

From the Pastor's Desk Hello Church!

As I write this it is two days after my first Sunday with you as your pastor, and what a Sunday it was! First, I want to thank you for the wonderful welcome that you all have extended to my family and to me. We received warm smiles, handshakes and hugs. We received amazing quilts from hard-working artisans (quilts that my children are carrying all over the house as their personal blankets, thank you!). But best of all, we received the opportunity to worship with you and to begin to see what God has in mind for the next chapter in our church's history.

Over the last year there has been a refrain running through my head and heart; "Our best days are always in front of us." It's a bit counter-intuitive, isn't it? Some of us are closer to the finish of this life than the beginning, and age is taking away some of the capacities we've relied on, and things hurt that didn't hurt before. Some of us may have gone through a great catastrophe in our lives; a divorce, a death, the loss of a job. Some may be idolizing some event or time period in our past, and we're ever trying to recapture it. How could it be that our best days are still in front of us?

I came to this conviction in preaching through the book of Revelation in 2023. The book of Revelation is meant to explain what the churches of Asia Minor were experiencing in their own lives, to pull back the curtain of history to see God at work, and God and his people winning even as Christians are being persecuted and are dying. Believe it or not, this is actually the primary focus of the book of Revelation – despite appearances God is accomplishing through his people exactly what He set out to do. But Revelation also points us to something else – there is a day when this world is done, when all that is broken, corrupt, and even evil will be cast out and the whole creation, including you and I, refreshed, resurrected, and set free for an eternity of how things were always meant to be.

The Apostle Paul summarizes this well in the second half of the first chapter of his letter to the Philippians, especially in verse 21: "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." Our days are not defined by the aches and pains, by the heartbreaks we experience, by the loss of our youth or our capacities. Our days here are "in Christ," and are defined by our growing closeness to him in appreciating his benefits, in beginning to live his life, and in enjoying him forever. Outside of Christ we might believe that weakness, pain, and even catastrophic circumstances diminish our lives, but in Christ we know that they function to help us strip off the old person and put on the new person (Eph. 4:22-24). Every day of our lives has been laid out on purpose by God and they are full of meaning and significance. In this life our best days are always still in front of us because each day we can be more and more in Christ as he brings his resurrection power to bear on us. To live is Christ!

And to die is gain. There is something better than the best this world has to offer waiting for us. "[God] has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you." (1 Peter 1:3-4) We can draw

strength today from the fact that "this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison..." (2 Cor. 4:17). So each day brings us closer to the realization of all that is best and most glorious for us and we don't have to try to recapture some era in our church's life, or in our own lives. Those happiest and most productive seeming days we look back upon were themselves meant to point us forward in anticipation of the greater thing God will do!

It doesn't matter how old or young you are, how much you have lost or gained in this life, or how irretrievable a good future seems for you. Your best days, and our best days, are still ahead. To live is Christ – increasing intimacy with him and a greater experience of his benefits, as well as exactly the exciting work God has planned for us. These days are on purpose! And then, at the end:

And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away."

Let's get ready for a great adventure together!



Hosanna in the Highest!

Now that Christmas has passed, we are now in the Lenten Season, preparing music to help us worship our Lord and Savior. This March brings us the Celebration of Palm Sunday, commemorating Jesus Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem. It is associated in many churches with the blessing and procession of palms. This year the Chancel Choir will be singing the anthem, "Wave the Palms, Hosanna!" for Palm Sunday. This piece tells the story of Jesus entering Jerusalem on a colt just as the prophet promised, with the children singing, while people wave the palms and throw the branches at his feet. Blessed is he



who comes! We sing "Hosanna!" In most churches the palms are often taken home by the members of the congregation to serve as sacred sign of the sacraments, and some of them are burned the following year to serve as the ashes for Ash Wednesday.

Immediately after Palm Sunday comes Maundy Thursday. Christ's "mandate" is commemorated on Maundy Thursday..."maundy" being a shortened form of mandatum, which in Latin means "command." It was on the Thursday of Christ's final week before being crucified and resurrected that He said this commandment to His disciples. Jesus and his disciples had just shared what was known as the Last Supper and he was washing their feet when he stated: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; just as I have loved you, you also are to love on another" (John 13:34). The choir will be singing two pieces from a Cantata called "The Lenten Sketches" that focus on some of the last days of Christ's life. The anthem, "From An Upper Room," tells the story of the Last Supper, sharing bread and wine with his disciples. The anthem, "Scenes From Gethsemane," tells us as a congregation about the special place of quiet and solitude for Jesus. It is here following the Passover meal that Jesus and the disciples seek comfort and refuge beneath a canopy of olive trees. Suddenly the golden stars shining in the distance became torches of violence. Led by Judas, armed Centurions burst into the sanctuary of the garden looking for Jesus. "Father, let Thy will be done," He spoke as he rose to face His destiny. "Scenes from Gethsemane" gives us a powerful insight of what Jesus faced, giving his life for us to be saved.

Finally, we come to this year's Easter Sunday service, celebrating the resurrection of our savior, Jesus Christ. During this service the congregation, along with the Praise Team and Chancel Choir, will be singing, "Christ the Lord is Risen Today," and "Let It Rise!" Later within the service, during the Offertory, the Praise Team will be singing "Alive Forever, Amen." The end of the service will be celebrated with the congregation singing "Lift High the Cross, the Love of Christ we proclaim, Till all the world adore His name."

Hosanna in the highest means more than praise and adoration. Rather the word itself means save us. It is used as a crying out for help, salvation, and freedom. It is during this time we celebrate our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, for giving His life so that we will be saved.
