

Struggling or Suffering? Find help in these two Psalms...

thousand years ago or so, the writer of Psalm 77, a man called Asaph, describes his own situation as being so stressful that he could neither *speak* nor *sleep*. Verse four says, "You hold my eyelids open; I am so troubled that I cannot speak." He complains that he cries out to the Lord constantly in prayer but finds no comfort. Even worse, he feels overlooked by God, saying, "Will the Lord spurn forever, and never again be favorable? Has His steadfast love forever ceased? Are His promises at an end for all time? Has God forgotten to be gracious? Has He in anger shut up His compassion?" (vss. 7-9). Perhaps you've felt like that. Maybe you're struggling with disrupted sleep and it seems like your prayers are bouncing off the ceiling and remaining unanswered.

Asaph's thoughts are not written down in some private prayer journal—rather they are recorded in the part of the Bible known as the *psalter*—it functioned as the hymnal for public worship by God's people. It was a record for all posterity and anyone could read about the agonies of his heart. Gladly, Asaph turned a corner when he determined to *seek* the Lord. He writes, "my spirit made a diligent search…" (vs. 6). He writes about appealing his case to God (in verse ten) and urges himself twice to *remember* the Lord's faithfulness to him in the past (in verses six and eleven). He goes on to remind himself that the God of all creation also delivered His people out of slavery in Egypt and through the perilous waters of the Red Sea.

Our second passage of Scripture to consider is Psalm 119, which is famous for being the longest chapter in the Bible (weighing in at some 176 verses), all of which focus on the importance of the Word of God. While that may be of some interest, for our purposes, I want to focus on a particular word that is used seven times in English in this lengthy psalm: that word is "afflict."

Seven times the writer speaks of being *afflicted* or having some sort of *affliction*, which means to be in persistent pain or distress. It refers to our hardships and problems that one encounters in life. Today, we might call that our trials and tribulations or some sort of adversity.

While being afflicted in various ways doesn't sound very desirable, Asaph goes on to list multiple benefits of affliction, saying, "It was *good* for me that I was *afflicted* that I might learn Your statutes" (verse 71) and that "before I was *afflicted* I went astray, but now I keep Your Word (verse 67).

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In addition, affliction causes us to find comfort and life in God's promises (vs. 50) and to delight in God's Law (vs. 92). Moreover, it causes us to cry out to the Lord (vs. 107) like Asaph, saying, "I am severely *afflicted*; give me life, O Lord, according to Your Word!" And the bottom line on all this is that affliction is prompted by God's faithfulness to His Word and is actually for our betterment (vs. 75). Asaph closes off his repetition of this word by praying, "Look on my *affliction* and deliver me, for I do not forget Your Law" (vs. 153).

When we read the Old Testament, which looks forward to the coming of the Messiah, it is also important to interpret those Scriptures with verses from the New Testament that point us to Jesus, who is the Christ—meaning that God's Son is the Messiah and King who saves His people from their sins by His life of obedience, by His atoning sacrifice on the Cross, and by His bodily resurrection from the dead. Jesus alone can forgive our sins and give us eternal life.


Passages like Romans 5:1-5 urge us to rejoice in our sufferings because we know that God is producing endurance, character, and hope in us. Similarly, the anonymous writer of the Book of Hebrews speaks of the fact that, like a father, God disciplines all those whom He loves so that we will share His holiness (see Hebrews 12:5-11).

It's insightful to note that the Apostle Paul uses some form of the word "affliction" ten times in the Book of 2 Corinthians alone! Here are just two such examples from chapter four:

"We are *afflicted* in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our bodies." (verses eight through ten)

"So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this light momentary *affliction* is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison" (vss. 16-17).

So, when you find yourself under some sort of pressure—some sort of *affliction*—remember to find help in God's Word. Draw hope from Psalms 77 and 119, find help in the New Testament as well, and make sure to look to Jesus, who is the Author and Perfecter of our faith (Hebrews 12:2).


