FATHERS AND THE FATHERHOOD OF GOD

Father's Day comes each June on the third Sunday of the month. Every year this "Hallmark Holiday" serves as a reminder of our own fathers, whether good or bad. Moreover, it is an opportunity for us to go to God our Heavenly Father in prayer, regardless of how our earthly Dad dealt with us. But sometimes that's hard for us to do...




There seems to me to be different parenting styles of fathers in America. There is *Dad the Provider*: the strong, silent type who viewed the extent of his parental responsibilities as going faithfully to work in order to put food on the table. You didn't get a lot of communication from this model of earthly father-- maybe a word or two about the benefits of getting an education or, if you were lucky, "The Talk" about the birds and the bees, but that was about it. Here's another fatherly approach: *Dad the Playmate*—this father rolls around on the floor with the kids in wrestling and tickle battles, coaches their sports teams, adopts the stance of being their "buddy" and sometimes plays the "Good Cop" pitted against Mom, the bad cop who has to act as family enforcer, even with her own perpetually adolescent partner.

I myself was somewhat of a *NextGen Dad*: the kind of father who took a more active role and had greater involvement in changing dirty diapers, scrubbing heads in the tub, and attending parent-teacher conferences and visits to the doctor—roles that a previous generation assigned largely to Moms in the family division of labor. Still others of us were fortunate to have had a *godly father*: a Dad who walked with the Lord, loved his wife, took the family to church, and actually opened up a bit about his own life, failings, and walk with the Lord. What a blessing it is to have a godly heritage and to leave a legacy of faith in Christ in one's own family.

However, yet others suffered under *abusive fathers*: men who were alcoholics or physically violent or emotionally cruel. Such Dads leave deep scars. So do *absent fathers*, dads who leave their family in the lurch. I still remember the night my own father walked out on our family: I'm middle aged now, and it still hurts.

The good news of the gospel is that our Heavenly Father has sent His one and only Son, Jesus, into this world to save sinners. Together, the Father and the

Son have sent the Holy Spirit into the lives of we who are in Christ. As such, we have received the Spirit of sonship (see Romans 8:15 and Galatians 4:5) and been adopted into the family of God. Yes, we are truly sons and daughters of the Most High God (see Isaiah 43:6 and 2 Corinthians 6:18). We can cry out to our Heavenly Father and know that He always gives good gifts to His children. Will you call out, "Abba, Father!" to Him now?

ON THE USE OF SERMON OUTLINES

As we continue *There Is a Redeemer*, our current series on the Book of Ruth, I thought it might be of some use to explain why I publish a sermon outline each week. So, here are a few reasons why I think it is a help-ful practice:

Following along is easier with an outline in front of you- Ever listened to a sermon and found yourself thinking, "Now that's a good point"– yet still wondering where the message is leading you? An outline lets the listeners know "where the train is going once it leaves the station," as I sometimes say. I think it is only polite to bring your hearers along on a journey of uniting the Word of God with faith in their hearts by giving them an inkling of what you'll be talking about and why they ought to listen. Even if you're not in the habit of taking notes, simply glancing at the outline helps keep us all on track.

The act of putting pen to paper helps make it stick. The simple act of writing sends signals to the brain that this piece of information is useful. While some people make a practice of keeping their outlines and reflecting upon them on occasion (as do I), others may toss it in the trash or recycling bin afterwards. Even so, having put pen (or pencil) to paper still helps you to engage with the text as an active listener. You can even journal your own thoughts as we go.

You've got the Scriptures right in front of you. Not everyone that comes to a public worship service is in the practice of bringing a Bible with them or opening the pew Bible. The outlines I produce give each person a copy of the text that is to be addressed that day. Many of you will also note that I've taken to emphasizing certain aspects of the Scriptures by highlighting important verses and putting key words in bold-face type and the like. I hope this helps you to get the sense that God's Word, which is "alive and active" (see Hebrews 4:12 on this point), is jumping off the page at you. In fact, this brings me to my last point...

Producing an outline helps me, the preacher, to stay on point and to focus my own thoughts. Yes, the outline is a benefit not only to those of you in the pews but also it has become an integral part of my sermon development process. Creating an outline each week helps crystalize main ideas in my mind. I trust that this makes me a more effective communicator of the gospel of Christ crucified and risen. That is, after all, what it's all about!

I hope this makes sense to you. Thanks for reading- and for listening.

Property Committee:

The Kitchen Renovation Project is progressing. Several areas have been completed with volunteer labor and donated materials, including a new ceiling, removal of the dishwasher (to be relaced by storage cabinet for large items), and replacement of all the electrical receptacles and switches. Special thanks to Lynn Lotter, Edna Bailey, Matt Adams and Lloyd Viox.

Painting of the cabinets, walls, etc. has been contracted and is scheduled for the week of June 9.

Currently getting estimates to replace the floor and the countertops. The serving window folding divider will soon be replaced with a barn door type closure.

Progress is also being made on the Handicap Accessible Bathroom Project but is not visible yet. Five different engineering disciplines have been contracted, and their design work (including a site survey) is nearing completion. Next the architect will create a "bid package" that combines his architectural plans together with the engineering designs so that we can begin getting bids from builders.

Also, thanks to Lloyd V. for repairing the uneven brick walkway leading into the fellowship hall.


