Jollow Me by pastor Jay Pound

My family has finally resumed watching season one of The Chosen (| know. I know, we are way behind, but we have read the books!). In a recent episode, Nicodemus, a Pharisee of some importance, has a late night meeting with Jesus (John 3). In the show, Nicodemus is not only receptive to what Jesus has to say, he is hopeful. He recognizes that in Jesus, God may be doing something surprising and wonderful; Nicodemus recognizes that Jesus may just be the Messiah he has long awaited for. Perhaps seeing this, Jesus calls Nicodemus to follow him.

The portrayal of Nicodemus is striking. His excitement, his hope-even his newly sprouting joy-are palpable. He desperately wants to believe, wants to accept that Jesus really is the Messiah. He is desperately curious to see what will become of his ministry, what he will say and do. And then, against all expectations, he receives an invitation to join Jesus, to follow him. Part of him wants to accept so badly. And yet, he

The episode takes some creative license (as all adaptations must), but it also highlights quite poignantly the truth that following Jesus always comes at a cost. Neither in this episode, nor in John's gospel, does Jesus rebuke Nicodemus for his wealth, or his position, or his station in society, let alone his love and concern for his family. None of these things, on their own, are sinful or evidence of sin. In fact, both Jesus and Nicodemus would likely have agreed that most, if not all of these, were good gifts given to Nicodemus by a generous God. But the question, honed in this scene to a fine

has a seat on the Sanhedrin. He is an important man-he is wealthy, and he has a high position in society. He has a lot to lose. And Jesus agrees. But the scene ends with Jesus inviting Nicodemus to think of what he might gain, what he might see, what God might do. Nicodemus remains torn and undecided, but as Jesus leaves, he reissues the invitation, "I hope you join me."

point, is this: has Nicodemus allowed these good gifts to come between him and his God? Can he let go, or do these gifts now have a grip on him?

This spring we are beginning a new sermon series called, "Letting Go of What Grips Us," where we will be exploring what scripture has to sav about stewardship, generosity, and contentment. I think one of the biggest challenges for Christians in our world and culture today is our relationship to money and possessions. These, rather than foreign gods, are the things that vie for our allegiance, the things most likely to come between us and God. Now, as then, Jesus calls each of us to follow him. And like Nicodemus, most of us are aware that we have a lot to lose. Will we let these good gifts hold us back? Or will we fix our eyes on what lies ahead, on what we might gain, on what God might do if we will only let go and follow him? We hope you will join us this spring as we learn together to let go of what grips us. 👻

TERRACE ON CHICAGO

In February 2008, one hundred and fortyfive people enjoyed a grilled beef and/or fried halibut dinner at our very first Terrace on Chicago. The monies that were raised that year enabled students go to SEMP in Chicago and Costa Rica on a missions trip.

Since that initial Terrace on Chicago, hundreds of students, parents, and volunteers have served over 2800 gourmet meals. Each year a different theme with different foods were introduced, from a French Cafe, to a Nicaraguan meal, to one that served traditional Czech food.

Terrace on Chicago is our annual student ministry fundraiser. We do it for the purpose of sending our middle school and high school students on summer missions and ministry trips. But it does more than that. Parents and volunteer youth staff work together to make new friends, students dress up and learn how to serve, and those who come enjoy a delicious meal. It is a fun night of celebration!

This year's dinner's theme was that of a supper club with a Southern flare. Broasted Cornish game hen with hot honey sauce and dirty wild rice were served. The middle school students will be going south to Kentucky to visit the Ark Encounter and to do ministry with a church in Indiana. The high school students will be going to our national EFCA student ministry conference-Challenge-in Kansas City.

In the 16 years of Terrace on Chicago over \$200,000 has been given to support our students. This year, because of your generosity, we have already received over \$20,000. Thank you once again for your commitment to our students!
