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Week of Prayer & Fasting Guide

We have many rhythms of prayer in the life of Frontline Church, but there are seasons where we call the church to slow down, pause, fast, and pray. The Week of Prayer and Fasting is an invitation to join God's heart and mission and to have intentional space to pray together for God's church and our cities.

We invite everyone to join together as families, community groups, and discipleship groups to gather and pray during the Week of Prayer and Fasting. There will be gathering times from 12 PM - 1 PM at each congregation to join others in prayer. A prayer guide is offered to all those who are unable to attend noon prayer.

We are asking, seeking, and knocking on the door of Jesus, the King of the kingdom without end. He is Christ crucified and Christ resurrected. He lives, moves, works, and never sleeps. Please consider adjusting your schedules to join us in prayer!

Advent Week I

Devotional:

What does it mean to hope for something? Maybe you are hoping for a certain gift for Christmas or hoping to have ice cream after dinner. Those are exciting things, but during this season of Advent, we get to focus on the hope of a coming savior, something that changes our lives forever.

The Old Testament is full of God’s people hoping for a savior. In Genesis 3, sin enters the world and separates us from God. God set his great rescue plan in motion to get his children back. God’s people have left him a lot of times to follow themselves, but he never gave up on them. God sent prophets to help tell his people that a rescuer was coming. This gave his people hope for a long time!

God kept that promise to send Jesus. We also can have hope that Jesus is coming again! During Advent, we can feel both excitement and joy because Jesus came and longing for him to come again.

Pray and thank God for the gift of Jesus!

Family Activity:

This week spend some time as a family cooking or baking something together. Christmas cookies, brownies, a special dinner, whatever you have on hand. Take a moment to help your kids engage the feelings of waiting and hoping for an outcome while you cook. Remind them that in hope we prepare for the coming savior!

Advent Week II

The Resurrection of the Dead

Resurrection is often thought of as a theme reserved solely for Easter. Instead, our Easter hope is meant to fill the rest of the year and the rest of our days. Advent and Easter go hand-in-hand to proclaim to us that sin and death don't get the final word. In the birth of Jesus, we see the in-breaking of God in our world. In his rising, we see the victory of God and his offer of life to all who would look on his Son.

1 Corinthians 15:12-25

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. 19 If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. But each in his own order: Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet.

Devotional:

We learned last week that waiting for a Rescuer was hard for God's people. Waiting is hard, especially waiting for a long time. When all hope seemed far away, the savior was going to come. One day an angel came to a young girl named Mary and gave her the best news of all time. God's promise was coming true. Everything was changing. She was going to have a baby and he would be God in the flesh! He was the one that was promised all those years ago. Mary sang a song and rejoiced, praising God for who He is. We can praise God just like Mary as we celebrate Advent and Jesus coming to be with us.

Spend time as a family this week naming the ways that God keeps his promises. Thank him for his faithfulness and kindness to his people.

Family Activity:

Supplies - Vinegar, baking soda, water bottle, balloon

1. Pour vinegar into the water bottle filling it about halfway.
2. Put some baking soda into the balloon (do this where your kids can't see).
3. Attach the balloon to the water bottle. Be careful not to get any baking soda in the bottle.
4. Remind the kids about the waiting and hope that we talked about last week. The vinegar in the bottle is like God's people waiting for a savior. Nothing happened for many years and people grew tired of waiting.
5. Read together the first page of "He's Here" from the Jesus Storybook Bible. Dump the baking soda into the bottle and watch the balloon inflate.

God's plan was in motion even while his people were waiting. When Jesus came, they could see the good news coming true, just like you can see your balloon blowing.

Advent Week III

Final Judgement

Advent means God isn't going to leave the world to itself, but he will make good on his promise to crush the head of the ancient serpent. Judgment hardly hits us as a theme to be taken up during the holidays. Yet, it's actually a source of great hope for Christians. The coming judgment of God means evil is on a leash and will one day be brought to perfect justice. The birth of Jesus means that evil and chaos won't win, but God does and will.

Acts 17:29-32

Being then God's offspring, we ought not to think that the divine being is like gold or silver or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of man. The times of ignorance God overlooked, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will judge the world in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed; and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead." Now when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some mocked. But others said, "We will hear you again about this."

Memory Verse:

Devotional:

Imagine what it would have been like to be Mary. She is young, like you guys (look at your kiddos) and she has been told she is going to have a baby and he will be the Savior that has been promised. What would you feel? Scared or excited? Would you want to hide or tell everyone? Mary felt all the things we would feel and she went to her cousin Elizabeth to visit. Elizabeth was pregnant too and as Mary came, the baby in Elizabeth jumped for joy at the presence of Jesus! The savior of the world is coming!

Family Activity:

Supplies - Ziploc gallon bag filled with water, sharp pencil

Set up the activity by talking about the impossible. Ask your kiddos if they think you can put a hole in the bag without the water coming out.

1. Fill the Ziploc bag with water about $\frac{3}{4}$ of the way full and seal the bag well.
2. To add to the illustration, ask the kids to hold the bag over their heads or laps and tell them you are going to put a hole in the bag.
3. Take the sharp pencil and plunge through the bag to come out the other side. If done correctly, the pencil should seal the holes and keep the water from coming out.

Remind your kids of the story you read and what seemed impossible for God to do. God was doing things that everyone thought were impossible. He was bringing the savior of the world to us! God does the impossible!

Advent Week IV

New Heavens and New Earth

If Jesus came the first time with a ministry of healing and authority, then how much more will that be true when we are gathered to him for all eternity? Creation will be restored, all sickness healed, sin gone forever, and death totally defeated. What was good in the garden at the beginning will be made perfect in the end. The birth of Jesus is the first fruits of a new creation. Advent points beyond itself to final fulfillment.

Revelation 21:1-7

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away."

And he who was seated on the throne said, "Behold, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true." And he said to me, "It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give from the spring of the water of life without payment. The one who conquers will have this heritage, and I will be his God and he will be my son."

Devotional:

Jesus has come! He is here! We have spent this Advent season celebrating the good news that Jesus came to earth as a baby. But the good news doesn’t stop there. Jesus grew into a man and taught many people about who God is. He healed and cared for people. Jesus was arrested, beaten, and died on the cross to take away our sins. But, three days later he rose again and defeated death! He was the light that broke through the darkness. We can celebrate all year because we have hope that Jesus is coming again!

Thank God today for sending Jesus and for the hope we have through him.

Family Activity:

As you wrap up this season of Advent, spend time as a family reflecting on what the Lord has done in this season and throughout the year. Thank him for his faithfulness in good and bad times. Then, look forward to the next year. Invite the Holy Spirit to help you identify goals for your family discipleship in the new year.

- Create a weekly time for family worship
- Set limits for screen time/other activities to create space for family discipleship
