A Good Time for Reflection, Worship, Gratitude

In just a few weeks we will have the opportunity and privilege of celebrating the death and resurrection of Our Dear Lord and Savior. Holy week is a time to remember afresh that God so loved the world that He sent His only begotten Son to rescue us, providing a way for sinners like you and I to be reconciled to God. It is also a time in which each of us should pause to reflect not only on His incredible sacrifice, but also on the fact that Jesus was beaten, brutally killed, buried and on the third day He rose from the dead, that we might have life.

At times, I think we lose sight of the importance and centrality of Christ's death and resurrection! Forgetting that the central event in human history is the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ! If you think about it, the whole essence of the Gospel message is that Jesus Christ is the only begotten Son of God, and He was "made flesh, and dwelt amongst us, and then He went deliberately to the Cross. He could have avoided it, but He said that He must go through with it, in order to complete the work for which He had been sent. So He suffered the agony. He was beaten and nails were hammered into His holy flesh, and He died and was placed in a tomb. Then He rose again and is alive today.

I find it fascinating that for the apostles and the early church the heart of the gospel was not Christmas and Jesus' virgin birth, as wonderful and essential as that was. The heart of the gospel is what happened on Good Friday and on resurrection Sunday. As the Apostle

Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 15: 3 - 7:

For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, and that He appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve.

After that He appeared to more than five hundred brethren at one time, most of whom remain until now, but some have fallen asleep; then He appeared to James, then to all the apostles.

Paul makes it clear in these verses that it was the action of God in Christ, for sinful people that the apostles stressed in their teaching. In fact it dominated what they taught. Why? Because Jesus had done something of eternal significance. He came to remove our alienation from God and to take our place, paying a debt we owed and could never have repaid, in order that we might share His place as sons and daughters of God. As the beautiful hymn states: "Jesus paid it all, all to Him I owe; sin had left a crimson stain - He washed it white as snow."

In discussing the importance of Christ's resurrection, Paul says:

Now if Christ is preached, that He has been raised from the dead, how do some among you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? But if there is no resurrection of the dead, not even Christ has been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is vain; your faith also is vain. If we have hoped in Christ in this life only, we are of all men most to be pitied. But now Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who are asleep. 1 Corinthians 15:12-14; 19-20.

Paul's point is that if Jesus didn't rise from the dead his preaching had been a waste of time and a believer's faith is futile because they remain in their sin and have not had their sins forgiven. But the fact is that Jesus Christ has been raised from the dead and after three days in a tomb He arose from the dead and that truth should remind us that He is alive to be encountered and reckoned with today. And because He lives our sinful past can be cleansed and forgiven and we can live with security and strength in an uncertain world.

Ultimately, the resurrection assures us that all who believe in Jesus Christ will live again. It would be difficult to exaggerate the importance of the resurrection of Jesus from the dead the implications are immense! His death, and supremely through His resurrection, Jesus has shown us what God is like. He has shown us that God is personal, that He can be known. He has shown us that God is Holy. He has shown us that God is love, and He forgives at infinite personal cost. That is what makes God's love so unique and special. He loves you and me so very much that there is nothing, literally nothing that He would not endure for us!

Folks, we must never lose sight of Calvary or the fact that Jesus had the power as He hung on the cross dying (Continued on the next page.)

to save Himself and come down! Not only did He have the divine power to deliver Himself, He could have called on legions of angels to rescue Him. The one thing that Jesus could not do was save Himself and us at the same time! Therefore in order to save you and me, He hung on the cross and suffered and died but three days later He rose from the grave and He is alive today. So how are you responding to Jesus and God's incredible love for U?

As you prepare to celebrate Holy week and Resurrection Sunday, I encourage you to make it a priority to take some time to reflect on God's great love and on His unparalleled sacrifice given for you. Worship Him and give thanks, for truly He is good! May our hearts truly be filled with gratitude for all that God is and for all He has done for us through Jesus!

I've heard of a few combat veterans speak of the self-sacrifice of one for many. And irrespective if the sacrifice was motivated by duty, honor, country, training or the love of a buddy, the statement is usually made, I OWE MY LIFE TO HIM.

When you stop to think about it, what I have just described has happened to every one of us. Jesus, God's Son, came and died a premeditated death that you and I might have life now and eternally with God. His death was a conscious premeditated exchange of life motivated out of love. As John 3:16 says, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life."

The apostle Paul tells us we were without hope and without God, but now we've brought near by the blood of Jesus Christ (Eph 2:12-13). It would seem to me that because of Jesus' premeditated sacrifice for me

It would cause me to be very grateful and realize that I owe everything to **Him** and that I would want to live my life as a living memorial to **Him**.


At least 180 were at the International Students Dinner...


