Short Term Missions: Romania & PNG

Romania

Kenny and Rebecca Allison and Mark and Kathleen Hetzel were privileged to participate in a "Wheels for the World" wheelchair distribution in Romania through the Joni and Friends organization this past August. This distribution was carefully prayed for, planned and carried out by several churches in the central part of Romania. The churches there have quite a large year-round ministry to families affected by disability. Joni and Friends comes alongside and provides wheelchairs and other mobility aids as well as a team of people from all over the United States to work with the Christians there for one week. Three people on the team were physical therapists, five were in a mechanics role, three were in a support role, one was the photojournalist, and two were the team leaders. The churches had been advertising the five day distribution and making appointments for each day. By the time the team arrived in the city on Sunday afternoon, each day was booked.

Sunday afternoon was filled with organizing the middle school gymnasium, sorting the wheel-chairs into sizes and types, unpacking about ¼ of them. Monday morning began with devotions

and prayer before people started arriving. Each individual with a disability was assigned to a group. Each group had an interpreter that worked with them throughout the week. These interpreters were mostly college age Christians from the local churches. They were fantastic!! They loved the Lord, they were personable and caring, and several were in university pursuing some type of medical career. The physical therapist would ask the individual's diagnosis, then figure out what

kind of wheelchair or aid would be best for them, including the modifications needed.

Then the mechanics (Kenny or Mark) would go to work! The support person (Rebecca or Kathleen) would talk with the families and individuals with the disability. Their aim was to make them feel comfortable, to find out what their needs might be, to show them love and care, and, after the wheelchair was ready, to pray with them. An official picture would be taken and then the family would meet in a separate room with a pastor or evangelist from one of the local churches. They would share the Gospel and invite them to turn to Christ. They would also be given an opportunity to take home a Bible and invited to visit a good local church. 68 people prayed to receive Christ over the course of five days! Some of these were people the local Christians have known and ministered to for years. Approximately 250 people heard the Gospel and 73 non-Christian families were invited to church!

The Allisons and Hetzels praise God for the way He worked in people's hearts and lives

throughout the week. They each have certain people that they interacted with, were impacted by, and that they pray for still. The Lord worked in their hearts as well! Going to Europe, traveling many miles,

dealing with very different schedules, circumstances and food; they saw God work in their own attitudes and relationships with the other team members from different states and church backgrounds. They each saw God give them grace to keep going so that these people could hear the precious Gospel and receive a wheelchair or other mobility aid. As they witnessed the joy and tears on the faces of the family members and individuals receiving the wheelchairs they got a glimpse of what a

difference the mobility aids would make in the daily life of each family.

One lady would be able to go out in her back yard and garden again as her old wheelchair only worked on pavement. Now, with the new tires, she could be outside, amongst her flowers and trees. One young girl would be a little more independent, as well as helpful to her mom, by being able to move from room to room. A young boy could eventually learn to walk in the gait trainer he received! In one case, a 20 yr old wheelchair was exchanged for a new one with updated customizations. And one little boy's wheelchair was fitted with a foam cradle so he could sit up. All the parents were so grateful! The team gave out 107 wheelchairs, 5 standers, 8 rolling walkers, and various crutches, regular walkers and canes.

Even just one person being transferred from Satan's kingdom to God's kingdom would have been so satisfying. These people accepting Christ is quite an encouragement to all involved. Kenny, Rebecca, Mark, and Kathleen want to go

Madang, Papua New Guinea

In 2018, before Zack and Dani were married, Zack had the opportunity to go to Papua New Guinea for 2 weeks. He went with four other men from Foothill Bible Church, to work on a house in the jungle for Promise Vaughan, our ministry partner there. While in Madang, waiting to travel to

where Promise lives, the FBC guys met the Housleys, missionaries who are also translating the Bible in PNG. Shortly after that, the Houslevs started a school for kids in the local villages in the Ramu Valley. They asked FBC in 2021 if there was anyone willing to come and build a library from the ground up for their school. Zack and Dani felt the Lord leading them to go and on Sept.

23 of this year, they arrived in Madang! The next day they started learning Tok Pisin (the local language) and all about the culture. The plans for the library also arrived that day and now they are using those plans to apply for a grant to build it. In the meantime, Zack and his crew of local men have built a boys' dorm, helped with a bush house for other missionaries, and started building a house for a soon to arrive co-worker. Tim Bohler and Kenny Allison also traveled to PNG from November 30 to December 14, 2022 to help with that house, enabling it to be finished by the time the co-worker gets there in January.

There are currently grades 7-9 and she teaches Personal Development to the 7th and 9th graders. This class covers a range of topics such as family structure, personal relationships, physical activity and social interactions. It is all PNG curriculum but she is looking forward to giving Biblical context to the topics covered. Dani stated in a recent email, "Most of the students in the school, Ramu Valley Academy, come from villages where churches have already been planted and, through God's grace, the investment in these students will lead to the continued growth of those churches. And beyond that, we are praying that it would lead to the furthering of the Gospel and Church for future generations in Papua New Guinea."

Zack is learning how to build Papua New Guinea style. It is different than anything he is used to but he is enjoying the challenge, and he is enjoying getting to know the men he works with. He also gets to substitute teach a Bible class to the 8th and 9th graders sometimes. In the recent email he said, "I feel blessed to be involved in that part of their school day and look

forward to the other opportunities that may arise to dive more into the Word with them! I even built a meeting spot under our house that I am hoping to use for some Bible study and fellowship time." Both Zack and Dani say that their new 'busy' here has left them feeling so encouraged at the end of each day. "Our work feels so purposeful and through Christ, we get to witness lives changed! The more we get to know the students, the more we get to hear about how the Gospel has transformed their lives. They have a true joy in Christ and are passionate about sharing that with their communities as they continue to grow."
