From the Pastor's Workshop

### "PAVING THE WAY"

After Pentecost the first followers of Jesus came to be known as followers of "The Way". This is rooted in Jesus' telling the disciples, "I am *the way*". It speaks of the way of salvation; the path to the new life of belonging to God in Christ Jesus. I find it very important that Jesus referred to himself with the definite article, THE way. It is what I have called, "exclusively inclusive"; that is, only Jesus could say this, but he said it so that the *whole world* could know *the way* of salvation that comes from him alone.

The reason I think this is vitally important is that we are living in a very ambiguous time in which every way is to be tolerated as correct and equally valuable. "Far be it for one dogma to run over someone else's karma" or so the saying goes. But what if not all ways are hopeful? What if a way of thinking does not include or even purposely excludes the way of Jesus Christ? Jesus did not give himself for the world so that all ambiguous ways could be regarded as the same value. He gave himself to pave the way into right relationship with God for eternity.

If we are going to follow Jesus we are going to be people who pave the way for others to know this exclusive inclusivity. And the way this happens is when we can make knowing Jesus Christ personally something that provides a passageway for others to know this for themselves. We are part of something God started before there was time. He paved the way over the rubble of our disobedience and ignorance of himself by coming in person and laying down his life so that we may know God's grace. Leading people to this way and pavement is the purpose of our being Jesus' followers. Each of us is part of the "road crew."

I think it is a fun honor to be part of *the way* that started doing this paving in Nevada at the very beginning. For over 150 years people have been led onto the path of knowing Jesus as Lord in this place. People have paved the way for us. They marked the path. They did the hard work that said, "This way". They lovingly marked the dead ends and showed us from their experience what doesn't work on the way home.

There is a very practical side to this. It is the gathering together again and again and again and again such that a groove is worn on the path to the cross of surrender. It shows people the way home.

We are in a season in which we have been called to make the way clear in a very literal fashion. The walkway on our lawn is in disrepair. The part that is covered is worn out. We don't have adequate lighting. It isn't safe. And perhaps most of all, the cross isn't clear. We get to change this as God calls us to pave the way so that people who live in or visit Carson City can see the compelling call to come and know Jesus and HIS WAY.

This will happen as WE ALL play our part in rebuilding this space and lifting high the message of the cross. If you can provide some literal paving material that is wonderful, but equally and perhaps more important is your enthusiasm for what God has called us to do so that people know the way into this place and in turn into a new life in Jesus.

Please join me in praying for how God would lead us as his people in leading others on to the way as together we join in paying the way.

## "A PRESCRIPTION FOR WELCOMING PEOPLE"

The Walkway Project has been an exciting and inspirational moments of consideration to the members of the Buildings and Grounds committee and presents multiple benefits of improved access, prominence and safety to the First Presbyterian Church. Its concepts and functions have been a transition of much input and deliberation.

First and foremost to any body of persons is safety in consideration of the congregation and the public that visit our building. Longstanding has been the issue of the walkway adjacent to the east side of the education building. The surface of the sidewalk creates some liability wherein "trip hazards" exist. The concern of this situation and its needed improvement was expressed by insurance reviewers, and precipitated dialog which has resulted in plans for enhancement to this area of the property.

Acknowledged also, is the issue of inclement weather which renders the walkway unusable and potentially dangerous requiring attention of maintenance. Snow and ice accumulates on this shaded side of the building with quantities falling from the roof of the building. The practicality and safety of a covered walkway stimulated dialog determining how the design would enhance the building while safely providing access to doors leading into the sanctuary.

The opportunity for enhancement to this side of the building emerged. The overall prominence of a covered and lighted walkway creates an inviting physical environment to draw visitors and members into the church in our calling and duty to make disciples of all people. The architectural and concept designs have been the hard work of elder Darrin Berger.

The cross currently attached to the wall will have more significance, being extended out and above the roof covering and above the semi-circular portion of the walkway. The enhanced walkway with inscribed pavers and circular area created much discussion on how this area might otherwise be utilized for outdoor gatherings and social events.

Your support of the walkway project will genuinely improve the church building, its appearance, prominence and its function as it demonstrates to the community a growing family of faith providing a sanctuary for communion with God.

#### **DIRTY WINDOWS -**

I have some windows that need cleaning. I can barely see beyond them. I cleaned them about 4 months ago, but they need cleaning again. I have attitudes that need changing as well. I can barely see beyond myself and my needs sometimes, and yet as a Christian, I am called to lift up others ahead of myself.

From the book of Luke: (Jesus speaking)

23 Then he said to them all:"Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. 24 For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will save it. 25 What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, and yet lose or forfeit their very self? 26 Whoever is ashamed of me and my words, the Son of Man will be ashamed of them when he comes in his glory and in the glory of the Father and of the holy angels. (NIV)

#### "CHRISTIAN FAITH AND POLITICAL DECISIONS"

The life of Jesus has a real meaning for us as we prepare for the election on Tuesday. We are all faced with a concrete and specific decision. We shall cast our ballot for a man [sic] who we think ought to be president of the United States. . . . In short, we shall have to translate our Christian faith into specific deeds on Tuesday. . . .

None of us is likely to find this a very simple responsibility. It would be very simple if one candidate appeared wholly corrupt and the record of his party wholly evil, if we had adequate and accurate information, and if the issues involved were not complex. . . .

As Jesus told the man to take heed and beware of covetousness, so he says to us on Tuesday, "Take heed and beware." The church does not tell us how to vote, but it does tell us to take heed and beware of the motives that lie behind our votes....

[1] Take heed and beware of covetousness.... The Christian... has an advantage of being aware of this temptation. A Christian can at least take heed. A Christian can at least criticize a ballot in the light of what Jesus Christ has said. A Christian at least knows that the vote ought to be determined by something more important than personal gain.... Reinhold Niebuhr has reminded us that Christians are distinguished in political decisions by contrition and a capacity for self-criticism, not by any infallibility....

Material prosperity will damn us in the long run if it is bought at the price of human blood and suffering. An abundance of money in our pockets will curse us if gotten by the oppression or neglect of our fellow man. Special privilege will wreak vengeance upon us if it is based upon injustice.

[2] Jesus might have said, "Take heed. Beware of a political partisanship that goes deeper than Christian faith." The real question is not so much how we vote but whether our political loyalties go deeper than our loyalty to Christ. No Christian can ever be a reverent member of a political party or of any human organization, for reverence belongs only to God. Every Christian must be somewhat irreverent toward political parties and toward every human organization. Christians must not take such claims too seriously and must criticize a party by a deeper loyalty to Christ. . . .

The reverse side of this warning against a political partisanship that goes deeper than Christian faith is the positive task of criticizing our political action by faith... Our special task it to apply the teaching of Jesus to our decisions in politics and to the issues of the day. Our first allegiance is to Christ, and in the light of that allegiance we must act in the realm of politics.

The church does not tell us how to vote. It does insist that we vote in such a way that we can feel satisfied with ourselves when we read the Sermon on the Mount or the story of the Good Samaritan of the account of the last judgment....

This very important fact distinguishes a Christian vote: The Christian decides how to vote in light of Christian faith, in the light of a loyalty that is deeper than politics. . . .

[3] Jesus might also say, "Take heed, and beware of political revivalism." We like to think of ourselves as rational people, but few if any of our decisions are made on the basis of reason alone. Politicians have taken advantage of this fact during the past few months. They have been lambasting the multitudes with threats of hell-fire and damnation. . . .

Political revivalism is more dangerous and deadly than religious revivalism. The religious revivalists appeal to fear of hell, which doesn't hurt the average person too much and in most cases may be definitely salutary. But political revivalism appeals to hate--to hate of other races, to hate of other classes, to hate of other nations. It creates suspicion and thrives upon it. Its method is one of reckless disregard for truth and of personal vilification.

[4] Jesus would also say, "Take heed and beware of arrogance." . . . We need to beware lest we lose respect for honest and intelligent people who differ with us politically. For this respect in one of the

bases of democracy and is an expression of Christian humility. This respect is an article both of our Christian and of our democratic faith that no single person is either good enough or wise enough to have all the answers. The honest and intelligent person who differs with us may possibly be right....

True humility also means that we are repentant for our involvement in the sins of our nation and world. None of us has clean hands when it comes to corruption in government, to character assassination, to hate of fellow man, to war. These things would not exist if we, the people, were different. The notion that we are innocent in these matters is at best a pious fiction and at worse a pious fraud. Abraham Lincoln never took it for granted that God was on the side of his party or nation. W. H. Auden puts it this way: "All true democracy begins with free confession of our sins."

Political, social, and economic activities are--as Reinhold Niebuhr taught--always morally ambiguous. We do not have simple choices between good and evil. All political and economic activity involves us in evil as well as good. Hence the Christian must always pray for forgiveness . . . .

Jesus refused to involve himself in the details of political life in his day. Many were disappointed that he did not lead a campaign against Rome. His vocation was not the ordering of society. Ours is not the vocation of Jesus but the vocation of his followers who--as best as we can in the complicated and ambiguous issues of American life--seek to do what is possible for a more just, humane, and productive society.

The church does not dictate our vote.... The church does tell us that our vote must be cast as an expression of our faith. The vote must point in the direction of brotherhood, justice, peace, and a productive society. The vote must be against hate, injustice, any needless shedding of blood, and parasitical ways of life....


#### TRUMPET HELPERS NEEDED!


