#### A note from Pastor Ben

George Herbert was a 17th-century clergyman in the church of England who, in his free time, liked to fiddle with poetry. Shortly before his death, Herbert sent his life's work to a close friend inviting him to either publish his poems, if he believed they were of any value, or else to burn them. Thankfully, Herbert's poetry was saved from the ash heap and has gone down as one of the great triumphs in the history of poetry. Today, many still regard Herbert as "arguably the most skillful and important British devotional lyricist of his or any other time."

One of Herbert's best known poems is a reflection on the power and privilege of prayer: *Prayer (I)* 

Prayer the church's banquet, angel's age,
God's breath in man returning to his birth,
The soul in paraphrase, heart in pilgrimage,
The Christian plummet sounding heav'n and earth
Engine against th' Almighty, sinner's tow'r,
Reversed thunder, Christ-side-piercing spear,
The six-days world transposing in an hour,
A kind of tune, which all things hear and fear;
Softness, and peace, and joy, and love, and bliss,
Exalted manna, gladness of the best,
Heaven in ordinary, man well drest,
The milky way, the bird of Paradise,
Church-bells beyond the stars heard, the soul's blood,
The land of spices; something understood.

As I read these reflections, I come away with a renewed sense of the power and privilege of prayer, but also with a nagging question: How would the modern church look different if we truly believed in the power of prayer? I think we would spend less time talking strategy and more time on our knees. Our prayer meetings would be as well attended as our potlucks. We would stop groaning about the state of the culture and, instead, bring our complaints before the Lord in lament. We would gather for prayer regularly and expectantly, excited to commune with our king and to see how he will work.

We have a God who hears our prayers and uses our prayers to accomplish his purposes! If this is true, it logically follows that a church that regularly commits to gathered prayer will see the Lord work powerfully in, through, and around their community. Let's seek to become a church that believes in the power of prayer, and acts like it!

Starting in November, FBCO will begin gathering for prayer on the third Tuesday of each month, from 6-7pm. These gatherings will be an opportunity for our church family to labor together on our knees as we seek the Lord's leading and plead for him to move. I'm excited to see how the Lord will work through our prayers.

## Youth and Family Ministry


Hello Church Family,



#### Thoughts from Karly

As some of you know, I am a writer, and have published a handful of pieces in recent years in various small publications. Some of you may even follow my writing online (if you do so, thanks and also, I'm sorry).



What you might not know is this past year, I submitted a book proposal to a handful of agents, one of whom, has worked on some of the most popular titles in the last decade (I cannot name names, but I guarantee you or a formerly teenage girl in your life has heard of a certain vampire novel she worked on). I was amazed and, frankly, taken aback, when this agent not only liked the sample I sent, but requested a full manuscript. I waited anxiously for a month or so, wondering if the agent was reading it, wondering if they liked it, wondering where they were in the story I had labored over off and on for the better part of a decade.

When I got the response, I tried to prepare myself for the most likely outcome, but still, the rejection was crushing. To have been dismissed out of hand, I told myself, would have been one thing, but to have my story in an agent's hands—not unlike putting a small, vulnerable part of yourself in the hands of your high school crush—only to have it rejected, was almost too much.

I told myself it was an honor to even make it that far, but deep down, I didn't believe it. While I continued posting writing online, my creativity suddenly ground to a halt. I lost confidence in what I had to offer, and what I could do with it.

I threw myself into parenting full time, trying my best to be, if not World's Best Mom, then at least World's Okayest Mom. But, too often, I'd come to the end of the day exhausted, discouraged, and frustrated with my failings, and how little I felt like I had to offer the world (that is not to say that being a full time parent is not a good and valuable job and for some people that is their one and only true calling, which is noble in and of itself). But deep down, I was scared of putting my work out there again. Like a teenage girl who has been rejected by too many would-be lovers, I felt like I was just going to box up my heart. I started looking into new career paths for myself, and quietly prayed that God would "call" me to something else.

In this Oakleaves, my husband is writing about the Parable of the Sower. For me, it's the Parable of the Talents. You're likely familiar with the story; a rich man leaves various amounts of money with several servants, with the expectation that they will make something of what they've been given. Two do just that, while one, fearful, buries his talent in the ground, and is cursed for it. Isn't it interesting that that's the term for the currency? It's certainly no coincidence, as it never is for any of the stories Jesus relays.

You can, of course, bury your talent in the ground. Maybe you don't play music anymore because your career never went anywhere, or don't cook because you live alone, or don't volunteer your time because you feel underappreciated. Maybe you just decided that, because you couldn't make a living on it, it wasn't worth spending time on.

But I don't believe that. Deep down, I think we all have a talent—maybe you make a great ambrosia salad, maybe you're a wonderful listener, maybe you, like me, have a novel or two inside you trying to fight its way out. And look, I wish I could say we will all be blessed to quit our day jobs and dedicate ourselves to this pursuit full-time, and make heaps of worldly riches in the process. But most of us will only have what we have, and the choice, before us, to try to multiply it, or bury it in the ground.

I wish I could end this with a hopeful note about how I'm now a New York Times Bestseller, but that's simply not true, and in all likelihood, never will be. But I'm writing again, because God, quite literally, sat me down and told me that this was a part of me, and he doesn't want me to see it buried. I don't know where it will take me, but I am sharing it in my own way, and maybe for now, that's enough. Every time I feel like giving up, at least one person will approach me to say how my words meant something to them, and that too, is multiplication.

## Worship Spotlight

Dear Church,

My family and I just returned from Tokyo, Japan, a place that I have visited three times by myself, but with the kids... Well, what an adventure! In my studies at Talbot, I have been asked to go deeper into some of the habits and tendencies that make up my personality and view them in relation to my faith in our God. The questions that I have asked myself have been both insightful and fun to explore. One of these questions had to do with why I have visited Japan so many times when there are other places in the world I want to visit and have not yet. During the week of my trip, one of my classes was focused on the Parable of the Sower, so I was reading many theologians musings on the passage in Matthew 13:1-23 during my visit. I think that my personal discoveries line up well with my discoveries within this passage.

Even though most of you are not agriculturalists, you probably understand the importance of good soil for growing things. As I read through my homework, I connected the parable to the people in my life here and those that I encountered in my trips to Japan. From my experience, I can compare many Japanese people to the soil described as weedy or rocky soil - similar to our SoCal soil - in contrast to the American people, where many could be described as hardened soils both in and out of church. My understanding is that Japanese culture seems to be, in general, a culture receptive to the Word, but this is a manifestation of being almost too receptive to anything and everything. On the other hand, they are also a country where many people express anxiety about the cultural expectations of purpose and their historical relation to the concept of Bushido.

In thinking more on the parable, I asked myself "Who takes care of the soil? Is it the individuals' responsibility to be ready for the seed? The Spirit's? God's people?" The Sunday afternoon service we attended in Tokyo was all in Japanese (with English translation), has an all-Japanese music team, and is a mixed congregation (we met a Rwandan medical student and our kids played with Afghan, American, and Japanese children). Part of the message was about not letting language barriers stop preaching the Gospel - which was a wonderful reminder that it's not our work that spreads the Word, but the Lord's and, again, led me to thinking about who is responsible for the care of the soil. I see a church of God's people longing to bring the Kingdom of God to the here and now as the caretakers of the soil.

After service, Karly and I reflected on the refreshing nature of a church that is trusting God for its viability in a culture not hardened to their existence, but not fully embracing it. Where weeds are growing steadily and fallow ground abounds. Our culture, generally hardened to the Word, presents a different set of hurdles to tending the soil. But the reminder that God will sow seeds through us should encourage us to break through the barriers to caring for the waiting soil.
