- Homeschool year starts September. Lori Montoya (Kimberly's mom) will be helping with Logan's schooling. Kimberly is considering hiring someone to help with some of the kids schooling this year. - Zelaya monthly financial support level is good at present.
- Currently living in their original, small house while they raise funds to build on the MEDA property. They have about 38% of the \$150,000 that they estimate they will need. They are trying to decide if they should wait until they have raised all of the funds before starting construction or get a loan to start construction now and when construction is complete, rent their current house for income to make loan payments.
- Kimberly's brother Jonathan and his wife, Madison, along with their two young children, Jon-Wilson (2) and Ian-Fuller (10 months), led a short-term team from their church to MEDA for a week and then stayed on for a second week to visit family. Jonathan is in seminary.
- Kimberly's brother Jeremy is in his second year of law school. Jeremy and his wife, Andrea, are doing well. She is pregnant.
- Kimberly's sister Leslie, and her new husband, Luke, are doing well. Luke is also in seminary. Leslie is expecting their first child.
- Kimberly's sister Marcy, and her new husband, Ryan, are doing well. They have moved near Washington, D.C., for his job as an engineer.
- Kimberly's sisters, Sara (19), and Abby (16) are doing well in Honduras. Both are active in ministry.
- Lori's parents in North Carolina are continuing to decline in health. Carlos and Lori (Kimberly's parents) have been in the U.S. 3 times this year to help care for her parents. One of those times, Lori was in the U.S. for 2 months. Finding good, reliable, caring people to care for her parents is a challenging task.
- Lori stays busy in ministering through Betania church, as nursery director and in counseling women. She also enjoys time with her growing number of grandchildren.
- Carlos continues to be very busy with MEDA. He teaches 3 modules. In addition, he is doing more traveling, teaching at MEDA conferences in Peru and El Salvador. On top of that, he is involved in a lot of meetings, including a regional TMAI (The Masters Academy International) meeting in Florida during September.

- MEDA is expanding its influence and reach.
 - In addition to resuming two conferences on campus in Siguatepeque, Honduras (a Pastors conference and a Women's conference), they have held a conference in El Salvador, one in Peru, and a couple in other Honduras locations. This makes the training available to more pastors and also increases the number of churches and pastors who are aware of MEDA as an option for additional training.
 - The Nogales Baptist Seminary (aka SEBANO) in Nogales, Mexico (on the border with Arizona) is partnering with MEDA, becoming SEPE-Mexico (SEPE, or Seminary for Expository Preaching, is the name of the MEDA seminary while MEDA, or Ministerios Evangelicos de la Americas, is the name of the overall ministry organization that includes the seminary, the conferences, other pastoral ministry training, and hosting short-term ministry teams and interns). A professor from SEBANO has been teaching the Greek #1, #2, and #3 modules at MEDA this year, and Edwin will be teaching in Nogales for 2 weeks during September. The MEDA professor of Hebrew has already taught one of the classes at the Nogales seminary this year.
 - This year, Edwin is teaching 3 modules, Greek #4 and Exegesis #1, and #2. In addition, Edwin has also taught two online courses, one on Greek and one on Exegesis. Each of these online courses is once a week for 15 weeks.
