

Blessings, brother.  
Greetings from San Quintín, B.C.

We are adapting to our brothers and sisters, and they are adapting to us. Please continue to pray for me and my family that God will give us grace before our brothers and sisters.

We have Sunday school at 10 a.m. and our worship service at 11:30 a.m. Every first Sunday of the month we celebrate Holy Communion, but before that, we have breakfast at 10 a.m. Each family brings a little food to share with one another, with the purpose of having fellowship, getting to know each other better, and strengthening our relationship in the body of Christ. Then at 11:15 a.m., we have our Holy Communion, followed by our praise and worship service.

On Wednesday at 7 p.m., I suspended the praise and worship service to give them John's discipleship (there are 13 lessons, and we are on the sixth). Some have not taken any discipleship training, and this is a good time to do so. (Seven people are coming.)

On Friday at 7 p.m., we have prayer. We pray for the needs of each of the brothers and sisters, for the church, and for our community.

On Saturday at 2 p.m., we have worship group rehearsal.

On the second Saturday of the month, we have a youth meeting.

On the third Saturday of the month, there is a women's meeting. My wife shares a devotional with them.

On the last Saturday of the month, we have a men's meeting.

At the church, we have a vision:

1. Reaching the lost. (Romans 1:16)
2. Discipleship of believers. (1 Timothy 3:16)
3. Equipping them for ministry. (2 Timothy 2:2)
4. Sending them where God opens doors. (1 Timothy 1:12)

Since I arrived at the church, I have presented the first two points of the vision to the brothers and sisters: evangelism and discipleship.

For six weeks in Sunday school (10 a.m.), I addressed the topic, then I temporarily stopped Sunday school to go out (10 a.m.) to evangelize our community. We handed out brochures with information about the church

and my phone number, invited them to visit us, and shared the gospel with them.

We will do this for four more weeks and then return to our Sunday school.

We find ourselves at this point, evangelizing and discipling, preparing our brothers and sisters for when the new converts arrive, so that we can affirm them in biblical truths and thus help their faith to grow.

On July 18, there was a meeting that I attended on behalf of the council of pastors of “united ministries” to which we belong and from which we receive coverage so that we can operate without any problems before the government.

It was in the state of Chiapas, on the border with Guatemala.

There will be another “extraordinary” meeting of the council at the end of October in the city of Guadalajara, which, God willing, I will be attending.

I ask for your prayers for the church.

May the men be alert and stand firm in the faith.

May the church feel a burden for the spiritual and physical needs of its community.

May God continue to give me wisdom and understanding of His Word so that I can explain it clearly.

May God help me to care for and shepherd the flock that He purchased with His blood on the cross.

May God help me to take care of myself.
