

Do you know that directional antennas connect-



Sometimes he feels a little intimidated and like he is being stretched in a lot of different directions, and there are times when he feels like they take 4 steps forward and then 1 step back, but he is so grateful for gracious bosses like Luke Rhee and Micah Lugg and an environment where he has been able to "get his feet wet" and grow.

Some of what Lucas does is quite overt like playing the piano/keyboard Sunday mornings during the service or shooting/editing the PNG video with Promise and the team from church that visited her; however, much of what he does takes place behind the scenes like an IT ninja in the shadows unbeknownst to the general populace. Lucas takes great pride when devices and systems that have been set in place operate seamlessly benefiting the user and the congregation (i.e. Powerpoint on the TV screen while an elder teaches during the Training Hour and providing the recording for those who missed the class on the website or for a shut-in).

Lucas is a firm believer that the aesthetic matters – whether that be the aesthetic of a missionary video, the website, or whatever. He reminded us as we sat and chatted with him of all the men recorded in Scripture who worked on the temple with skill and beauty – all for the glory of God! Exodus 28:2-3. Lucas, what can we as a church do to help you bolster this strong gospel with a good aesthetic?

Gyl came to faith as youth in high school. Gyl first became aware of how to live the Christian life at high school camp in Big Bear. The speaker for the week was John MacArthur. Larry responded to an invitation to receive Christ from his pastor at 15 and was baptized the following week.

Can you imagine the amazement of the Awana leaders as they delivered this healthy alternative snack to one of their 3-year-olds, especially when considering that the other children at the table are having Oreos?! This is not an unusual occurrence for the Jones family, in fact, dietary restrictions have been a part of the girls' lives since birth. However, the health issues they have experienced have been the very means God has used to show Himself to be the great provider, healer, and sustainer that He is.

Brian and Sarah Jones grew up attending church and hearing the truth of the gospel. They met in high school at Life Bible Fellowship in Upland where they began to put their trust in Christ as their Lord and Savior. They later married and Brian began working as a tradesman leading to his current work as a self-employed electrical contractor. Sarah works parttime as a nurse at San Anto-

nio in the NICU. They are homeschooling their three girls: Hannah 8, Eva 5 and Norah 3. They have always been part of a church community, growing in faith, but it wasn't until they became parents that the greatest testing and spiritual growth took place in their lives.

From the moment their first daughter Hannah was born Brian and Sarah have seen the Lord's hand at work. Hannah was born with Turner's Syndrome and this combined

with the diagnosis of Lyme disease has contributed to multiple serious health concerns. In 2017 as Hannah underwent open-heart surgery, the Lord sustained them by providing for the enormous expense and delivering Hannah through a successful procedure.

This past April Hannah received treatment including a blood transfusion for intestinal bleeding. God again provided by prompting a family friend to gift the Ioneses with the exact amount needed for medical expenses. Additionally, through the FBC church community, God provided the needed love, prayer support and meal contributions making it possible for them to cope with Hannah's hospital stay.

Sarah, Eva, and Norah have also experienced health issues as a result of Lyme disease but the family chooses to focus on trusting God and being thankful in all circumstances instead of dwelling on their problems. For example, instead of feeling sorry that Hannah was in the hospital on Christmas, they chose to be grateful she was well enough for the family to spend Christmas morning together in her hospital room. Their inspiring example of hard work and perseverance in the face of chronic, energysapping illness is a testimony to the grace of God.

They have been blessed to attend the Beatty's small group where Brian learned of the need for volunteers at the Beatty's house construction project. He enjoys using his electrical skills volunteering on Saturdays. Brian and Sarah became members at FBC this past June and are grateful for the firm biblical foundation and loving community.
