

Status & Identity BY JAY POUND

A couple of years ago, a new guy showed up at Men United on Friday morning. He was 20, and in college, and had found our group online. He made the shocking decision (for a college student) to show up at 6:30 a.m. and check it out. Afterward, I introduced myself to him, and asked what had motivated him to come. He responded that he wanted to get to know some older Christian men who would be able to advise and mentor him in the next stages of life.

I was excited; this is exactly what Men United was designed for. But as I looked around, I realized a few of our older guys weren't there that morning, but I told him, don't worry, they will likely be here next week. This was met with an uncomfortable silence, and with hysterical laughter from my friend Seth who had also joined the conversation. Once he stopped laughing, Seth (who is my age), looked at me and said, "When he said 'older guys," he was talking about us.

And he was right! Somehow, without my noticing, I had become one of the "older guys' (at least to college students). I had been married for over a decade, was working in my chosen field, and had 2 children who were both in school. This 20 year old looked at me and saw his

own - distant - future. What had created the confusion and humor was that when I looked at him, part of me still thought I was his age.

One way to think about this situation is as a disconnect between status (how others see you) and identity (how you see yourself).* Status is something that is either given or earned, and influences what others expect of us. For example: "She is a hard working employee," or "He is my best friend." Identity, by contrast, is something we construct; it is the way we see or think of ourselves (e.g. as a member of a profession, family or the people of God). Our identity dictates what we care about, what we want and what we do.

One of the central gifts of the gospel, and covenant with God more generally, is that we are given by God a new status. When we give our allegiance to Jesus as our Lord and Savior, we gain a new status as His People, specifically the people of the Messiah. God writes his name on us. When God sees us, and when others see us, they should think, "There goes one who belongs to Jesus." And that status comes with many benefits, but also with new expectations - people are going to expect certain things when they see the name of Jesus. And they should.

Part of the task of the Christian life is to rebuild our own identity around the new status we have been given through Jesus. And while others can and should help, some of it we simply must do for ourselves. It takes time, intention, reflection and work. We will have to root out or let go of views of ourselves that are not consistent with our new status. We need to humbly accept correction and encouragement from (especially our brothers and sisters), when they see old status and identities peeking through. And we need to be immersed in God's word so that we can understand better how God sees us, and let that transform how we see ourselves.

1 John 3.1 says, "How great is the love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are!" God in his great love and mercy has called us his children. And that is no convenient fiction, in Christ God has made that reality! Our job is to believe it; to see ourselves as God sees us, and then to live out of that new identity, to let it dictate what we care about, what we want and what we do.
