In your deepest distress, fix your hope on the Messiah, who is divinely capable and full of divine delight

Gospel Fear

"I want you to rejoice in this strange paradox that the gospel both frees us from fear and gives us fear. It frees us from our crippling fears, giving us instead a most delightful, happy, and wonderful fear...for Christians it really does <u>not</u> mean being afraid of God"

(Michael Reeves, Rejoice and Tremble, p. 16)

Messiah's Delight – Isaiah 11:1-3a

- I. Fix your hope on the promised Messiah (1)
- II. Yahweh's Spirit is the source of Messiah's character (2)
- III. The fear of Yahweh is the source of Messiah's intense delight (3a)



Isaiah 6:13

That tree is cut down leaving only the stump/root stock (the remnant)



From that stump/root stock a shoot springs which is Messiah




From that stump/root stock a shoot springs which is Messiah





While Messiah (Jesus) is from the line of David, He springs from the root stock of Jesse, not David



Springing from the root stock of Jesse, Messiah is "another David" —a greater David, David's son yet David's Lord (Ps 110:1; Mt 22:41-45)

Promise of future hope

"Undated hope is a living, everpresent assurance for God's people"

(Alec Motyer, The Prophecy of Isaiah, p. 120)

The Spirit's sevenfold influence on Messiah

Holy Spirit = Will personally rest on Messiah

Wisdom = Messiah understands life

Understanding = Messiah understands how to live well

Counsel = He understands how to guide us through life's troubles

Might = He is able to accomplish His Father's plans

Knowledge = He has a personal relationship with the Father

Fear of Yahweh = He has joyful, loving reverence with His Father

Isaiah 11:2; see Rev 1:4; 5:1-4

Jesus – The Wisdom of God

"The Lord Jesus, says Paul, has become 'for us wisdom from God' (1 Cor. 1:30). Isaiah got there first, of course, and it is attractively tempting to think that Isaiah 11 was the apostle's daily Bible reading the day he wrote to the Corinthians!"

"We cannot read Isaiah 11 (and crowds of other passages) without sensing afresh the wonder of our Bibles: such detailed anticipation and accurate forecasting of the Coming One"

By this we are "uplifted in wonder, love and praise of the one thus foreseen, the Lord Jesus Christ"

"the fear of the Lord is not something the Messiah wishes to be without"

Isaiah 11:3 "Delight"

Delight means "to smell a pleasing odor", thus, to delight in something (Motyer, The Prophecy of Isaiah, p. 123)

The construction here "suggests that all [Messiah's] capacity for delight spends itself on this great object" (*Ibid.*)
