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The Slain Lamb is King by Paul Anleitner

We are making our way through the season of Lent on our spiritual journey to the commemoration of the Cross and the Resurrection, and for many of us who have spent decades living in the Christian story, our familiarity with the details of Jesus' death and resurrection can numb us to the potency and radicalness of Easter's claims. Perhaps a picture from outside of the Gospels may help us grapple with what all of this means with a fresh sense of awe, terror, and joy.

Consider the picture recorded in the fifth chapter of the Revelation of John (sometimes known as the "Apocalypse of John" or "unveiling"). Using the apocalyptic literary conventions of his day, John describes a scene in the courts of heaven where angels are wondering who is worthy to bring about the final setting right of history. Looking around at all the agentic beings that fill the heavens and the earth, they lament that they can find no one worthy. But then, appearing in the center of the throne of God is a startling figure. John sees a slain lamb. The angels then declare that this slain lamb is the only one worthy.

That's quite the claim. A slain lamb is the ruler of the cosmos? I mean, wouldn't we think that whoever killed this lamb is the one really in charge?

Certainly, this is what it felt like for the disciples between that first not-so-good Friday and the realization of the empty

tomb on Sunday. They had followed a Messiah who they thought would set the world right and overthrow unjust governance and powers. But those powers conspired together, coalesced their power, and killed Jesus. The images that must have filled their imaginations of a Moses-type figure dispensing plagues upon the unjust powers or a David figure that slew giants were now dashed along with their hopes. Maybe the bad guys do win because they simply have more power?

The 19th-century German philosopher, Friedrich Nietzsche thought this was the case. He considered the story of Jesus and the ethical implications of Christianity to be just a "slave morality"they were nice stories people without power told themselves to feel better about their lot in life as the people in power continually dominated them and set the rules of the game. What humans really needed was not sacrificial love, charity, and forgiveness, but a "will to power" so they could no longer be servants and slaves on the underside of history. From Nietzche's point of view, it is not a slain lamb enthroned as ruler of all, but rather it is that which does the slaying who's truly in charge.

If we're honest, we must confess how tempting this "will to power" is. Turning the other cheek, loving your enemies, and forgiving others of their sins feels like a huge risk, especially when doing the right thing according to Jesus doesn't feel like it yields immediate results. In fact, the Apostle Paul goes as far as to say this kind of faith is "worthless" and that those who seriously believe this stuff "are to be pitied more than all men,"....if not for the resurrection! (1 Cor. 15:12-19)

The resurrection of Jesus is not only a sign that the Slain Lamb is truly king but it is a promise that the Way of Jesus actually wins in the end. When we celebrate Easter, we celebrate what we deeply long to be true about every story with a happy ending that we've ever read or watched before. Evil empires do not reign forever. Yes, plagues do eventually end too. The righteous are vindicated. Death does not get the final word.

Christian, you are called to play by an entirely different set of rules than the rules of the will to power game. "We work hard with our own hands. When we are cursed, we bless; when we are persecuted, we endure it; when we are slandered, we answer kindly." (1 Corinthians 4:12-13) By following the Way of the Slain Lamb and carrying your cross, you break the escalating cycles of sin and destruction. It's not a pragmatic strategy for getting ahead in life. It's a recognition that the Slain Lamb is enthroned as king of the cosmos. It's a calling we receive by grace through faith to participate in his redemptive work as agents of renewal. The Slain Lamb is
