- I. Put off stealing
- "You shall not steal" (Ex 20:15)
- Greek: kleptō (to steal)
- Believers must put off the old habits of getting without working

Ephesians 4:28

II. Put on hard work

- "Labor" = to grow weary
- Work is important for the believer (2 Thess 3:10)
- "Performing" = working
- Stands "in contrast to idleness or useless busyness" (Hoehner, *Ephesians*, p. 626)
- Acts 20:34; 1 Cor 4:12; 1 Thess 4:11

III. Hard work will enable you to help those in need

- Acts 2:45; 4:35
- Focus is on needs of believers (Rom 15:25-28; 1 Cor 16:1-4; Eph 4:25)
