The Book of Job Lesson 1 – Overview

What do you think of when you think of Job?

Some opening thoughts:

- a) God wants us to love Him for who He is, not for what He does for us. (Job 1:11)
- b) Life is not just <u>difficult</u> (John 16:33); Life is not <u>fair</u>. (Job 1-42)

Was Job a real person?

- a) Some say the book has the marks of an allegory. But,
 - 1) Chapters 1, 2 and 42b have all the marks of being simple, historical records.
 - 2) In Ezekiel 14:14, 16 & 20, Job is as real as Noah and Daviel.
 - 3) In James 5:11, the mercies of God are bestowed on <u>a real man</u>.
 - 4) The details of <u>names</u> and <u>places</u> are not such as would occur in an allegory.
- b) Some hold that the interaction between Satan and God is improbable, so Job *must* be allegorical. But,
 - 1) Even if the interaction between God and Satan did not literally happen, this does not prove that no such man as Job existed.
 - 2) That this interaction did not happen is impossible to prove.
 - 3) See Luke 22:31, where <u>Satan</u> has asked to sift <u>Simon</u> like wheat.
- c) Some hold that the behavior of Job's friends seems improbable, so it must be an illustration. But,
 - 1) The discussion could actually have occurred but was written in more <u>poetic</u> form afterwards.
 - 2) The whole problem goes away if you realize that no <u>timeline</u> is given for Job's sufferings.

What do we learn about Job in verses 1-5?

He was a man; historical figure; lived in UZ; man of prayer; blameless; feared God; religious; shunned evil; wealthy; very wealthy; family grown; kids married and doing well; empty nester; life at its zenith; 10 kids got along; in touch with his family; concerned for them.
