Your Kingdom Come

- Kingdom of God
- The Kingdom - a present and future reality.

Your Kingdom Come

- Doesn't depend on human works
- The question is whether humanity will receive it.




Compare Luke 11:1-4 with
Matthew 6:9-13.

<p>Your kingdom come.</p>	<p>Your kingdom come.</p>
	<p>Your will be done, On earth as it is in heaven.</p>


Luke 11:1-4	Matthew 6:9-13

Luke 11:1-4	Matthew 6:9-13
And lead us not into temptation.	And do not lead us into temptation, but deliver us from evil.
	For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.




Matthew bookends the
“Disciple’s Prayer” with
6:5-8 and 14-15.


What do you learn about
prayer here?

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- Hypocrites pray in public to be heard by others.
 - Prayer in private in fellowship with God is rewarded.
 - Do not pray with empty repetition.
 - Your Father knows what you need before you ask Him.


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- Forgive others – then God forgives you.
 - If you don't forgive – then God doesn't you.
