Sermon Text

Matthew 5:1–12 (LSB) ¹ Now when Jesus saw the crowds, He went up on the mountain; and after He sat down, His disciples came to Him. ² And He opened His mouth and *began to* teach them, saying, ³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. ⁴ Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. ⁵ Blessed are the lowly, for they shall inherit the earth. ⁶ Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. ⁷ Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy. ⁸_Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. ⁹ Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God. ¹⁰ Blessed are those who have been persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. ¹¹ "Blessed are you when *people* insult you and persecute you, and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of Me. ¹² "Rejoice and be glad, for your reward in heaven is great; for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

Step Five: You will Prefer Mercy (Matt 5:7)

Matthew 5:7 LSB

⁷ Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy.

What is true mercy?

True mercy is always concerned about people's needs, no matter the situation. It is sympathetic and compassionate, even toward people caught up in the ramifications of their sins, including sin against us. It never seeks to take advantage of anyone. Even when our enemies find themselves under our power and control, mercy always desires what is best for them, including justice. Genuine compassion and justice always work together. The genuinely merciful will never overlook justice, yet will seek to show mercy even toward those receiving their just punishments for wrongdoing. True mercy was especially exemplified by our Lord Jesus as He suffered on the cross at the hands of His godless enemies.

What is the result of preferring mercy or being merciful?

Matthew 5:3 LSB

³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Step Six: Pursue Inward Purity (Matt 5:8)

Matthew 5:8 LSB

What does it mean to be pure in heart?

What is the heart?

⁸ Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

In Scripture, the heart is much more than our feelings. It is the sum or totality of who we are. In addition to our emotions, it includes our intellect and will. It is the fountainhead out of which everything in our life flows. If our hearts are evil, out of the heart will come evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, sexual immoralities, thefts, false witness, and slanders (Matt 15:19; Gal 5:19-21). If our hearts are pure, having the Holy Spirit, out of our hearts will flow love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Gal 5:22-23).

Matthew 15:19 (LSB) ¹⁹ "For out of the heart come <u>evil thoughts, murders,</u> adulteries, sexual immoralities, thefts, false witness, slanders.

Galatians 5:19–21 (LSB) ¹⁹ Now the deeds of the flesh are evident, which are: sexual immorality, impurity, sensuality, ²⁰ idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, outbursts of anger, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions, ²¹ envying, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these, of which I forewarn you, just as I have forewarned you, that those who practice such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

<u>Galatians 5:22–23</u> (LSB) ²² <u>But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, self-control. Against such things there is no law.</u>

Why does Jesus emphasize the heart?

Jesus emphasizes the heart because man's troubles always arise from his heart. Our problems have nothing to do with our surroundings. Our surroundings can help shape us, but our impure and sinful heart always leads us down dark paths. Adam and Eve sinned in the most fantastic paradise ever; therefore, the ultimate problem is not our surroundings but our hearts. We can trace every sin back to the impurity of our hearts.

What does our Lord mean by "pure in heart?"

Being pure in heart means being single-minded in our devotion to the Lord, with no hidden spots or agendas. We must recognize that naturally, we have divided hearts like the double-minded man in <u>James 1:5-8</u>. When we realize our heart's sinfulness, we mourn, and God begins cleansing our hearts, making

us single-minded without any spot or wrinkle. When we become pure in heart, we no longer have divided loyalties between God and sin.

How do we become pure in heart?

We become pure in heart by faith in God and belief in His Word. He shows us the sinfulness - the impurity - of our hearts. We mourn over it as He continues to reveal it to us. This process is painful, beginning at salvation and continuing throughout our lives as followers of Christ. We must recognize that Jesus alone makes us pure. He cleanses us and makes us whiter than snow.

How do we know we are pure in heart?

When we are pure in heart, we become painfully aware of and burdened by the remaining impurities which still indwell us. We start this process by mourning over our sins. We continue in the same fashion for the rest of our days.

What is the result of becoming pure in heart?

Matthew 5:8 (LSB) 8 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

Acts 7:55-56 LSB

⁵⁵ But being full of the Holy Spirit, he gazed intently into heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God; ⁵⁶ and he said, "Behold, I see the heavens opened up and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God."

Step Seven: Pursue Peace (Be a Peacemaker) (Matt 5:9)

Matthew 5:9 LSB

⁹ Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God.

Is Jesus referring to world peace?

I just want to say – you know – can we, can we all get along? Can we, can we get along?

And uh, I mean, please, we can, we can get along here. We all can get along. We just gotta. I mean, we're all stuck here for a while. Let's, you know, let's try to work it out. Let's try to beat it, you know. Let's try to work it out.

<u>James 4:4</u> (LSB) ⁴ You adulteresses, do you not know that <u>friendship with the</u> world is hostility toward God? Therefore, whoever wishes to be a friend of the world sets himself as an enemy of God.

<u>Psalm 5:4–6</u> (LSB) ⁴ For You are not a God who delights in wickedness; Evil does not sojourn with You. ⁵ The boastful shall not stand before Your eyes; You hate all workers of iniquity. ⁶ You destroy those who speak falsehood; Yahweh abhors the man of bloodshed and deceit.

What are the characteristics of worldly peace?

What is the nature of true peace?

Peace on the basis of righteousness!

Matthew 5:3 (LSB) ³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

<u>Matthew 5:10</u> (LSB) ¹⁰ Blessed are those who have been persecuted for the sake of righteousness, <u>for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.</u>

The Kingdom brings peace!

Genesis 1:1 (LSB) ¹ In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

Exodus 19:5–6 (LSB) ⁵ 'So now then, if you will indeed listen to My voice and keep My covenant, then you shall be My treasured possession among all the peoples, for all the earth is Mine; ⁶ and you shall be to Me a kingdom of priests and a holy nation.' These are the words that you shall speak to the sons of Israel."

Revelation 5:9–10 (LSB) ⁹ And they sang a new song, saying, "Worthy are You to take the scroll and to open its seals, because You were slain and <u>purchased for</u>

God with Your blood *people* from every tribe and tongue and people and nation. ¹⁰ "And You made them *to be* a kingdom and priests to our God, and they will reign upon the earth."

The idea of peace, in fact, permeates the Bible. It opens and closes with peace. When God originally created man and woman and put them in the garden, it was a garden of peace. Then came the fall and peace was interrupted, peace with God was interrupted, peace between men was interrupted. Then at the cross, Jesus came and brought peace to the heart. Someday Jesus will return and establish a kingdom of peace, and in the ultimate new heaven and new earth we will enjoy eternal peace. So really, the story of redemption is the story of peace, peace forfeited, peace regained in the heart, peace regained on the earth, and finally peace regained in the eternal state.

Who are the peacemakers?

Romans 10:10 (LSB) ¹⁰ for with the heart a person believes, <u>leading to righteousness</u>, and with the mouth he confesses, leading to salvation.

The world hates -

God's righteousness

Appendix

What does it mean to be blessed?

Blessing is the state of happiness in our inward selves. It comes from the acknowledgment of the reality of how fortunate we are to have a relationship with God the Father through Jesus the Son. This relationship produces an inner bliss and contentment that comes from an ever-increasing recognition of all that God has done for us and that no circumstance or set of circumstances can change our happiness or contentment in Christ.

Who is the source of blessing?

God Himself is the source of this blessing. We can only be truly blessed by partaking in His divine nature. As the psalmist promises, "In His presence is fullness of joy and in His right hand are pleasures forever" (Ps 16:11).

Who are the Blessed?

The blessed are those who have believed in the promises of Christ and are living in the present reality of the Holy Spirit living within them with an ever-increasing understanding of what He is accomplishing through them.

What does it mean to be Poor in Spirit?

God blesses a person who recognizes their spiritual bankruptcy or poverty. They have acknowledged their lostness in sin, hopelessness in life, and helplessness to save themselves. They must see that they are utterly unworthy of God and are

entirely dependent upon Him to save them. They have cried out like Isaiah, "Woe is me, for I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, And I live among a people of unclean lips; For my eyes have seen the King, Yahweh of hosts" (Isa 6:5).

What does Jesus mean by mourning?

Godly mourning is a deep and abiding sorrow produced by the knowledge of our sins and how far we fall short of God's glory. This mourning can only be experienced by those who have recognized their spiritual poverty and desperate need for God's mercy and grace. We see this type of mourning in the lives of saints like Isaiah (Isa 6:5) and David (Ps 32:3-4 & Ps 51:3-4).

What does "comforted" mean?

The comfort Jesus refers to is supernatural encouragement that can only come from God Himself - the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The Father has sent the Holy Spirit to dwell within us. He provides comfort or encouragement that comes from the Father and the Son. As believers who have come to a knowledge of sin, we are comforted from on high.

What does Jesus mean by "the lowly, gentle, or meek"?

The lowly are those who have come to understand their utter unworthiness in the light of God's holiness. They recognize their sinfulness and how far short they fall of His glory. Those who are lowly place no confidence in their flesh, finding their strength in Him alone. They have committed their way to Him, fully resting in Him. They have come to see their need to trust and delight in Him alone and have cast themselves on His mercy and trust in Him for protection.

What does Jesus mean by hungering and thirsting for righteousness?

Jesus teaches that God blesses those who hunger and thirst for His imputed righteousness. These people recognize that they are entirely parched and

starved for a righteousness that is not their own - the righteousness of Christ. At salvation, God imputes Jesus's righteousness to the believer, thus satisfying their need and making them positionally righteous. The Holy Spirit also comes to dwell in them, starting the process of sanctification, which is the gradual and practical process of becoming more like our Lord Jesus. In other words, we slowly become what we already are in Christ.

What is true mercy?

True mercy is always concerned about people's needs, no matter the situation. It is sympathetic and compassionate, even toward people caught up in the ramifications of their sins, including sin against us. It never seeks to take advantage of anyone. Even when our enemies find themselves under our power and control, mercy always desires what is best for them. Genuine compassion and justice always work together. The genuinely merciful will never overlook justice, yet will seek to show mercy even toward those receiving their just punishments for wrongdoing. True mercy was exemplified by our Lord Jesus as He suffered on the cross at the hands of His godless enemies.
