My Training Center Experience: Year 1

It was June 1, 2021, Training Center (TC) applications were due at Foothill Bible Church, and of course I waited until the last day to submit! After much thought and encouragement from my wife, Bianca, I decided to take the plunge and turned in my application. TC is designed to equip Christian men to better serve the Lord in their home, workplace, and church with the unique gifts God has given them. Each Christian has been "...created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10). TC helps equip Christian men to discover those good works so they will live Christ-satisfied and Christ-glorifying lives.

Another goal of TC is to fulfill 2 Timothy 2:2 by training future generations of pastors, elders, missionaries, church planters, and leaders who will be used by God in local churches for God's glory, emphasizing Ephesians 3:20-21, "Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that

we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen." TC is a three year program running September through early June, TC students meet for one three-hour classroom gathering each week. Classes are primarily scheduled from 5:30-9pm so that men can attend after work. Each week from 5:30-6pm TC students can share a meal, fellowship, and get to know one another. Outside study, reading, writing, and class preparation requires about an additional six to twelve hours, depending on the class year and the students themselves. consists of

TC leadership Pastors Micah, Art, Taylor. Morgan Maitland (teaching pastor at Summit Bible Church) and Josh Powell (Director of Administration and TC). All these men are like the Avengers with their respective superpowers and specialties in certain areas of the Bible. Each

has a different style of teaching, along with unique backgrounds and gifts from the Lord.

Year 1, focused on the Word, is an intense study of the entire Bible, theology and practical theology. The purpose is to set a foundation for life-on-life ministry and heart-driven service within the church. In the beginning of June 2021, myself along with 25 other men were handed three theology books. We were given a deadline of three months to have them all read. I don't consider myself a reader and the thought of completing one, let alone three books, on theology was a little intimidating. I did the math, came up with a

plan, and started reading 30-50 pages per day. I suddenly felt anxious about the deadline, like I did when I was in college. I also quickly realized the amount of free-time I previously wasted on things like scrolling through my phone. Thankfully I had lots of prayer support because we had to submit a list of ten prayer partners who would pray for us throughout the year!

Not really sure what I was getting myself into, I made sure to read diligently and take notes on what I was reading. One of the assigned books had constant quizzes at the end of each chapter for which I started implementing the help of my wife. Next thing you know she too is learning about Israel's redemptive history! Some chapters

had me trying to remember the basic rules of grammar, learning different figures of speech, analyzing allegories, and biblical interpretation. Other chapters had me going on rabbit trails and doing research of my own on queswhich tions had been raised from prior chapters.



Once I was in the thick of our reading, I started to see what I actually knew versus what I thought I knew about the Bible. A little humble pie never hurt anyone, right? Did I mention that myself, along with 25 other men, would be gaining weight from eating so much humble pie this first year of TC?

Finally, I had accomplished the assigned summer reading in time and was now ready (maybe) for what the Lord had in store for me in the first year of TC.

Our first class kicked off, and what better way to start than with a pop-quiz of a bunch of questions I had to leave blank. Luckily, I sat next to Bernie Cestone, an FBC elder, who was writing his answers away like he was a scribe of ancient times. I was tempted to look over, but how would cheating look in a program meant to equip Christian men? Anyhow, I decided to gracefully take the goose egg and figured things could only get better from there. Pastor Art Nakamura, Associate Pastor at FBC and TC graduate, informed us about the purpose of this guiz and what we could learn from it. This guiz was to inform us of what we did not know, what we should know, and what we would eventually know.

So we had accomplished the summer reading, taken our first pop-quiz, done some class introductions, and now it was time to get to what will be consuming us for the next semester (and year), memorizing over six-hundred passages along with each theme of every book in the Bible. Until that day I had yet to memorize my wife's cell phone number so how was I going to memorize all these passages? Well, we started off with memorizing passages from Genesis and by the end of the semester we finished with the Book of Revelation (do not let Pastor Art hear you say "Revelations"!). On average, we broke down the six-hundred passages by learning around forty to fifty a week. We would have our weekly test, which would carry over the prior passages on top of previous ones. Next thing I knew I would find myself sitting in the car waiting for the gas tank to fill up and all the passages would start to flood my mind. I'd make it a game where I'd attempt to align them with the correct book and chapter. On Sundays when sitting during a church service I'd hear certain topics come up and I'd inevitably predict the passage which would be taught that morning. I would lean over to my wife and say, "church discipline, Matthew 17", then I'd then slap my forehead for being wrong as Pastor Micah says, "turn to Matthew 18 as we learn about church discipline."

In addition to our memorization, the first semester consisted of a few papers, tons of reading, quizzes, learning each book of the Bible, a Prayer Summit, and time management. TC has a huge emphasis on students making their wife and family a top priority. If we are studying more than we should within a week, the leadership would want to know. If our family life was lacking, they also wanted to know. The leaders of TC expect us to keep our marriage a top priority and to balance and discuss with our wife all that we are going through. We were told specifically to sacrifice our own time/hobbies/sleep first, not family. This was a learning curve for me at first as I attempted to do my reading once I had completed my day job. It was then my wife alerted me that reading was taking away from spending time with our little one. I was able to rearrange my reading time to either the morning or night, and able to spend family time once my day job was completed.

Second semester covered systematic theology and practical theology. Systematic theology consisted of subjects like Christology, pneumatology, soteriology, etc. While practical theology covered areas like elders and deacons, church leadership, and church discipline. This semester was busy but in a different way. We did not have six-hundred passages to memorize, but we had three papers a week to submit regarding multiple subjects. This semester was also fruitful for each student in that we were each assigned a theology group. Our theology group had about four to five students which we would meet with once a week to go over our assigned papers. Through this weekly meeting, many bonds were created, discussions were had, and new questions were being generated. My theology group met every Sunday morning at 7am in FBC's Theological Library. We had the unique advantage of getting into debates with one another and walking into the hallway to pull in a pastor to settle our debate, who would then proceed to tell us, "This is one of those issues

in which we will figure out once we get to heaven".

Second semester was also special in that we attended Shepherd's Conference at Grace Community Church. More bonding happened as we all stayed together in two Airbnbs, shared meals, and listened to amazing preaching on the topic of being unashamed. TC students were also encouraged to meet other attendees, most of whom were pastors, elders, or missionaries and had flown in from all over the world. The stories we heard from these men were impactful and uplifting.

By the end of the year, we had a very extensive take-home final along with an oral final. We capped off the vear with a graduation celebration at Topgolf with our wives. The graduation consisted of a diploma ceremony, brief encouragement to each man about how we've seen God work in and through them, dinner, and golf. I had second thoughts about joining TC initially, but I am extremely glad God led me to this decision. What I have learned from Year 1 alone would have made it all worthwhile even if I did not join the second or third year. I am currently enrolled in the second year with a focus on shepherding. Year 2 is an "introduction to preaching, teaching, block diagramming, exegesis, study, expositional theology, discernment in reading and leading, counseling, pastoral care, eldership, shepherding, training men, leadership, purpose, calling, weddings, funerals, finance, and more."

Completing TC has spurred me on to be a better shepherd of my family, equipped me to accurately handle the Scriptures, helped me co-lead a small group, and increased my confidence in answering questions with biblical truth. TC has also helped me learn my strengths and weaknesses. My theology was challenged and sharpened, and my understanding of some doctrines have changed due to our study of the Word. I have only seen the tip of the iceberg when it comes to all I know about the Bible and how God has made me. I'm excited to con-

tinue with Year 2 of TC as the Lord uses it to equip and grow me more into His likeness, for His glory.

What do Greg Laurie, a blind date, and an automobile accident have to do with our new members Brant and Kathy Beck? Keep reading.

Brant and Kathy were both born at San Antonio Community Hospital. Additionally, Brant's father, mother, daughters, and granddaughter were born there as well. Brant's claim to fame is that he was born on the exact same day as Greg Laurie.

Brant grew up in Ontario. He has one younger sister who also lives in California. He attended grammar school in Montclair and went on to Chaffey High School where he played on the basketball team. After graduation he earned an AA at Chaffey College. During high school he worked as a clerk for Alpha Beta markets – some of you will remember them. When he graduated from Chaffey College, he became a truck driver for Alpha Beta, delivering food throughout Southern and Northern California. He remained a Teamster driver in the food industry, finishing his career with Ralph's Grocery Company after 37 years of service. He retired in January 2007.

Brant and his family attended a local Congregational church during the time he was in elementary school and junior high but he eventually stopped going. Throughout his life he had believed in God having spent a lot of time outdoors observing nature. He knew there was a Creator who was far greater than himself. However, he had no concept about how Jesus fit into the picture. Finally, in retirement, sitting in a local Starbucks, he began to reflect on his life to that point and all of the blessings that he could see God had given him including his family, his marriage and his kids. One day at Starbucks he met a pastor from a local church. They began having coffee together regularly and Brant began asking questions. He got a Bible and started reading it. Then his oldest daughter began having difficulties with her pregnancy. Brant prayed and asked God to please give them a healthy grandchild. God answered that prayer. He vividly recalls feeling as if God was now asking him for a commitment and he gave his life to Christ in June 2009.

Over the next eleven years Brant had the opportunity to minister and share his faith with his parents. His mother rededicated her life to Christ in 2014. God provided one last opportunity for him to share the Gospel with his father who came to Christ in 2020 just hours before he passed away.

Kathy grew up in Upland, the youngest of three girls and attended elementary through high school in Upland. She attended a few classes at Chaffey College while

working full time at United California Bank. She then worked as a legal secretary for two years and subsequently as a secretary for Bank of America until her first daughter was born. Kathy was a stay-at-home mom, raising her two girls until 1985 when she began working for the Alta Loma School District. She remained there for 25 years and retired in 2014.

Kathy grew up in a Christian home and attended a Baptist church in Ontario. At the age of eight her dad asked her if she wanted to walk down the aisle to accept Christ, which she did. However, at the age of ten she sensed that she wanted to make a recommitment on her own. So at the Lord's prompting, she did just that.

The story of how she and Brant met involves a blind date and an automobile accident. Kathy had a girlfriend who was supposed to go on a blind date with a young man who, unfortunately, had a terrible automobile accident on the day of the blind date. Kathy's friend wanted to meet the guy anyway and asked Kathy to accompany her to the hospital. After they met him and had left, the young man told his friend, Brant, that he needed to meet Kathy. Brant agreed to meet her but only after seeing a picture of her. Their first meeting was in the waiting room of San Antonio Hospital. He gave Kathy and her friend a ride home that evening, Kathy asked him to come in and meet her family and the rest, as they say, is history. They married two years later and will be celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary this September. They have two daughters, one who is married with two children and another single daughter who lives nearby.

Brant and Kathy found FBC when Brant searched the web for "Bible teaching churches in Rancho Cucamonga." Their initial plan was to attend several churches and FBC was just the first one on the list when they visited this last February. However, the expository preaching, the warmth of the people here and the affiliation with the Master's Seminary and John MacArthur (one of Brant's favorite people) made it clear they had found their church home.

Brant and Kathy enjoy riding motorcycles, both on and off road. The best trip Brant's taken was last October. It was a one week trip to the eastern Sierras to spread his dad's ashes. She got to hang out with Mick Fleetwood who was playing with his own band there at the rally. They enjoy traveling and have been everywhere from the Caribbean to Hawaii. 
