#### From the Pastor's Desk

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

October begins with World Communion Sunday. We highlight this day as a way of looking beyond the bounds of our campus; we gaze much more broadly and widely to reflect on the omnipotence, omnipresence, and awesomeness of God. Originally called World-Wide Communion Sunday, the idea for this day is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor. It was an attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity. It was a reminder of the importance of Jesus'



church, and a re-statement of how each congregation is interconnected one with another. Celebration of World-Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to participate from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread.

October concludes with Reformation Day (October 31). It is the anniversary of Martin Luther's posting of the 95 Theses on the Wittenberg Door in 1517. We mark that as the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. Pro – meaning in favor; testate – meaning bearing witness; in other words, Martin Luther and those who followed were speaking to the church in favor of bearing a faithful witness. They were looking for the church to be more faithful to her Lord.

Following Luther were a whole series of individuals who were personally invested and called to seek to reform – correct – the church. They were excommunicated by the Roman Catholic hierarchy or they left, either of which put them in grave danger for their lives. On more than one occasion, Luther had to flee for his life and be hidden by benefactors.

Among those who rose to prominence after Luther were John Calvin and John Knox. Calvin was a lawyer turned pastor. He wrote Calvin's Institutes, which became the go-to piece for understanding what is known as "Reformed" theology. He highlighted the sovereignty of God; the unique saving grace of Christ alone; the blessing of faith; and, the importance of Scriptural authority. This may all seem like dull academia now, but it was the substance of great controversies during those years. And, truth be told, it is the substance of many great controversies today – it is just that the issues are cloaked in different language.

John Knox was a Scot who went to study with Calvin and brought Calvin's teachings back to Scotland with him. From Knox comes Presbyterians, and that's where we got our start. For me personally, Knox has been a blessing because he helped me understand what to seek in a church. Knox was the primary author of the Scots Confession, which I referenced last month, and in it he describes the marks of the true kirk, or true church: the Word rightly preached, the sacraments rightly administered, and discipline uprightly effected.

Last month, I began this little series by looking at the "Word rightly preached." This month, I will focus on the sacraments baptism and the Lord's supper – rightly administered. Actually, the full phrase in Knox's Scots Confession is, "the right administration of the sacraments of Christ Jesus, with which must be associated the Word and promise of God to seal and confirm them in our hearts."

We baptize in response to Jesus' command in the Great Commission of Matthew 28: "Go, therefore, into all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Baptism is the sign and seal of incorporation into Christ. Jesus through his own baptism identified himself with sinners in order to fulfill all righteousness. In baptism, we participate in Jesus' death and resurrection. We die to what separates us from God and are raised to newness of life in Christ.

The water of baptism links us to the goodness of God's creation and to the grace of God's covenants with Noah and Israel. In his ministry, Jesus offered the gift of living water. So, baptism is the sign and seal of God's grace and covenant in Christ. We only baptize once – the promises made at baptism reflect God's eternal, unchanging, and unbreakable covenant. We do not re-baptize; however, when someone has experienced a renewal or transformative moment later in life (whether baptized as an infant or with a profession of faith), we will celebrate God's goodness by reaffirming the promises made at baptism.

That's a very short and abstract explanation. What is important to know is that we baptize in obedience to Christ's command.

We celebrate the Lord's supper in response to Jesus' command to "do this in remembrance of me." The Lord's Supper is the sign and seal of eating and drinking in communion with the crucified and risen Lord. The New Testament describes the meal as a participation in Christ and with one another in the expectation of the Kingdom and as a foretaste of the messianic banquet.

The Lord's supper remembers Christ: the mystery of his incarnation; the obedience of his life and passion; his sacrificial and atoning death on the cross; his victory in God's raising him from the dead; and his ascension and eternal glory at the right hand of God the Father. The Lord's supper is sustaining today: we are encouraged by being believers in this place called together by Christ to celebrate God's grace revealed in him. The Lord's supper is a renewal of the promise: we anticipate the great banquet and marriage feast when God's kingdom is fully realized and we join in the party face-to-face.

We celebrate the Lord's supper regularly. It is a public act of witness, even when it is done with only a few believers present. It is a way to extend the promises of Scripture to believers and to sustain them through the times of trial they are experiencing. The Lord's supper reminds us of our humble standing before God: that is, we are sinners who are the recipients of grace, adopted by God to be his children, and inheritors of the great promises of God.

That, too, is a very short and abstract explanation. Again, what is important to know is that we celebrate the Lord's supper in obedience to Christ's command.

I know this is a long *Trumpet* article; however, there was a lot to cover. Next month, we will look at ecclesiastical discipline, uprightly effected, whereby virtue is nourished and vice is repressed.

My hope and prayer is that you will be encouraged by seeing God's hand at work in our midst – in these articles; in the worship, ministry, and mission in which we are participating; and, in your own lives.

## Singing In the Shadow of His Wings

A few weeks ago, my husband, Carl and I had the privilege of attending the SING!2019 conference for pastors, music leaders, children's ministers and really anyone in church leadership. We thank our respective churches, Christ Presbyterian and First Presbyterian, for allowing us to attend this amazing conference! We listened to the teaching of several well-known pastors and had the opportunity to participate in an abridged version of Handel's Messiah, complete with soloists and orchestra. The conference is a 5 year program that has been initiated by Keith and Kristyn Getty and their team that seeks to renew the worship of churches through study of Jesus Christ's ministry. There is always plenty of music and breakout sessions that go into more detail on pastoring, songwriting, leading various sized church and the like.



One of the speakers who has been at all three of the events so far is Joni Eareckson Tada. Joni has been confined to a wheelchair as a quadriplegic for over 50 years! She has spearheaded ministries for people with disabilities. Her life story is told in the book, "Joni: An Unforgettable Story" (published 1976). Her's is an incredible witness of how Jesus can use brokenness! In all her physical and emotional challenges, Joni continues to sing to God whether she is feeling joy or seeking joy.

Psalm 59 says, "But I will sing of your strength; I will sing aloud of your steadfast love in the morning. For you have been to me a fortress and a refuge in the day of my distress." And Psalm 63 speaks of God's love "because your steadfast love is better than life, my lips will praise you. So I will bless you as long I live; in your name I will lift up my hands. My soul will be satisfied as with fat and rich food, and my mouth will praise you with joyful lips" "for you have been my help, and in the shadow of your wings I will sing for joy." Joni has certainly known distress and despair in her life, and yet she says with the psalmist, "I will sing for joy"! Over the years, Joni has discovered that Scripture commands us to sing, both as individual Christians and as the corporate body called the Church.

She cites an article written by Tom Olson, Campus Pastor at The Orchard Evangelical Free Church in Barrington, Illinois. Olson makes seven points about singing that are worth exploring:

- \* When you sing, you obey it is not an option in God's Word. It is a command. We are doing what God asks (Ephesians 5: 18-19 and Colossians 3:16)
- \* When you sing, you dig deep roots into the Word the Apostle Paul exhorts to let God's Word dwell in us richly. The first way is through teaching, but the second point is singing (Colossians 3:16)
- \* When you sing, you build up others First you build up fellow believers, and then you are a witness to unbelievers (Ephesians 5:19, Colossians 3: 15-16, Psalm 105:1-2).
- \* When you sing, you make war a singing heart does not have room for the work of the evil one and the power of sin.
- \* When you sing, you are spiritually strengthened for trial Think of Paul and Silas in Acts 16. They were imprisoned for the sake of the Gospel, and they sang while imprisoned. Their obedience led to the jailer and all his family being baptized!
- When you sing, you walk a God-designed pathway to joy Joni mentioned that sometimes singing gives birth to joy and sometimes joy gives birth to singing. But persistently in Scripture, joy and singing are bound together (Psalms 63:7, James 5:13)
- \* When you sing, you glorify God Singing has a unique way of bringing your heart, soul, mind and strength together in order to focus completely on God. Try using it in your life to combat distraction and refocus yourself where your attention rightfully belongs —on God.

So as Joni sings through her hardships, she notes that Christ also sang — on the night He was betrayed, even though He would face unthinkable pain and suffering. God wants to hear our voices raised to Him in praise.




