## Route 66: road trip through the Bible

Today's lesson: Jeremiah-a prophet for post-Christian times<sup>2</sup>

1. Read Jeremiah chapter 1. Notice that Jeremiah's life and ministry extended over the reigns of the last five kings of Judah before the captivity by Babylon.

2. Jeremiah's name means "the LORD exalts". In Ch. 1 we get understanding about the prophet himself (his priestly background) and about God's call to him to be a prophet. Jeremiah's life was hard. He was lonely (15:17) as he delivered an unpopular message and the Lord prohibited him from taking a wife (16:1). He was in conflict with the authorities and the false prophets of his day that told the people what they wanted to hear. Hostility against him was violent at times. King Zedekiah consulted him but did not heed him (37:3, 17). Nebuchadnezzar protected him (39:11-14). He warned the survivors in Judah not to flee into Egypt, but they rejected his warning and forced him to go there with them (Ch. 42-44). It is thought that he died there.

3. The book of the prophet Jeremiah, like other books of prophets presents some challenges to the reader and to the teacher. Narrative sections which describe incidents in Jeremiah's life are disbursed throughout the book and mixed with oracles of judgment and salvation which the prophet delivered. You may want to read the biographical passages to get a picture of the man Jeremiah and his life. Then go back and read the chapters containing his prophetic messages. Use this chart to guide you if you choose to read the book this way.

Questions for discussion: How does Jeremiah's teaching about a new covenant (Ch. 31) point to Jesus Christ and His gospel (Luke 22:20)? Some scholars call Jeremiah "a prophet for post-Christian times." Do you agree? How are our times similar to those of Jeremiah? How might believers find encouragement from Jeremiah to be faithful in these days when fear of the Lord is diminished, and the gospel is considered by many to be "hate speech"? What attitudes and character qualities of Jeremiah do you find admirable?
