

Electronics other than digital cameras were not allowed, thus taking away some of the common distractions in students lives. They were challenged to see the importance of intentionally setting time aside to seek the Lord in silence and solitude through Bible study and prayer. This seeking of God privately helps believers to live as ambassadors for Christ publicly. Here is what some of the students said they learned from the weekend.

"It really bothered me that I keep putting off reading the Bible. I pray, but that is just half of the conversation."

"I am reaching some of my close friends at school for Christ, but I'm not reaching as far as I should be. That is something big I'm going to have to work on."

"You have to read your Bible to be able to show people what God is like. You can't just wing it."

"The lesson on prayer stood out to me. I pray

before I eat and before I go to bed, but it's routine, I'm going through the motions with it. I need to work on prayer being a regular part of my walk with God."

"I'm a planner and like to plan things in my life, and so not knowing God's plan can be frustrating. But I realized this weekend that His plan for me is ultimately for His purposes and my good, so it doesn't matter what I think would be best for myself because the Lord has what's best in mind for me."

"One thing I noticed is that even though we had to shut off our phones this weekend, we still had a good time hanging out together without checking Instagram and Twitter and texting."

We pray these lessons continue to stick with them as they discover the joy of walking with Jesus daily. Ultimately, our goal is to see young people take their relationship with God seriously and the Spirit to ignite a passion for Christ in their souls. This weekend retreat fits into our longer range strategy of sharing the gospel with students week in and week out. This happens through the faithful service of the ONE28 small group leaders. In 2009, he observed a man of God who lived a different life while he was reading through Hebrews. He knew now that the righteous shall walk by faith, not by sight (1 Corinthians 5:7). Billy and Arcelia now have a unity of beliefs, values, and purpose since they both put their trust in Jesus as Lord and Savior.

Nine months after Arcelia's conversion, her faith was to be tested when Billy was in a head-on collision. He did not know if he would survive and called his wife to say goodbye. She had to trust God for everything, collapsing in the arms of her Savior, trusting the body of Christ to minister to their family for four months as Billy recovered.

Billy loves running, something he had thought after the accident that he would never do again. He served as a chaplain at a homeless mission for a time after the accident and has been taking seminary classes for the past two years. He already has a degree in cooking but currently works for Best Drilling digging wells.

The Millers discovered FBC when visiting Arcelia's grandmother who had just had a stroke. They relocated to California to be able to help care for her. Arcelia is currently

serving as a leader in the 2's and 3's class during the worship service.
