From the Pastor's Desk

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Adaptive change is my topic for this month's Trumpet article. Adaptive change.

Tod Bolsinger wrote a book entitled "Canoeing The Mountains." He used the example of the Lewis and Clark Expedition to explain what is adaptive change. Specifically, Lewis and Clark were charged with the responsibility of exploring the newly acquired Louisiana Purchase. As Bolsinger wrote, "They believed, like everyone before them, that the unexplored west was exactly the same geography as the familiar east. [Theirs] is the story of what [happened] when they discovered that they – and everyone else before them – had been wrong." (p.13)



The gist of their discovery was that they encountered the Rocky Mountains. They had been looking for and expecting a water route from the Mississippi River to the Pacific Ocean. They had prepared and stocked their canoes. Then, they were looking at mountains – mountains that the canoes would not cross.

That disruption in course is adaptive change. Their purpose of exploration remained the same, but all their techniques and strategies needed to be re-thought. Bolsinger wrote, "The changing world around us and even the success we had experienced had brought us to a new place where we would need a new strategy. To paraphrase Marshall Goldsmith, 'What got us *here* wouldn't take us *there*.'" (p. 19)

To see how we respond to adaptive change, just consider life in the 1970's versus life today – compare the impact of our lives with the advent of the computer age and the internet. It's a bit different. It is difficult for our children to imagine life with three network channels, broadcast radio, and landline telephones that you have to rotary dial with your finger.

My arrival here to serve as pastor caused some changes. Those changes were more about style and preferences than disruption. The gospel remains unchanged. The Great Commission remains unchanged. The worship services and many activities continued, slightly modified, but someone who came to visit after being away would recognize most of what is happening.

And then came this pandemic. This pandemic is a more sudden change. It absolutely disrupted the plans and strategies we had for developing ministry and reaching out into the community. Everything came to a stop.

Now, going into our sixth month of this new environment, we are recognizing that things are not going to simply return to how they were. The truth is, "What got us *here* won't take us *there*."

We are in the midst of adaptive change. The gospel remains the same. The Great Commission remains our charge. *How* we pursue the Great Commission is where the change is taking place. The simplest illustration is that we have had to focus on electronic media ministry. Electronic media ministry was not a priority at the beginning of March this year; frankly, it was not even on the radar.

In the short term, the only way for the congregation to share a worship experience has been through the videos we have posted on YouTube. (Imagine *that* sentence being uttered in the 1970's.) In the longer term – as the safety measures have continued beyond weeks and into months, and as we look forward and contemplate what impact these changes will have in the years ahead – we are looking at other paradigm-shifting realities. Throughout all my career, one of the truths has been that we have sought to do ministry by gathering the largest number of people together to worship, study, fellowship, evangelize, and serve. Whether in the sanctuary, youth ministry, study groups, mission projects, or retreats, we always prayed and hoped that many people would attend.

Not so much, now. The canoes that got us here are not going to take us over the mountains we face.

The paradigm-shift has been to ministry in much smaller contexts. How do we reach and share gospel fellowship with one family at time, a person at a time, or with just as few people as possible involved in the production? How do we reach the lost, searching, hurting, and seeking in our community when we are socially distancing?

I have come a long way to make this point: the next season of our life and ministry together are going to be filled with experimentation and change. Not all of it is going to be successful, and not all of it is going to be smooth. We are in for a bit of a bumpy ride. Just as we are learning technology, so we are re-learning how to do relationships and to build community.

Here's my ask of you: please pray for the congregation, leadership, and staff as we navigate these new territories together. Be patient and know that we are going to need to give grace to one another. Perhaps this word from Paul to the Colossians says it best:

Col. 3:12 As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. ¹³ Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. 14 Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. ¹⁵ And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. ¹⁶ Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. ¹⁷ And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

If we can do that, I am confident that God will use our example as a shining witness to the community into which we have been sent as His ambassadors.



In a time whasking, "V" give yo churk" In a time when we are unable to meet regularly in large groups, as we are used to doing, you may be asking, "What IS happening in Family Ministries?" That's a great question, and I'm excited to be able to give you an amazing answer, one that is an answer to prayer and is a blessing and encouragement to our church family and beyond. As you probably already know, we are in the middle of a 16-week YouTube series, folding Noah's ark – Noah, the ark, animals, and a rainbow, with members of our congregation. > "But how are you going to do that?" you wonder. Moving ahead we need to focus on small groups. That may be a family or a few unrelated people who are comfortable with meeting, while following safety protocols. We will be focusing on skill development in a project orientation, giving students and families the tools and knowledge needed to create content for worship. This video projects ill have a theological foundation because our students will have to understand the basis of what they are presenting in order to create solid, Biblically based messages. All of this is coming together quickly, and we will be sure you know when projects are developed and ready to be presented. It's a new, exciting way of looking at ministry!




What is one of your favorite places in the world?

On Anxiety and Unity -

We live in an age of anxiety where every day we are bombarded with advice by the culture on how to best tame our anxieties. And clearly, there is not unity in our culture, especially right now as every tiny action becomes a political issue. It doesn't have to be this way.

As individual Christians, we are told in Philippians 4:6 "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." If we would begin with this before seeking any other wisdom, we would do well. And those of us who are so broken (I include myself in this), as to need a listening ear, would do well to bring our concerns and cares to Jesus first. Now, sometimes it might seem like He isn't listening. Redoubling our prayers and opening our ears while we wait upon the Lord to bring the answer to our issues will ease our anxiety if we believe that Jesus has the answers. As Christians, we need to get our house in order before we can help others do the same. Once that happens, then we can shine Jesus' light wherever we go.



Some of us may be very anxious in this pandemic, about returning to live worship in our Sanctuary. That is valid. The scientists that are working the pandemic have far more knowledge now than when they began. Each of us needs to assess our risk in groups and live accordingly. Some of us may feel that the risk of secluding ourselves from worship is greater than our risk of getting the virus by attending a live worship service. Others may feel the opposite. There were no manuals handed to scientists or church leaders when this began that would tell us how to proceed. None of us is infallible. Most of us want the best for each and every person who is in our congregation and community.

This leads me to my other topic - unity. Because there is disunity in the culture, we <u>must</u> be unified in Christ as a beacon of hope to this community and to the world. One thing the pandemic has done particularly well is to almost instantaneously change our inward focus as a church to an outreach through the digital means we have used to provide worship services each week. Because we have had to re-tool the worship service into a taped version, and because these tapes have been put up on our channel on YouTube each week, we have also gained some followers from outside our community. This is a good thing! But in doing so, and as we return to worship in our Sanctuary and Family Life Center, it is particularly important that we do so in a way that is honoring to God. Hebrews 13:17 says "Have confidence in your leaders and submit to their authority, because they keep watch over you as those who must give an account. Do this so that their work will be a joy, not a burden, for that would be of no benefit to you." The writer is speaking to congregants about their church leaders in this passage.

Recently, Christianity Today has published several articles on their website (christianitytoday.com), in which they have interviewed several church pastors and seminarians regarding what to do when you disagree with the church regarding reopening. One very helpful comment by a pastor indicated that the best course is to let that leader know your concerns in a respectful and kind dialogue and to not reach out to other church members to gather support for your agenda. In addition, it's not fair to openly criticize the leader's decision. If you are not comfortable attending, its ok to stay at home and watch the video or live stream of the service. We need to support our pastor. It is a tough decision to make regarding whether to reopen or not.

A second opinion voiced in this article caught me quite by surprise, and could be considered very direct. I will quote it, though I understand it might actually be a bit too much truth for some: "We should heed our church leaders' decisions with humility and love. We trust that they have prayerfully considered all of the risks and benefits to their congregants and their neighborhoods. We lovingly and humbly join them in prayer about those decisions and then we trust them, even when we do not agree or understand. Our ability to submit to each other might be the true test of our commitment to Christian community and it also should be what is distinctive about the church. We should ask ourselves: am I only committed on my terms, and as long as my individual needs are met? If the answer is yes, I would argue that you are seeking a country club. The church is much larger than our own comfort." (Kathryn Freeman, seminarian, writer, and cohost of Melanated Faith Podcast) — emphasis, mine.

So, admittedly, we are all weary of the restrictions that we must maintain. We DO want what's best for each other, our church community and our community at large. Although I may not agree with some things, I will follow as I am being led because it will achieve what God wants to have happen in our community. He is still in control! We are His servants and we wish you all the best as we continue to move through this journey.

Chancel Choir Members:

1) Please bring your folders and music from this spring, back if you have not already done so. When (if), we do choir later this fall, a new folder will be assigned you. I need to get all of last spring's music so I can check it in and file it. Thank you

2) As we return to worship at FPC, things will look a bit different. We will not be able to have a choir right away because of both the restrictions on numbers in the Sanctuary and the risk of exposure due to aerosol. Choirs, by their very nature must be able to hear each other and cannot maintain the 6 foot distancing required because of the sound and mic'ing issues that happen. The wonderful online choirs that were popping up on the internet all summer required each individual to separately tape to a metronome while singing solo, and then submit their tape so that it could be processed and collated during post production. This yielded a wonderful choral sound that seemed to be completely in sync. There are many hours involved in this type of tape vignette and the files are very large. We are trying to get our worship service up and running on live stream, so our technical folks will be focusing on that for the moment. I will be contacting the choir members (and former members who might be able and available), to work some small groups as well as duet and trio / quartet work for the fall season. IF the virus abates enough that we don't have to wear masks in service, then we will consider doing an Advent Choir. In the meantime, if you are a member or would like to be a member of the choir and have no problem singing without a mask on the platform, then I would be interested in speaking with you as I get various people together to bring music into our fall services.



The Old Sanctuary

I'm sure you have heard renewed interest in revitalizing our Old Sanctuary. In today's history-destructive climate, it is especially important to preserve our historic structures.

Our First Presbyterian Church has held services continuously since 1861. The Old Sanctuary building is the oldest church in Nevada. It was designated an historical building in 1975 by the Carson City Historical Commission and the Board of Supervisors. It is registered # 285 on the American Presbyterian and Reform

Historical Registry, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The Presbyterian church in Virginia City is # 308.



A steering commission has been formed to research what and how preservation can be accomplished. Members are Craig Clark, Jane & John Hancock, John MacSween, Ken Pearson, and Bob & Grace Speicher.

We believe any preservation can be accomplished in phases. In 1996, a Seismic Rehabilitation Cost Estimate Project, prepared by Melvyn Green & Associates, was estimated to be \$147,719; with passage of time and inflation, this amount will increase. The intent is to raise funds to complete each phase.

The first fund raiser was our successful Rummage Sale raising \$6,072.75. We are looking for those of you who would like to help seek funds for this effort. I have many ideas to accomplish this goal. Call Grace Speicher for more information.
