From Pastor Jeff

This month I want to share some words adapted from Dr. Chuck Lawless of Southeastern Seminary about what to watch and listen for as we gather together on Sunday mornings:

For most of us, attending church is a habit. We leave home near the same time each week. We park in the same area, go in the same door, sit in the same place and talk to the same people. Then, we usually go the same restaurants for lunch. We expect nothing different and we see and hear nothing different. That's too bad, because we sometimes miss what God is doing around us. **This weekend, slow down enough to look and listen for these things:**

- 1. If you're married, watch and listen to your family as you get ready for church. If they're stressed before church ever starts, that's not a good start to the day. You be the peacemaker, the calm one, the prayer warrior, the encourager before you ever get in the car.
- 2. Watch for people you drive past on the way to church. It's likely they're not going to church. See them as sheep without a shepherd (Matthew 9:36) and pray for them as you drive.
- 3. Watch for opportunities to serve. Give up your parking space to somebody behind you. Open a door for someone. Help the mother who's struggling with three children and stroller. Offer to get coffee for someone else. Serve others.
- 4. Watch for people wandering around the parking lot or the building. Whether it's a guest, a straying child, or confused adult, he or she might need somebody to give some guidance. Be that somebody.
- 5. Look for someone you don't know. Whether or not that person is a member and whether you're an introvert or an extrovert, introduce yourself. Take the risk. I doubt you'll regret it.
- 6. Look for people sitting by themselves. I suspect many of us walk past such folks each week. They may not want to be bombarded, but they probably won't reject a friendly smile and a warm handshake. Learn a name and offer yours.
- 7. **Deeply listen to (and read, if available) the lyrics of any songs you sing.** Don't just sing the words listen to them. Let them sink into your heart. If you don't typically listen that closely, do it for only one song to begin.
- 8. Listen closely to the sermon and take notes. You might have opportunity to hear more of the Word this weekend than many people around the world will ever have. Take notes. At the end, write in one sentence the central lesson you learned.
- 9. Listen to your heart as you hear the Word. Hear the Word when it calls you to change and listen to your heart. Be aware when you try to fight against what you hear that might be your heart in rebellion.
- 10. Watch for how quickly you can forget what you heard. The enemy tries to snatch the Word from us (Mark 4:15) before we ever get out of the building. This weekend, don't miss how quickly your mind can move beyond the Word of God. Fight against that tendency.

Watch and listen. May God give you eyes to see and ears to hear this weekend.



God is Great; God is Good

"God is great, God is good, let us thank Him for our food." A prayer voiced by many young voices with profound theological implications for those who believe that it is true. Implicit in these truths are God's sovereignty and His loving kindness, His transcendence and His immanence, His might and His absolute goodness. As God's people gather for weekly worship, it is critical that these truths be presented because it is the marriage of God's greatness and goodness that support the faith of every Christian and power biblical worship.

God's Greatness—Greatness is one of the most fundamental traits that anyone would attribute to the object of their worship. Fundamental to worship, Christian or not, is the idea that the object of worship is greater than the one who is worshiping. Therefore, if we worship money, we essentially say that money is greater than I am, and thereby we elevate money to a certain status. A status that is supreme over areas of life. We get stressed out about it. We fight over it. We think about it constantly because of our misplaced love. These things lead us to one final question: If the greater object fails, what happens to me, the lesser object?

As worshipers of God, we are freed form these fears since God is truly the greatest being. The prophet Jeremiah affirms that the Lord is great writing, *"There is none like You, O Lord; You are great, and great is Your name in might"* (Jeremiah 10:6). God has no rivals in greatness. He is alone! The psalmist also affirms the Lord's exclusive supremacy over all other objects of worship, *"For great is the Lord and greatly to be praised; He is to be feared above all other gods"* (Psalm 96:4). God is not only great; He is the greatest. He is feared above all other gods. He alone is worthy of worship because there is nothing that supersedes His greatness, so He is worshiped because He is intrinsically worthy of it based on His greatness.

God's Goodness—But God's greatness is void of any hope if it is isolated to itself. If there is nothing to govern His greatness, then there are no parameters to which He is bound. Therefore, He could be great in evilness as well as holiness. A God completely sovereign with no care, love, or goodness is a scary thing indeed. But God has told us in the Scriptures and demonstrated over history that intrinsic to His nature is not only greatness but also goodness.

While God is good to the world through a common grace, He is good to those who believe the Gospel in a special and specific way. The Psalmist writes, *"What shall I return to the Lord for all his goodness to me?"* (Psalm 116:12). What kinds of deeds has the Lord done that the Psalmist would assign a 'good' value to? The answer is that He has *"delivered my soul from death"* (Psalm 116:8). It is the redemptive deeds of God that the Psalmist has in mind as he remembers the goodness of the Lord. It is this goodness that leads us to worship Him not under compulsion or obligation, but with affection and love. When we consider His redemptive goodness our hearts are moved to worship Him because of the affection we have for Him – we love Him because He first loved us (1 John 4:19).

Conclusion—Understanding God as both great and good gives us the freedom to look at every circumstance as good from an eternal perspective and worship God not in spite of our circumstances, but because of them. This doesn't mean that we always experience good things, or that we can't mourn in times of sorrow. In those moments, however, we can say with Paul, *"For this light and momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison"* (2 Corinthians 4:17). God is great in His sovereignty and good in His salvation, so let's worship with a freedom that only a Christian can know. God is great and God is good; let us thank Him for more than food.
